In the world's eyes I'm certainly not well prepared for Christmas! However, I do like the three little Aldi Angels - could tell you lots of stories about children and Christmas Nativities, lovely memories! We don't do "presents" as such in our family anymore but we still enjoy Christmas. I've been reminiscing. As children, my dad always insisted that my sister, brother and I hang up stockings on Christmas Eve, that is, we each had one of dad's old socks. On Christmas morning we would open the bulging sock to find all kinds of "treasures". A shiny red apple, an orange, a sugar mouse, an "unusual" gift - one year my sister and I each had a lump of Blue John, purchased by my dad from a basket of "stones" on sale in Castleton. No it wasn't that we had been naughty girls - that would have been lumps of coal! Just a bit of Derbyshire and I've used that piece of Blue John on several occasions in a variety of ways to good effect. There may have been a sachet of bubble bath (no showers in those days!), a comb and perhaps a few Quality Street chocolates. This tradition continued way beyond our childhood and even when in New Zealand for Christmas 2010 I had a Christmas stocking - a little more up market than an old sock though! Dad's old sock, usually wool and possibly with a darn in the toe or heel; warm socks – the warmth of love in the contents wrapped and ready to be opened. Feel the warmth of God's love demonstrated at that first "Christmas" in a stable in Bethlehem. As John in his Gospel puts it, "For God so loved the world that He gave His one and only Son", the greatest giver and the greatest gift. God gives wonderful gifts, gifts of His creation, the apple and the orange, each with seeds and the potential to produce more apples and oranges. "God have His one and only Son that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have everlasting life" John 3 v 16. Luke 2. I invite you to take stock and celebrate with a real Christmas, a Jesus Christmas, as recorded in the Bible and especially the first chapters of Matthew and Luke's Gospels.

Join with us at the Chapel in the Dale, the Assembly in High Street and at St. James in Church Street; you are all very welcome.

Bonsall's Affordable Housing Planned (the story without airbrushing)

In the last issue of Mutterings, Bob Cartwright laid out the plan to put affordable housing in Upper Town. Now before starting my response, I need to say that I am an ardent supporter of affordable housing but it needs to be done without a serious detrimental impact on our village. When you walk up into Upper Town the first thing you see when you get to the end of the Bell Lane path is a field that is integral to what Upper Town is. It means that there are cows that wander past our windows; it puts a green space in the heart of Upper Town. So, first, what is missing from the story Bob is telling you? Affordable housing is not for Bonsall, it is for the Derbyshire Dales area; this means that properties built in Wirksworth, Cromford, Middleton or anywhere else fulfils the same criteria and, I would suggest, there are less environmentally critical areas in The Dales. It could be argued that this could be sacrificed to allow Bonsall residents to remain in the Village. The truth is that anybody who meets the housing criteria in Derbyshire Dales could be accommodated not just Bonsall residents.

We are also told by Bob that the Parish Council has agreed 'in principal' – the truth is that over 40 Upper Town residents went to that meeting, which by the way nobody told us was on, and were highly critical of the building proposals. My understanding was the Parish Council was 'consulted' and did not support this; in fact other sites



in the village were seen as preferable. The next stage was to gauge the level of interest in accommodation and we all had a card with Mutterings to fill in and return. The lack of consultation continues as the results from this have never been published so, as a resident, I have no idea if there is a need or not.


The biggest problem I have is the lack of consultation and accountability from our elected representatives. Apart from some noticeable and outstanding Parish Councillors, there has never been an opportunity for us to express our views on a regular basis as the 'consultations' have occurred before the Parish Council can seek advice. It is interesting that a microbrewery was refused permission; I for one knew nothing about this. Not once have our District Councillors sought our views and, far from being impartial, have supported the proposed building

in Upper Town from the beginning. They have swept aside arguments, including one that the field has never been used for grazing – here's a picture for them. To add insult to injury it appears that the planning process is being foreshortened, I assume to keep the objections down? To use the argument that people don't attend planning meetings is spurious; you can't attend something that you don't know that it is taking place. Can I take this opportunity to ask our District Councillors to declare a longstanding interest in the project to avoid embarrassment further down the line.

So, in short, give people an opportunity to debate with full information on what they are debating and please, please, get our elected representatives to start talking to us.

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Response to Bob's November Article

The article written by Bob in Novembers Mutterings raised a few questions.

"Affordable Housing" seems to have become an irrelevant term nationally as well as locally; as houses have become 'investments' rather than 'homes'. How is 'Affordable housing' applied and enforced locally Bob?

'Affordable housing' is also questionable on building materials — specifically concerning astronomical heating costs. Are these new builds going to be "Passive houses"? That is consuming minimal heating costs. Apparently a 'passive house' costs about £20 a year to heat. These properties cost around £20,000 more than a standard build. Now that would make for real affordable housing as far as energy consumption goes.

I feel some concern that the democratic process is being short changed if officers only deal with planning applications, rather than going to committee. Which is what Bob seems to be suggesting he would prefer to happen in his statement: "This saves the council quite a lot of money and also means that decisions can be expedited."

Bob gives the example of no villagers turning up to raise objections on a recent planning issue. Surely if they had already raised this with Bob, why should they need to turn up? Isn't he the voice of the people he represents?

The officers are employees doing a job and clearly wish they could do it without anyone telling them to do it differently. Can I remind him of the officer's opposition to Bonsall Allotments? The officer opposed this to the extent of stating a legal prerogative that blocked the allotments going ahead. This 'prerogative' when looked into by a barrister from the National Allotments Association was found not to exist!

The officers have no knowledge or interest in the village. The Parish Council, I believe (correct me if I am wrong), have all planning applications passed to them for perusal and their opinion. Unfortunately their opinion has no weight.

As for saving money... the current government's method of getting us out of a hole dug by affluent/gambling bankers has been to make cuts. Cuts, cuts and more cuts. If we continue down this constant hacking at our democratic rights in the interests of 'saving money' what kind of society will we be left to live in?

We now have so many obscenely wealthy individuals in the UK that galleries and museums now have no chance to buy Art and artefacts on the open market. Could we reflect on this profusion of wealth in some strata's of society when considering that a few pence may be saved by reducing our options to make choices?

Foster care

We need more homes for children in care in Derbyshire. That's why we've launched a countywide campaign to help us find foster carers and adoptive parents. We currently have around 630 children in our care and they all need stable, secure and happy homes whether it's for a short length of time or longer term. You might have considered fostering in the past but have not taken the first steps. We know that there are some common misconceptions around fostering and if any of these myths have stopped you from fostering before, please think again:

I'm not the right age: We don't have any upper age limits. However 21 is the youngest age that we consider for fostering in Derbyshire.

I don't own my own home: You don't need to own your own home to foster. As long as each child can have their own bedroom you can foster.

I'm single: Our foster carers may be single, married, in a civil partnership or living with a partner.

I haven't worked with children or young people: We offer training, support and development so you're ready for the rewards and challenges fostering brings. If you haven't worked with children we only ask that you've got some experience caring for them through family or volunteering.

I'd love to foster but I work: There are different types of fostering available such as short-break foster care. So you can still foster while working.

Poachers, Poultry Shows and Poverty

The new Bonsall history book will be on sale during December/January. It has grown from the first edition to 460 pages with over 100 new photos and new sections on work and leisure in Bonsall, prominent houses in the village and World War I. Here are a few quotes to whet your appetite:

Poachers

"(Some) Bonsall men, including Joshua Wigley, Joseph Prince, Job Bunting and Charles Fearn, were at different times committed to hard labour at Derby County Gaol for poaching rabbits, hares and pheasants. In the first half of the nineteenth century, landowners asserted their rights to their property and, as they were also magistrates, they ensured that transgressors were properly punished. The perpetrators seem to have been relatively few in number and the offence seems to have run in families, with the keepers and the poachers knowing each other well. For example, in 1863, PC Jeffries on his beat at 3.30 in the morning of the 30th May, saw William Cottrell 'knowing him to be a poacher' and searched him. He found one rabbit and three nets and a dog in his possession."

Poultry Shows

"The Pigeon Club and Horticultural Show ... have an illustrious past, holding large nationally important events in the later part of the nineteenth century. The first Bonsall Poultry Show was in 1883, for the exhibition of poultry, pigeon rabbits and canaries' at the Drill Hall, with 250 entries in 30 classes. The second show was in February 1884, but 'owing to some mismanagement, catalogues were not procurable and many visitors had to leave disappointed and uninformed as to who were the exhibitors of the successful birds'. A number of Bonsall's inhabitants also celebrated too freely and were dealt with at the Petty Sessions for drunkenness. For the third show, with 618 entries, a tent was erected alongside the Drill Hall and a class for cats was introduced. By the fourth show in 1886, with a marguee on an adjoining field, there were nearly 700 entries. In 1887 the show's title changed to 'Bonsall and West Derbyshire Poultry, Rabbits, Pigeons and Cage Bird Fanciers Association' and had 761 entries in 66 classes, with judges from Leeds and Birmingham."

Poverty

"Framework k n i t t e r s worked very long hours, sometimes up to e i g h t e e n hours per day, to increase their output.



The depression in the hosiery industry and the very poor incomes of framework knitters prompted a government commission in 1840 to advise them: '... to flee from the trade and to beware of leading their children into it'. A frameknitter named John Thurman. with his wife and seven children, knitted plain hose. He said: 'The boy and me make four dozen of them in a week; then I have to pay 2s. 3d. frame rent for the two frames; ... 2s. for seaming; .. 71/2d. for needles; ... 4d. per week for candles; .. 2d. for oil; ... coal 1/3d. per week; then I have to buy wrenches, hammers, keys and everything of that sort'. This gave him an income of £1 2s. 3d. per week with expenses of 9s. 71/2 d., leaving the family of nine only 12s. 71/2 d. per week (£28 today) for food and clothing. Others were much worse off, including a family of six living off 3s. 6d. per week (£7.70). John Thurman continued: 'The whole nine of us lie in two beds and ... we have one blanket for both', and 'When Monday morning comes I have not got 6d to buy a loaf with and there is nothing in the house. Then whatever few garments we have we pledge them into the (pawnbrokers) shop to get a bit of bread to go on with during the week sometimes it lasts to Thursday dinner time and then we have to go without until Saturday, when we get our things again"



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
