CHURCH NEWS

As children we learned to enjoy walking and taking in the delights of God's wonderful creation. With our "Eye Spy" and various other nature books, we sought out "firsts" whether flowers blooming, trees bursting into leaf, birds nests and creatures (frog spawn, newts etc) appearing. We were taught to see, not to touch and take! May was a walking month, not least because we were practicing for the Sunday School Anniversary (as were children at the Baptist and Assembly of God Churches) and walked home to Cromford (it was all down hill!) after the mid-week practice. Members and children from the Dale Chapel always walked round the village and Slaley singing the specially learned songs over our Anniversary weekend. In other parts people participated in "Whit Walks of Witness" over the Whitsuntide weekend heralding the birth of the Church at Pentecost.

In Genesis 3 we are told how God walked in the cool of the evening and met with Adam and Eve. Abraham walked not knowing where he was going but God walked with him to lead and guide. Moses spent 40 years in Pharaoh's palace in Egypt, 40 years walking in the Sinai wilderness tending his father in law's flocks until he saw a bush that "burned" and God spoke to him. He then spent another 40 years walking in the wilderness with the "Children of Israel" seeking to reach the Promised Land of Canaan. David who wrote the Psalms was inspired as he walked tending sheep, where God as his Shepherd let him rest in green meadows and led him beside peaceful streams. There were many more people in the Bible who walked and learned from God as they did so. Jesus joined two people as they walked the 7 miles from Jerusalem to a village called Emmaus. He noted their sorrow and listened to their heartache and then encouraged them as He spoke from the Bible about Himself, finally revealing Himself to them. Jesus then disappeared but they rushed back to Jerusalem, even though it was evening to tell the other disciples "Jesus is alive!"

We can learn so much as we walk, often in silence with our thoughts, listening and

hearing the gentle whisper of His loving voice as we view all around us. Matthew 11 v 28 - 30 in the Message Bible reads "Are you tired? Worn out? Burned out on religion? Come to Me. Get away with Me and you'll recover your life. I'll show you how to take a real rest. Walk with Me and work with Me - watch how I do it. Learn the unforced rhythms of grace. I won't lay anything heavy or ill fitting on you. Keep company with Me and you will learn to live freely and lightly." Now there's an invitation not to refuse!

So in May, why not take a walk, see the wild pansies and purple orchids - it's good for health, lifts your mood, enables you to spend time with family and friends.

OBITUARY

Margaret Howard

Born in Derby on 25 January 1932, Margaret knew Bonsall at an early age from walking trips with her father. Gradually they got to know climbers and then cavers and this was the start of her lifelong passion for Derbyshire lead mines and their history. After leaving Parkfield Cedars Grammar School, Margaret had a varied career: first working for Rolls Royce in Derby, testing metals in their chemistry department and later in the Accounts Department at Derbyshire County Council. With her second husband, she set up a holiday business organising Land Rover treks across the Sahara. Following the break up of her marriage, she moved to the then dilapidated Syca-

more House on High Street in 1978 with her three sons and daughter. After extensive renovation she operated a B&B at the house and also a chip shop, selling chips to customers through the window onto the street. She sold the house in 1983 and moved to Sawmills, where she built a couple of houses, and then to Oker and Matlock, working for a company in Bakewell making log cabins. She returned to Bonsall to live in Rose Cottages in Uppertown before finally leaving in 2007 to live nearer her children in Southampton.

Throughout this time Margaret's main interests were family history, geology and especially researching the his-



tory of lead mining. She developed an encyclopaedic knowledge of the mines and caverns of Derbyshire, exploring most of the ones in Bonsall and surrounding areas over the years. She was an active member of the Peak District Mines Historical Society, writing numerous papers and articles for their 'Mining History' Bulletin. Margaret also contributed her knowledge to the Bonsall Map Project and wrote the chapter on lead mining in the first edition of Bonsall - a village and its history. Following her death on 27 March, aged 82, she leaves behind her children, Keith, Richard, Tim and Jane. Ever forthright in her views and clear about what she did and didn't want, Margaret

Success for Village Teenagers

The Derbyshire 'Young Adventurer of the Year' awards ceremony was held in Buxton to find the best runners, bikers. climbers, cavers, skiers, skateboarders, free-runners, kayakers and sailors in the county. The judges decided that the 'Young Leader of the Year' title would be shared by Cameron Orr from High Street and Laurie Butler from Church Street. Both are pupils at Anthony Gell School . Cameron, who is a member of Matlock Cycling Club, had a successful year, ranking fourth in the National (U14) Mountain Bike Series and third in Midlands (U14) Mountain Bike series. He won the opening stage, overall King of the Mountains competition. and finished second overall in the International Youth Tour of Ireland. He is also a county-level middle distance runner, and swims, climbs, skis and is learning to snowboard. He won the AGS Sports Personality of the Year and was runner-up in this year's Derbyshire Dales Young Sports Person of the Year Award.

Laurie Butler was nominated by his friends Jack Sutton and Cameron Macdonald who said: "Every day with Laurie is an adventure. You never know what's going to happen but you know it's going to be fun. He has a wonderful way of looking at the world, seeing the positives where most would only see despair." Renowned for cycling everywhere, Laurie is also a keen climber, sailor, kayaker and hiker, and is part of the 'Gifted and Talented' climbing programme. He's helped his friend overcome his fear of heights and

made sure his whole group completed their Duke of Edinburgh expedition, finishing before everyone else. Laurie and Ben Jones from Greenhill, together with Jack Sutton from Windley and Wilf Turner from Wirksworth, are planning a 900-mile charity bike ride for Amnesty International. They will cycle from Wirksworth to the twin town, Die, in south east France during their summer holidays, when they will be between GCSE and AS Level examinations. They expect the journey will take between two and three weeks and they hope to raise £2,500. "We are not really bothered about how long it takes us - it's more about the adventure." Laurie said. The teenagers want to support Amnesty International because they are passionate about human rights. Living Windbreak

As part of the developing communal area on the allotments, we have recently put in a windbreak around the BBQ and bread oven. We decided to use cut willow to create a living hedge: it's called a 'fedge' derived from 'fence' and 'hedge'. It has a 12 metre curve, which was very quick and easy to create using 50 verticals sunk a foot into the earth with 100 diagonals that were woven in and tied using split willow. It doesn't take long for willow to root and it has already started to come into leaf. The idea is to keep it tightly trimmed to create a dense hedge. We were able to pay for the willow from a grant from the Kings Head Harvest Auction last October. Thanks to all those involved.

Eliza's Year in Malaysia

Eliza Day from Uppertown is taking a year out before university, volunteering as an English language teaching assistant with Project Trust in Gemencheh, Malaysia.

As part of the qualification I will receive from this year, we are required to mark an international day to promote and celebrate global citizenship, existing as part of a global community with common issues and joys. We chose to mark International Happiness Day on March 20th (late update I know), which was brought into being in 2012 by the United Nations General Assembly due to the recognition that happiness isn't a byproduct of life, but a fundamental need of the people. that was superficially good but was completely impossible to implement or fund; they had to think through their ideas and consider possible consequences.






