OBITUARY

Elsie Thompson: 1922 – 2014

Elsie born was here in Bonsall on the 19 March 1922; the eldest of two daughters born to Bernard & Beatrice Bunting, the family first lived at Arter Hill in the Dale before moving to High Street near the Cross. Her third and final move was to Study Drive in the early 30's and she lived there for the rest of her life.

Educated at the Girls School here in Bonsall, she left and like many of her contemporaries went to Masson Mill walking there and back each day. However, Elsie was asthmatic and so had to leave Masson Mill with its fine cotton dust and went to work at a nursery in Tansley then a laundry in Matlock.

During World War II, she was employed at Whitworth Hospital and while working there she met Charlie, a railway worker, who lived locally in Darley Dale. They were married on March 1, 1947 – but a path had to be cleared to St James Church because of the heavy snowfall before the wedding could take place.

Charlie and Elsie had three children, Linda born in 1952 who sadly only lived a short time, Yvonne who was born in 1953 and Philip in 1956. Elsie's sister Hilda sadly died in 1964 aged only 45. Quiet, shy but not a leader she enjoyed being a part of many of the village activities – being particularly involved in the Fountain Well dressing every

year. She and Charlie loved to walk around the village most days and so knew

most of the people.
Both enjoyed stopping for a weekend drink at one of the local pubs. Charlie passed away suddenly in 1996.
After his death, Elsie could be seen daily climbing the 60 steps to visit his grave in the churchyard.

Having lived all her life in Bonsall and being very much part of the community, Elsie chose to stay in Bonsall after Charlie's death. She was also an active member of the village pensioners club that met every Wednesday afternoon in the village hall but had to stop going when she became dependant on a wheel chair.

Elsie remained living at Study Drive and despite becoming severely disabled in 2010, she continued living independently at home with the assistance from family and carers until only a few weeks ago when she was admitted to the Whitworth Hospital where she sadly died on Monday 26 May.

She will always be remembered by all her family and friends as a brave determined lady who never complained despite all her health problems. Elsie a loving mother, grandmother and great grandmother will be very sadly missed by all who knew her but especially by daughter Yvonne, son Phillip and their families.

who live in the village now, and those who will do so over the next 100 years whilst remembering the significant sacrifice made 100 years ago.

The project consists of three elements:

Rebuilding the steps between the Park and Church

The audience heard how the plans include applying for funding to rebuild the steps between the Park and the Church and dedicating a step to each man who died from the village in the First and Second World Wars. The project will include links with the school and the opportunity for the children to explore the histories of the individuals who died and who will be remembered on each memorial step. The children will hopefully be able to explore the role of horses in the village and their contribution to the war thanks to the support of the Bonsall Riders Group.

The activities involving the children will be both a commemoration of the contribution of the village and also help make learning about the war include the local impact.

Build a Bandstand in the Village Park

The next element of the proposal includes applying for funding to build a Bandstand in the park. Children will be involved in the design of the metal work on the Bandstand which can incorporate local features such as the T'Owd Man and the Regimental Crests of those regiments who included Bonsall men. The Bandstand will be used for a variety

of events, not just for bands. It will provide a focal point for the park and remember those who returned from the front, and the families and community who pulled together at such a difficult time.

Alterations to the Village Hall

The third element to the proposal is to complete the alterations to the Village Hall with the addition of a large window at the front, repairs to the flat roof and the addition of new railings at the front. The Village Hall will continue to have a key role, to provide all the people in the village somewhere to hold functions. The project also includes plans to have a series of events on an ongoing basis for people to learn olds skills and new ones as part of the support for our community. These were warmly welcomed, the list included brewing and some people were enthusiastic about the suggestion that this might include demystifying Facebook and other new fangled things on the internet and in our phones!

Everyone who came, and those people who live around the park who we have been able to talk to, all welcomed the proposals so far. There were some brilliant suggestions for workshops and other additions to what is being proposed. On that basis the project team will be putting together an outline bid to see what reaction is received from the funding bodies. We are all really excited about the project and whether we succeed with the complete project or a part of it, we know how fortunate we all are as a result of the contribution made 100 years ago. Whatever happens, we

intend to commemorate this in whatever way we can.

The biggest future issue for the project team is to make sure that we keep the village up to date with how things proceed and we would welcome anyone coming along to get involved in any capacity. Our next meeting is on 8 July at the Kings Head at 7.30pm and all welcome.

PARISH & DISTRICT COUNCIL

Parish Council Report

Bonsall Parish Council met on Tuesday 17 June at Bonsall Village Hall.

Police Officers The new Matt Winterbottom and Sue Lester attended to introduce themselves they cover Middleton, Wirksworth, Bolehill, Cromford and Bonsall please do contact them if there are any queries or issues, the best way to get hold of them is to call 101 and ask for them by name or call Derbyshire Police Safer Neighbourhoods Team.

They will request a visit from Speed Gun for Park Bottom, High Street and The Dale, this should take place in the next two weeks.

Three residents of Ible attended making representation from Ible regarding Griffe Grange Wind Farm, they had previously sent the Parish Council letters outlining their objection to the Wind Farm. In summary these were: currently there are four turbines in Carsington Pasture, two granted at Ryder Point and one more at Viaton. This is as much as the landscape can absorb. The additional proposed five will have a big impact. Closest one is about 600 metres from Ible. Visual impact on Bonsall will be greater than the current turbines. General concern about effect on national park and impact on tourism. Very concerned about Community Fund being promised over 25 years - appears to be a way of influencing people to accept - one fifth of the fund has already been promised to Brassington and therefore is not available to the multi parish working group to administer.

Also a concern expressed that the planning application is only being dealt with by Southern Planning when the visual impact in the Northern Area.

District Council has paid £5,000 for a special consultation on the landscape and environmental effects.

The Parish Council voted to register an objection to the Wind Farm based on it be unsustainable in the proposed location and it having a major impact on the residents of Ible where all houses face towards the turbines and the impact of the 'flicker effect' during low sun in the winter months would be extensive.

Cllr Ratcliffe reported that she had met with Cllr Cartwright and the clerk for a walk around the village – a report being prepared will be circulated to Bonsall Parish Council included mud and foliage blocking the road.

Four consultations out: please visit the Derbyshire County Council website via 'Have Your Say' to register your opinions. Mobile Library – two small mobile libraries once a month – under consultation. Mental Health project. Children's Centres and Adult Care.

District Council carry out cleaning of pavements and drains on behalf of the County Council as of now. Drain cleaning complaints must go to Call Derbyshire.

The Parish Council had received a request for seed funding for the WW1 Commemoration project and voted to make an initial grant of £250 and offered to help administer the funding for the project.

Amember of the public had raised a query about the maintenance in the part of the churchyard looked after by Derbyshire Dales District Council. The District Council have reduced the maintenance programme for Churchyards. The Clerk will write to DDDC requesting the programme be restored and in the meantime Bonsall Parish Council will pay for the work to be carried out.

The next Parish Council meeting will be held on July 15 at Bonsall Village Hall and there will be a presentation from Isabel Frenzel the Rural Housing Officer regarding the Affordable Housing proposal. If you have any issues you would like the Parish Council to discuss, please contact the Clerk.




