Easter is coming

There are many ways of making a pilgrimage- the most usual is by walking to a physical place in the hope that along the way you will meet with God and be changed. Last year I had the privilege of making such a physical pilgrimage by a trip to the Holy land, walking where Jesus had walked in Bethlehem, Nazareth, Jerusalem, along the Jordan and so on. Later in the year I made a less physical pilgrimage as I watched the film *The Way*. For those who haven't seen the film it is the fictional account of one father's pilgrimage along the Camino de Santiago- the way of Saint James to Santiago de Compostela. In the past pilgrims would make the journey to earn repentance for their sins. Today many people make the pilgrimage to discover more about God, their faith and themselves. What I found amazing was that as I watched this film I found myself entering into the spirit of the pilgrimage along with the main character Tom. Through the film I found myself drawn closer to God, and spiritually uplifted in a similar way to the way I was in the Holy land.

Lent is a time when we seek to bring our lives before God, to seek forgiveness, to walk with Christ in His own pilgrimage toward the cross and to look forward. What we seek to find, what we hope will be the end

result of this journey will be personal to each of us- but God is at the centre with each one. From earliest times Lent has been a penitential time, a time for self-examination, penitence, the receiving of God's grace, prayer for ourselves and others, self-denial and recommitment, study, charity and preparation for Easter for every Christian.

Why not think about how you can move closer to God this Lent? It may be by coming along to a Lent course, even if by the time you read this it has started. Or why not look at the Love Life live Lent materials. Or come along to some of our Sunday services. Or spend a few minutes of each day on your own giving thanks to God and asking God to help you draw closer to Him.

Here is the collect for Ash Wednesday- a good prayer to pray throughout lent: Almighty and everlasting God, you hate nothing that you have made and forgive the sins of all those who are penitent, create and make in us new and contrite hearts that we, worthily lamenting our sins and acknowledging our wretchedness, may receive from you, the God of all mercy, perfect remission and forgiveness; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen

George Herbert Massey

1927 to 2015

Dad was the eldest of four children born from the marriage of George Massey and Dorothy (Dolly) Loxley. Sadly, his sister Dorothy predeceased him. However, his sister Eva and brother Eric live in Bonsall on Yeoman Street. Dad was affectionately known as Herbie and was born on 15 August 1927 in Uppertown. He went to Bonsall Boys Endowed School which is now Bonsall Village Hall, where he sat next to Louis Pearson. He told many tales about his fantastic teacher John Frederic Hunting who apparently knew everything.

Dad left school at 14. He worked for the family business including driving coal lorries at 14. He had several warnings from the local bobby and was told to go steady.

National Service followed. He became a driver (no wonder) in the army dental core, and ensuring his teeth were kept in good order, being posted to Ballykinley in Ireland and Bedford.

After service he returned to Bonsall to marry Violet May Prince, a Bonsall girl and set up home in Yeoman Street.

After Steven was born dad and mum moved to the present family home on High Street. He worked for the family haulage business, Loxleys, as a driver and Transport Manager. When that business closed he was proud to set up Steven as G. H. & S. H. Massey Haulage in 1976. Around two years later Auto Engineering in Yeoman Street was set up with Steven and



nephew Richard. They all kept him busy; he never retired and was doing the books and paperwork for both businesses up to a year ago. Keeping his eyes on the finances to ensure he could carry on with his social life and his shots of Grouse whisky.

He loved visiting the pubs and clubs and was a very sociable person enjoying conversation and occasional heated discussions. He loved singing, winning talent contests when he was younger and singing at local karaoke to the end (very good version of Paddy McGinty's Goat)!

Dad and Mum were delighted with the arrival of their grandchildren Anna and Jay but unfortunately May died before the arrival of great grandchildren Max, Alex, Georgia and Ava. She would have loved them so much.

In due course, following the loss of Mum, Dad found happiness with his

friend Zena and had happy times up to her death. Dad has been a major part of the village supporting many events. He donated a cup for the Carnival 5- a-side football competition which is the Herbert Massey Trophy. He played darts for the Pig o Lead pub and enjoyed playing pool, particularly with Hayden Stanley and Graham Charlton. His battles with Graham being legendary. All in all, Dad had a good life with only a short pain-free illness. He died on 20 January and will always be remembered by all who knew him. He was loved and he will be greatly missed.

The main damage is caused by the burrowing maggots that leave brown stains that can cause rotting. The plant is still usable but more time is needed to prepare it for eating. It is important to remove and destroy all pupae, and it is best not to compost any material that could contain pupae. Leeks and onions have always been very reliable crops to grow around here and all is not lost. The only effective solution is to ensure that the fly cannot lay its eggs on the plants, this can be done by covering the plants with fleece or fine 'agrimesh'. On the allotments we cover carrots to protect against the carrot root fly and this seems to be effective. The Royal Horticultural Society has a good website that gives information about the leaf miner. **Mike Lynch**

Warning! Allium Leaf Miner

Of interest to vegetable growers is that the allium leaf miner has arrived in the area. It was discovered when leeks on the allotments were picked in November. It is a pest that came to the UK from East Europe in 2002 but has only just arrived in this area. It has started with leeks but now it is here it's very likely to affect onions, shallots and garlic. There are two flying periods for the very small female fly (about 3mm. long); in Spring laying is in March and April and again in late summer, October and November. The fly lays eggs on the leaves of the plant and the small white maggots burrow down into the plant and change to pupae that are short, cylindrical and brown.

Field Barns Update.

We have been delighted to hear recently that two little owls have taken up residency in the last couple of field barns that we have restored. This is amazing news and one of the reasons why this project is so valuable for wildlife such as endangered barn owls, bats and birds. The barns are all built with access holes in the gables. Lambs will be born soon in a couple of our restored barns. Although the project has been a little quiet of late, there has been plenty going on behind the scenes. I have been asked to join the Advisory Panel on the Derbyshire Historic Buildings Trust, and so far I am enjoying it very much. The Bonsall Field Barn Project is very well regarded by the Trust and they are being very helpful. As the Trust is a registered charity, it has offered to take donations on our behalf, and so far we have received £2000 as gift to restore another barn. We have chosen the Toll Bar barn in Horsedale as our next restoration. It is a small barn beside the footpath and was important in the lead mining industry. Sadly it is crumbling fast and if not helped this year will no doubt be just a pile of rocks by next year. 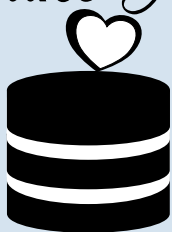

Make a Difference in Your

Community – Become a Parish or
Town Councillor

There are 10,000 community, parish and town councils in England and Wales, controlled by Acts of Parliament, and they are responsible for the most local of matters. Importantly, they can 'precept' - raising a sum collected with the council tax each year to improve facilities and services for local people. These councils have a number of basic responsibilities in making the lives of local communities more comfortable, many of which are often taken for granted. Essentially these powers fall within three main categories: representing the whole electorate within the parish; delivering services to meet local needs; and striving to improve quality of life in the parish. Individual powers include traffic-calming measures, local youth projects, tourism activities, leisure facilities, car parks, village greens, public lavatories,

litter bins, street lighting, street cleaning, burial grounds, allotments, bus shelters, commons, open spaces, footpaths, bridleways, and crime reduction measures. Community, parish and town councils can also comment on planning applications - they are statutory consultees and can be represented at public inquiries.

What is a councillor?

Councillors are elected to represent an individual geographical unit on the council, known as a ward or - mainly in smaller parishes - the entire parish or town council area. They are generally elected by the public every four years.

What do councillors do?

Councillors have three main components to their work: Decision making - through meetings and attending committees with other elected members, councillors decide which activities to support, where money should be spent, what services should be delivered and what policies should be implemented.

Monitoring - Councillors make sure that their decisions lead to efficient and effective services by keeping an eye on how well things are working.

Getting involved locally - As local representatives, councillors have responsibilities towards their constituents and local organisations. These responsibilities and duties often depend on what the councillor wants to achieve and how much time is available, and may include going to meetings of local organisations such as tenants' associations, and organisations affecting the wider

community; taking up issues on behalf of members of the public, running surgeries for residents to bring up issues, and meeting with individual residents in their own homes.

How much time does it take up?

Quite often councillors say that their duties occupy them for about three hours a week. Obviously there are some councillors who spend more time than this - and some less, but in the main, being a community, parish and town councillor is an enjoyable way of contributing to your community, and helping to make it a better place to live and work.

Am I qualified?

Yes - most people are. However there are a few rules. You must be:

- A British subject, or a citizen of the Commonwealth or the European Union;
- On the 'relevant date' (ie the day on which you are nominated, or if there is a poll on the day of the election) be 18 years of age or over. Also:
- Be a local government elector for the council area for which you want to stand on the 'relevant date';
- or have occupied as owner or tenant any land or other premises in the council area during the whole of the 12 months preceding that day;
- or had your principal or only place of work in the council area during that same period;
- or have resided in the council area during that 12 month period;
- You can also satisfy the criteria to be elected if you have lived in the council area or within 4.8km of it for the whole of the 12 months preceding the

'relevant date.'

You cannot stand for election if:

- You are the subject of a bankruptcy restriction order or interim order;
- You have, within five years before the day of the election, been convicted in the United Kingdom of any offence and have had a sentence of imprisonment (whether suspended or not) for a period of over three months without the option of a fine;
- You work for the Council you want to become a Councillor for (but you can work for other local authorities that represent the same area).

But I'm too young

Some parish councils also run youth councils, comprising a number of young people representing their local schools and colleges. They are granted their own political forum by having a space and a time to meet and discuss matters that affect them. These youth councils are in direct communication with their parish councils so they can also be involved in decision-making. If there is not a scheme, or a parish youth forum in your community, get together with friends and put a proposal to your local community, parish or town council.

Further information:

Visiting your council is the best way to find out what happens there. Bonsall Parish Council meets on the third Tuesday of each month; give the Clerk a call on 01629 820947 to check the date of the next meeting. The councillor nomination period closes on 9 April - your parish council may be able to supply nomination forms and/or district/ borough contact information.

100 Years Ago

Bonsall Urban District Council responded to the Government's call to form local rifle clubs and Home Guard units. Mr Arkwright of Cromford offered to supply a memorial cross to the village in Derbyshire providing most recruits. The local feeling was that Cromford would win this competition. (Actually, and to everyone's surprise, it was Aston on Trent!).

12 March 1915 brought another death to Bonsall: Fred Barnes, a private in D Company 1st Battalion Sherwood Foresters. He was one of six children who lived on Clatterway with his parents, Samuel and Elizabeth. His father was a quarryman who had been widowed and left with one son, William, before marrying Elizabeth from Ashbourne. Fred attended the Boys School before enlisting in the Regular Army and had seen service with the Sherwood Foresters in India. He left the army before the war to work for James Gregory, a Bonsall farmer and coal merchant on Ember Lane, but was liable to be recalled as part of the reserve and in December 1914 he rejoined the Sherwood Foresters. He was killed three months later at the battle of Neuve Chappelle. Joseph Tomlinson of Chapel Hill Cromford died the same day in this battle. This action was part of a southward extension of the British Army's lines into the coalfields west of Lille. This battle started at 7.30am on 10 March and an advance of 1000 yards was held up by heavy machine gun fire. The Company dug in and were subjected to heavy shell fire with mounting casualties. At 4pm D Company charged the enemy position through withering machine gun fire which caused further losses. Again the troops dug in. On the 12 March at 5am the Germans counter attacked and fierce fighting round the British position resulted in only eight survivors. Fred was not one of them. His family were notified that he was missing and not until September was his death confirmed. His body was never recovered. He was 23. He is remembered in "Our Bonsall Lads" published in December 1915:

"We grieve to think that some have paid the price for glory great, Their precious lives have given to save us Belgium's fate. We think of brave George Bateman, of brave Fred Barnes as well. They nobly did their duty and in the battle fell."

PARISH COUNCIL

Meeting at the Village Hall at 7.30 pm on Tuesday 17 February.

Cllr Ratcliffe reported she had attended a review of winter services – and will provide a briefing paper. The public can access information on which grit bin belongs to which authority through DCC website.

Presentations were made by: Philip Robertson – Western Power, an outline of the work proposed in Bonsall.

Overview of the works planned to start in April in The Dale to remove overhead lines and put the cabling underground. Because the equipment is old and in the main inaccessible, three transformers will be replaced with a ground mounted substation and cabling will be put underground. The new Substation will be located in the Barley Mow car park. 3 transformers will be replaced. Work will start on Monday 13 April for 7 weeks and finish at the end of May. They will return mid-August, either the week commencing the 17th or 24th, to complete the work over 8 weeks. Two-way traffic lights on The Dale during the works and work will take place between 9 am and 3 pm

Steven Radford – Griffie Grange Community Liaison Forum

Overview of project at Griffie Grange: it started on site in Sept 2011 and going to committee on Thursday 25 February, current officers recommendation is to refuse. Application for five turbines – same height as Carsington. Turbines now moved slightly south and one has been removed. The design is in line with the other turbines. Community fund is available for community-based projects available for 5 miles from the site. Chose community based funding projects. £62,000 per year for 15 years. In Brassington this fund is paying for the new recreation area, in Ible a snow plough is being purchased and someone is being employed to clear snow, a bursary is being made available at Anthony Gell School and the Scout Hut is being re-built. Local businesses can bid to parcels of the larger tenders as part of a commitment to local enterprise.

Parish Council are invited to nominate a rep for the Forum Meeting.

Ade Rollinson reported that a Community Land Trust is to be set up in Bonsall. It will be proactive to identify sites for affordable housing and find out who would be interested in affordable housing.

Councillors had an update on times-cales and information for the forthcoming election on 7 May. There is a separate article in this issue about standing as a Parish Councillor and anyone who wants any more information should contact the Clerk for a chat.

Following all the work carried out in the Park Bottom by Pete Spencer and Cllr Barry, the Parish Council is to approach the District Council to find out if an additional rubbish bin can be provided.

The next meeting of Bonsall Parish Council will take place on 17 March at 7.30 at the village hall. The Annual Parish Meeting will take place at 7pm on 19 May. 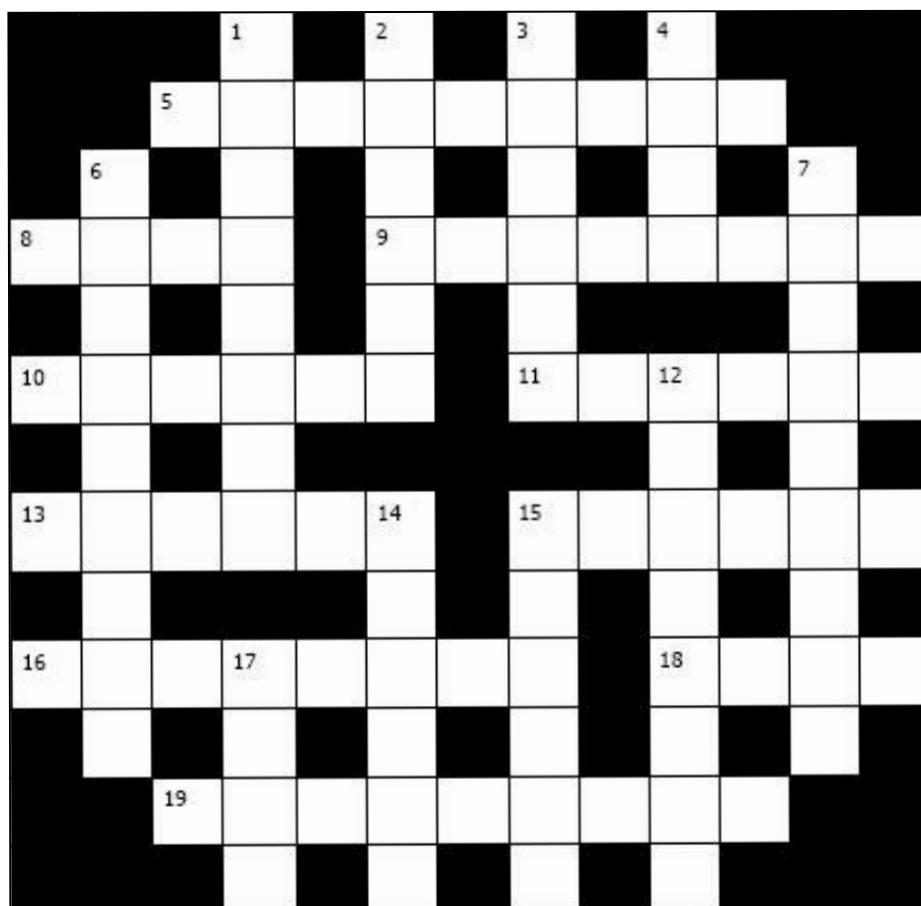

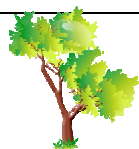
