Well the answer is that life is difficult no matter who you are, there is still pain and difficulty and heartbreak whether you put your faith in God or you don't. In fact if you have ever been told that becoming a Christian will make all the problems in your life go away, then I am afraid you have been lied to. The bible doesn't say that. But the truth is this, when we go through the mess of life GOD IS WITH US.

We love to read Psalm 23 where it says 'The Lord is my shepherd... He makes me lie down in green pastures, that wonderful sense of peace and that everything is easy. But we sometimes forget that the same psalm also says 'Even though I walk through the vallev of the shadow of death.' The writer paints this picture, that as sheep we WILL spend time in green pastures, but they WILL also spend time in the valley. Life is awesome, life is tough. BUT THE SHEPHERD IS ALWAYS WITH US.

Carnival Finance Update

We had quite a good year in terms of finances for the year to 31 October 2015. The actual costs incurred in running the Carnival week itself were £3790 with income from stalls, collections. programmes, events and advertising bringing in £2592, so overall there was a net cost of £1198. This was a good improvement on the previous year's net cost of £1855. A key element of being able to hold the Carnival each year is the essential fundraising that provides the finance to cover the costs that are incurred over the Carnival week itself. Last year the Easter Draw raised £838, stewarding at Matlock Bath illuminations raised £500, with a donation received of £678. Without the support from the volunteers and friends of the Carnival and donations from within the village throughout the year we would not have sufficient income to hold the Carnival. Many thanks to all who helped and contributed. Our next fundraising event is the Easter Draw. Please support this, and remember every ticket you buy will provide the funding to enable us to go ahead and plan another successful week of Carnival events in 2016.



100years ago

In spring 1915, enlistments averaged 100,000 men per month, but this could not be sustained. The upper age limit was raised from 38 to 40 in May 1915 in an effort to keep the numbers up, but it had become clear that voluntary recruitment was not going to provide the numbers of men required.

The government passed the National Registration Act on 15 July 1915 as a step towards stimulating recruitment and to discover how many men between the ages of 15 and 65 were engaged in each trade. All those in this age range who were not already in the military were obliged to register, giving details of their employment. The results of this census became available by mid-September 1915: it showed there were almost 5 million males of military age who were

not in the forces, of which 1.6m were in "starred" (protected, high skill) jobs.

On 11 October 1915, Lord Derby

was appointed Director-General of Recruiting. He brought forward a scheme five days later, always called the Derby Scheme, for raising the numbers. Men aged 18 to 40 were told that they could continue to enlist voluntarily, or attest with an obligation to come if called up. The War Office notified the public that voluntary enlistment would soon cease and that the last day of registration would be 15 December 1915. The men who registered under the Derby Scheme were classified into married and single, and into 23 groups according to their age. Group 1 was for single 18 year-olds, then by year up to Group 23 for single 40's; then Group 24 was for married 18 vear-olds up to Group 46 for married 40's. Men who attested under the Derby Scheme were sent back to their homes and jobs until they were called up. They wore a grey armband with a red crown as a sign that they had so volunteered. At the same time, a war pension was introduced, to help entice men concerned about supporting their dependents given the increasingly apparent chance that they may not survive.

215,000 men enlisted while the scheme was on and another 2,185,000 attested for later enlistment – but 38% of single men and 54% of marrieds who were not in "starred" jobs had still avoided this form of recruitment. Their reticence did much to hasten a move to full conscription. Voluntary attestation reopened on 10 January 1916, while the government considered the position.

Call up under the Derby Scheme began: Groups 2 to 5 were called up in the last two weeks of January 1916, and Groups 6 to 13 in February. The last single groups other than the 18 year-olds were called up in March. This last batch were called up in parallel to the first men to be summoned under conscription. The recruits were not necessarily posted to their local regiments and from this time on it is not wise to assume that a man would go into his local regiment.

A system of appeals tribunals was established, to hear cases of men who believed they were disqualified on the grounds of ill-health, occupation or conscientious objection. In Bonsall the Urban District Council formed the Military Tribunal. The Act failed

to deliver: only 43,000 men called up qualified for general service in the army. Another 93,000 failed to appear when called up, filling the courts. 748,587 men claimed some form of exemption, in addition to the 1,433,827 already "starred" as being in a war occupation, or ill. The manpower of the army never caught up with its planned establishment. **Peter Greaves**

Lorry Park

The lorry park has been transformed! In a short space of time, and thanks to a wonderful group of volunteers the lorry park has received a much needed make-over. Overgrowth has been cut back and thanks to the generosity of some local businesses new stone has been laid to make a more even, clean surface. This would not have been possible without Peter Spencer, who has done a tremendous job of cutting down self-seeded trees and bushes to open up the path from the lorry park to the church yard and school. He was aided by his trusted apprentice, Councillor Jon Barry, and the pair have now formed an unbreakable bond. Thanks to the Parish council, and in particular Mark Harris, who has been involved in the physical clearing of the site and co-ordinating the work - not an easy task! Thanks also to Rick Jones, Mick Hewitt and Sam Hopkinson. A huge thank you to all who helped in some way but this would not have been possible without Jono, Will and George of Valley View Landscapes who donated their time and machinery free of charge to clear the area and lav new stone. This, along with the donation of the stone from Ben Bennett Inr Ltd at Grange Mill, thanks to Nichola Bacon (nee Marshall) who arranged this, and Richard and Brett Taylor who collected and delivered it free of charge.

The next step is to rebuild the wall and we have been approached by someone who will do this for a fraction of the costs quoted, because it is for the village. The replacement gate has been paid for and

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is awaiting collection and the last but definitely not the least thing to do is for Ron to choose the rose bushes to replace the ones that died by the roadside, and for some signage to be placed at the entrance. This area is known locally as the lorry park because many years ago, the village being built around the mining, weaving and construction industries, the drivers would bring the lorries home and park there because as time progressed, vehicles got larger and they could no longer be parked near the drivers' homes. It was strongly felt that this should still be the case, and the vehicles that park there do pay an amount to the church to use it. It is also a useful area for deliveries to the local farmers, where access is

out of harms way and the final bit of the journey completed by tractor and trailer. It is also cheaper for them to club together and buy a big load.

Whilst it is a useful area for short term parking of vehicles, we must not let it become a dumping ground as had happened in the past. We would be grateful if the owner of the trailer that has been left there would claim it. A bin has also appeared so there is no excuse for littering.

Now the area is fit to use, we hope that parents with children at the school will use it to park whilst bringing and collecting children to and from school. This would mean that the congestion on Church Street would be alleviated, and parking near the school would be available for mums with children at the school who also have babies or toddlers. We also hope that any walkers to the area not only use the park, but will patronise our two excellent hostelries and the Fountain Café and shop, and this will help ease the parking congestion around the fountain area. Bonsall has always been a proactive community, and this has demonstrated that perfectly. Thanks all.

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Parish Council Report

Bonsall Parish Council met on 19 January at 7.30pm at Bonsall Village Hall.

Cllr Harris provided feedback from his recent site visit with Mick Biggin the Clerk to investigate issues and concerns raised by residents, which were as follows:

Tree growth causing headstones to shift -

Mark reported that he didn't discover any evidence that the shifting gravestones are as a result of tree growth, although there are trees in the area. Some headstones do need repair however.

Branches dropping from the large lime trees along the Church Street Wall -

Cllr Harris reported that the trees are massive and there is no practical way of reducing them other than removing them all together. They do have a natural life span. A resident has already planted replacements.

Flooding on High Street -

All councillors voiced their thanks for the work carried out by Cllr Ratcliffe in trying to resolve the issues surrounding the flooding on High Street. Cllr Ratcliffe has provided a grit bin and has also been out trying to clear the ice as well. The issue is still to be resolved as until the tests come back to identify if it is water from the reservoir or run off from the field remedial action cannot be taken. The Parish Council appreciates this is a worry for a number of residents and are doing everything possible to ensure action is taken as promptly as possible.

Village Matters:

Casual Vacancy: There are currently 2 casual vacancies on Bonsall Parish Council. If anyone has an interest in becoming a Parish Councillor you can either chat to one of the existing councillors (their details are above) or the Clerk for more information on what is involved (see adjacent advert).

Public Toilets: The Clerk is waiting for quotes from electricians to fit timed locks and the Parish Council hope these will be in place by the Spring.

Park Working Group:

a) Cllr Harris reported back on all the activity in the Park, starting by expressing his thanks on behalf of the Parish Council for all the contributions of time and materials from everyone involved and in particular Jonathan Rickards and his family, Brett Taylor, Rick Jones, Pete Spencer, Sam Bradley and Ron Addis. So much marvellous work has been undertaken and Councillors were overwhelmed by the generosity of everyone who has offered their expertise, materials or time and often refused payment altogether. He hopes that the work done will be enjoyed by the community as well as visitors and added it had been pleasure to be involved in a project that was so well supported.

b) Since the last meeting, there has been a lot of activity. Some work started mid-December. Volunteers met to clear boulders, trees and general debris. The majority of the work took place on the afternoon of Saturday 16 January when Jonathon Rickards and a number of volunteers scraped the surface. 2 loads of stone for the surfacing were delivered on Friday afternoon. Stone to be flattened during the coming weeks and

the new gate and sign will be installed shortly. Tony will set up the work for the wall builder and organise the buying of roses once Ron has been consulted.

Councillors would like to remind ALL residents that dogs MUST be kept on leads in the park. Fines can be and are being issued. Please keep your dogs on leads.

Street signs and map -

Cllr Henderson presented a map of the village with his review of street signs. He has restricted his review to postal addresses in the village prioritising these over pathways.

At the Cross, the High Street, Yeoman Street, Clatterway and Black Tor Road signs need replacing.

There are no signs currently for Pounder Lane or the at top of High Street coming into the village.

The Abel Lane sign by Hollies Farm needs repairing.

Cllr Henderson will work with the officer at District responsible for street signs to resolve these areas.

FINANCE

Precept 2016/17 – The 'precept' is the portion of funding Bonsall Parish Council receive each year to carry out their work in the parish. The precept comes to the Parish out of the pot of money the District Council receive as Council tax. Each year Bonsall Parish Council review their spending plans and set the precept as the amount of money they will receive from residents council tax – the vast majority of money spent in the parish comes from you which is why Councillors are always keen to hear your view on how money should be spent. This year Councillors voted once again not to increase the precept.

Grant Applications - Bonsall Parish Council holds a fund of money for community projects and their first application received for this fund was from Big Theatre Company which operates from Bonsall School during the holidays and offers young people the opportunity to get involved with all aspects of developing and performing a professional theatre production. They had applied for £500 towards a total of 5 subsidised places and a contribution to publicity costs which Councillors voted to grant on the condition that the subsidies were offered to children from the village rather than those who were from other areas.

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
