I wondered if the Watson family's letter in the March Mutterings would get any response. Here is mine. I discovered in 2013 that a friend in London supplemented her income by carrying out traffic speed checks. Her gear is rather more advanced than the usual display of warning notices, reflective clothing and wielded phazar guns. You set it up, leave it and return later to plug it into your computer. She came to Bonsall for a few days in January 2014 and brought her gear too.

Results?:

Clatterway: up traffic, vehicles cresting the top (and narrowest bit) hitting 40 mph. Down traffic, 40+ mph.

Black Tor Rd. to the bottom of The Dale: vehicles getting past 40 mph by the entrance to the lorry park and some entering The Dale at 40–50 mph.

From the Moor into the village: downhill past the junction of Uppertown Lane at 30–40 mph.

The scariest result (to me!) was on a Monday morning: from the Fountain monument to the wooden post at the Kings Head car park, some vehicles actually got up to 40 mph. This was in the ten minutes before 9.00 am – late for school?

These are the speeds of a variety of vehicles driving around and through Bonsall. Some travelled at 30 mph and below. I am sure that most will have been driven by Bonsall people – but probably not the Monday morning rush.

Stop Press: Buses!

Derbyshire County Council is proposing to withdraw all subsidised bus services in October 2017, which will include our Bonsall bus. There is a consultation questionnaire that needs to be filled in by Sunday 24 April 2016. It's important that everyone who cares about retaining our bus service fills it in (it is available from libraries or online at www.derbyshire.gov.uk/transportchanges) and also writes letters to the council and the government (our Derbyshire MP, Patrick McLoughlin, is after all Minister of Transport).

This consultation has been in process since February 17, but I've only recently heard about it and almost nobody I've spoken to in the village has heard about it. I've just visited our mobile library and was appalled to find they'd only been given two questionnaires to 'distribute'! The mobile library only comes once a month. It will be visiting many of the villages that will be hardest hit by this change and accessing many of the people most likely to use the bus service. It can hardly be called a 'consultation'.

We all know that the bus is sometimes under-used, but the removal of village bus services would mean that the people who rely on it most would be cut off from any form of independent life. It would affect shopping, attending classes, visiting libraries, going swimming, getting to the doctors, dentist, optician, meeting friends, connecting with more 'main line' public transport, even withdrawing money from the bank! The list is endless ... and frightening. It would of course affect older people the most – both psychologically and practically. Even people who drive at the moment are probably reassured that public transport is available when they can no longer drive, choose not to, or in an emergency. Travelling on public transport is a social experience – sometimes the only regular contact people have with others.

I don't drive myself and now I'm getting older I'm even more dependent on the bus service. I fear the possibility of its loss. It would mean that if one doesn't drive or, is no longer able to drive, that living independently in a Derbyshire village is no longer viable.



Today there are nearly 17,000 searches each month on the Trusted Trader website by people looking for reliable companies to use. Another endorsement for the scheme was a recent survey which gathered feedback from more than 16,000 people who had used a Trusted Trader and 94% said they were very satisfied with the service they received. So people can have confidence when employing one of the 1,200 traders who are part of the scheme. Help is at hand

in the very unlikely event of someone having a problem with one of the traders. DCC trading standards officers can get involved in any queries involving Trusted Traders and seek to resolve them

The scheme particularly helps to protect older and vulnerable adults by making it easier for them to use Trusted Traders rather than rogue traders who typically cold-call and use high pressure sales techniques. A recent development has been the inclusion of Financial Advisors who specialise in providing financial advice for people in later life and can help with matters like care fees, pensions and investments.

100 YEARS AGO

No Soldiers Killed This Month. **Applications For Exemption From Conscription Heard**

In 1911 the Pavilion opened in Matlock Bath as an entertainment centre. One of the entertainments was a roller skating rink, which attracted Harry Gill, 15, who stole eight pairs of roller skates and £1 from the Pavilion. He was caught and the children who received the skates, together with their parents, appeared in the police court. From Bonsall this included Stanley Gratton (13); his father Thomas Gratton of Church Street; Arthur Gratton (11) of Coldside The Dale; Archie Knowles (11) of Yeoman Street; George Cotterill (17) living with his grandfather and mother on High Street, a grocer's assistant; Arthur Bunting (13) and his father Reuben Bunting of Yeoman Street, the blacksmith. Reverend Taggart and Councillor C. F. White spoke for the families and they were all bound over to keep the peace for six months in the sum of five pounds, and all the boys were given a severe warning.

Whilst the Council had approved £15 for snow clearing in March further snow resulted in another £21 being spent. In April complaints about the state of Ember Lane were heard and a roof was put on the TB (tuberculosis) shelter to provide isolation facilities for sufferers. The road repairer, William Slater, of Greenhill, applied for 3/- a yard for breaking stone (6d to 1/getting, 1/9 - breaking). Plans for additions to Hollins Mills in the Via Gellia were considered. The Overseers were appointed. Cllr Arthur Harrison, shopkeeper at the Cross, was elected Chairman.

The Council convened as the Military Tribunal to consider the following cases. Their own Clerk, Mr Nixon, although not a resident, applied for exemption from conscription. As his employers, the Councillors had great difficulty in dealing with this objectively. Mr Nixon had been persuaded to apply by some of the Councillors although he was willing to join up. It was agreed to send it to another tribunal with a recommendation, as a public official, to exempt. However at their next meeting the Clerk announced he was joining the army next Monday. This caused consternation and a feeling that their heartache and agonising had been in vain. Nearly as embarrassing was the application by Harold Smith, 27, married, and living at Bonsall Moor Farm, Brightgate, where he farmed 127acres. He was the son-in-law of the chairman, who vacated the chair. The Tribunal granted six months exemption.

The Company at Hollins Mill sought an exemption for an employee, George A. Sheldon, 19, a fettler who lived on Puddle Hill with his widowed mother. However they did have another fettler, Swift, and if they had to choose would prefer Sheldon to be conscripted. He was granted a onemonth exemption from the date of his birthday. Mr Key, for Via Gellia colour mills, supported the application by Harry Massey, 22, a married engine driver living on High Street. Harry had attested (agreed to serve if called) as had 53 out of 54 employees at the colour works. 13 were actually serving. Harry was granted a 3 months exemption.

Cllr. Pountain was elected as Vice Chair. The updated details for your Parish Councillors can be found in Mutterings, on the website and on the noticeboard at the Cross. Do contact them if you have any issues you wish to raise with the Parish Council.

Robert Coggins, Head of Housing at DDDC, attended the meeting to provide some background information on the planning application for affordable housing at the site in Uppertown. He outlined the history of development of affordable housing for the last 13 years. DDDC has been creating small groups of houses in similar villages for local people, trying to source labour and materials locally. Two applications have been made for the site in Bonsall. Mostly there is opposition to the project so far. DDDC has made two calls for land for affordable housing, asking for people with suitable land to put it forward. Twelve families in Bonsall are currently registered with a housing need. The housing would be allocated to people with a clear five-year connection to the village. This is the local benefit of having the exception site status – in return for giving up some of the local green space the reward is that affordable housing is available and local people get priority. It does not fall under the same rules of housing allocation where people from further afield can be given priority. He reported that of the 6 or 7 sites which had been submitted in response to the call for land and were independently assessed, the only suitable site was the land at Chestnut Farm. Robert addressed the allegation of DDDC wasting

public money with the application. He explained that £3,318 was spent for the legal challenge as the District Council consented to the planning application being quashed and withdrawn without prejudice in January 2014. This was after the challengers to the application contended that the approach in the officer's report was contrary to the proper application of the duty in s 72 Planning (Listed Building and Conservation Areas) Act 1990 as outlined in the case of R (Forge Field Society) v Sevenoaks DC [2014] EWHC 1895 (Admin), where the permission was quashed. This meant that as the application would be likely to be quashed, advice from the District Council's barrister was that it would be the most cost-effective solution for the Council to agree, thereby minimising expenditure for all parties and affording the Council the ability to redetermine the application in due course. In addition the planning application had cost DDDC £1925. He stressed that in the 13 years of developing affordable housing, DDDC had developed a sensitive approach to local environments.

Several members of the public put forward questions:

- **Q.** If 6 or 7 sites were submitted, how did people hear that they were supposed to submit?
- **A.** Landowners, agents, building contractors etc. were all asked to submit sites in two rounds.
- **Q.** How were the landowners contacted?
- **A.** Public and open process through the local plan which anyone can access and is advertised via residents' newsletters, news reports, websites and the Parish Council.

Q. Why should the plan be approved this time round as nothing seems to have changed?

- **A.** It was approved by the Council but challenged in the judicial process on a technical point. DDDC consented to the plan being withdrawn as a costeffective solution but 'without prejudice' meaning the application could be re-submitted as and when the technical issue had been resolved. The withdrawal happened in January 2015, the District Council believe they have addressed the issue and the application has been made again.
- **Q.** Which planning meeting will it be decided at?
- **A.** Likely to go to the April or May Planning meeting at District Council.
- **Q.** Residents commented that the owner of the site had already sold the land to DDDC. They still feel that other sites haven't been considered.
- A. Rob assured them that DDDC would not have bought the land prior to planning permission being granted for the affordable housing scheme to go ahead. He reiterated that 6 or 7 sites have been looked at throughout the village and DDDC hasn't bought the land because it will only buy land once planning permission is granted otherwise it will have bought land it can't use for anything. It is possible that terms might have been agreed but no contracts have been exchanged. They have an option to buy subject to planning consent.
- **Q.** If 12 residents in Bonsall are in housing need, and five of them are guaranteed the housing in Bonsall will those five eventually have the right to buy? Will that remove the rental accommodation on the list in the future?

PARISH COUNCIL

A. That is an issue that is currently been looked at nationally, but it's likely that there will be protection for rural areas. An aim is that the tenant would be offered a suitable alternative out of the rural area because their housing would have been reduced. However that is about government policy and it's impossible to predict what that will be in the future.

Q. Will the affordable houses be for Bonsall people?

A. When a site is an exception site it can only be used for people with a five-year association with that village. A condition will be applied to say that the five houses will only be used for people from Bonsall. If five Bonsall families want these properties they will be guaranteed priority even over people from adjoining parishes.

Councillors discussed the planning application and voted six to one to object to the application on the following grounds: the development will change the character of the conservation area. Specifically, the concerns are that vehicle access is inadequate, the height of the buildings will be inappropriate, and the 'close' development is out of character for the area as the houses do not face the road. Finally the materials being proposed are not in keeping with the area.

Colette Dewhurst from the Barley Mow asked to let the meeting know that due to problems with the installation of the electricity substation and a larger plinth being needed to house the substation, they have had to make an amendment to their planning application for the brewery, but it is simply to change the positions slightly and there are no other changes planned for the application.

Mark Sobey volunteered to join the Christmas tree working party – Cllr. Barry will be inviting anyone interested in joining the Christmas tree committee to a meeting via a future edition of Mutterings.

Work on the bus shelter project should be starting imminently.

H. Strange have been contracted to fit timed locks to the public toilets which will enable them to be brought back into use and hopefully keep the problem of vandalism to a minimum.

Two metre benches for the bus stop at Uppertown and the top of The Dale are to be purchased from TDP in Wirksworth and the Clerk is to investigate the potential for installing a bench at Nether Green.

The Parish Council was pleased to confirm its support for the Carnival Committee being able to create a temporary storage area somewhere in the village or close by and would welcome a funding application to help purchase it if needed.

Cllr. Harris reported back from the Quarry Liaison meeting that the issues of lorries leaving the quarry on Cromford Hill without wheels being washed was being addressed so that less mud should be left on the local roads.

The Parish Council has set up a working party to investigate and make recommendations on any potential new burial ground. Cllr. Addis will chair the group and the Parish Council welcomes any residents to join the group and participate in this important project. The first meeting of the group will be held on Tuesday 19 April at 6.45 pm in the Village Hall. The next Parish Council meeting will be held on Tuesday 19 April at 7.30 pm. Agenda items to the Clerk by Friday 8 April please. The Annual Parish Meeting will be held on May 17.


