

The lorry park looks fantastic, a massive improvement on before, and this has

been thanks to a small group of people who have donated materials, time and machinery to get the area to this standard.

During the improvements, concerns were raised about the area being abused once it was finished. The idea was to encourage short-term parking – free of charge I might add – to parents dropping off children at school and collecting them later. Also short-term parking for visitors who hopefully would patronise businesses in the village. It was also of importance to keep the area available for lorry parking, and again the vehicles pay a fee to use the area, and they are not parked permanently. It is also used by our farmers when they have large deliveries and access to the farms is impossible for a lorry.

So imagine my disgust, and that of a large number of others who have contacted me, that as predicted, the area has indeed been abused. Suddenly we have what resembles a gypsy camp. I find it difficult to comprehend how anyone would think it is acceptable to buy a caravan, have nowhere to park it at their own property and think it is OK to park free of charge in the lorry park. There are plenty of purpose-built parks where you can store caravans and motor-homes but obviously at a cost. As part of the clean-up there was a trailer that had to be disposed of as no-one came forward to claim it – dumped obviously.

Residents' thoughts on this matter would be welcome.

The lorry park has recently been improved at cost to the Parish Council and by the efforts of villagers. The aim was to

encourage drivers to park in the car park rather than park around The Fountain, making the roads safer for our children and to help cater for village events, funerals etc.

Unfortunately, the improvements have attracted motor-homes, caravans, broken down vehicles and dumped trailers. At half-term, the car park was used by holidaymakers and there are now motor-homes being used for regular overnight stays. Most of these vehicles are permanently stored there.

This message is not directed to those who have proper permission, but to those who do not have express permission to store vehicles at the Park.

Now that summer is here, there are a number of village events which will be using the car park (e.g. the Carnival in five weeks' time). All of these vehicles must be removed asap so that the car park can be used and enjoyed properly. It will be grossly unfair if the fundraisers in the village have to spend their hard earned money in removing the abandoned trailers etc. Can everyone please make an effort to clear the car park.

Casualties and Exemptions

There were three Military Tribunals held in July against the backdrop of the offensive on the Somme. At the first, Charles Gratton, 36, Hollowbrook with 5 children applied as a lead miner and bricklayer, and was granted an exemption of three months although it was observed that he was "not really a lead miner" (He was shown as a quarryman in the 1911 census). Harry Bunting, 40, from the Dale married and a jobber in the cotton factory gassing room was adjudged unfit.

Arthur Allsop, 30, from High Street applied on his own account and with his employer, Councillor William Potter, Bank Farm. He had his own farm of 18 ac and at 6 am each day milked the cows from Potter's 26 ac. His brother, Leonard, was in the Forces. He was granted six months' exemption.

Joseph Slack, 18, was applied for by his father, Joseph Slack of Puddle Hill Farm with 94 ac. He had one son, William, in the Forces already and a three months' exemption was granted.

Frank Herbert Loxley, 36, married with 6 children, oldest 14, was the former landlord of the Fountain, but was now a carter and farmed 15 ac of which he mowed 8.5 acres. He suffered with rheumatics. He was given two weeks to attend a Medical Board.

Matlock Mines applied for Herbert Fearn (again) and he was given another 14 days

to apply for a badge exempting him because he was on war work. At the Tribunal two weeks later he had still not applied and was given another 14 days to apply for a badge. Also at this Tribunal Frank Herbert Loxley was found medically fit for overseas duty but not for general service. He was fit for a labour unit or garrison duty but he was granted three months' exemption to complete his mowing.

Mrs Rains, Wigley Meadow Farm, Grangemill applied for Francis James Roper 18, who had lived at the Old Miners Standard on High Street. Despite having 18 ac in Bonsall she "Should apply to Bakewell".

At the end of the month Herbert Fearn produced his war service Badge but not the certificate.

Henry Massey, 22, married worked at the Via Gellia Colour Company as an engine tenter. He had received a three month exemtion from April and now he applied on medical grounds but this was rejected, although he was given, two months' exemption to teach his replacement at the works.

Charles Hodgkinson 32, married with four children, had a previous exemption of two months. Derby Labour exchange confirmed no-one was available to do his work as a carter. He was given two months' exemption but must drill with the volunteers.

Samuel Rowland of Uppertown applied for his son Frank Rowland, 26, "helping with the hay, his grandfather was 79". Six weeks' exemption granted.

George Ernest Knowles, 31, applied because of his wife's ill-health and was granted exemption until 31 August.

Inevitably, with so many recruits in the Sherwood Foresters, and battalions from that regiment being in the first wave of the Somme offensive on 1st July 1916, there were several casualties on that day. Frank Sheldon, 20, previously working in the Bonsall Wood Basalt Quarry behind the Pig o'Lead, and living in Uppertown, was a private in the 1/6th Battalion Sherwood Foresters and had enlisted with his brother Thomas in early 1915. He had only been at the front for seven weeks when he participated in a diversionary attack. This bogged down in mud in the trenches and under heavy artillery fire. His commanding officer ordered his men not to go over the parapet. But owing to a mistake a party of 20 men, including Frank, did leave the trench and were killed immediately. The notification of his death came from his platoon commander to the landlady in Luton that he had lodged with, and she forwarded it to Reverend Taggart who was given the unenviable task of informing his mother, Clara.

Jim Banks, 30, who lived at Horsedale and worked in a limestone quarry and enlisted early in the war in the Sherwood Foresters before becoming a private in the 2nd Battalion Lancashire Fusiliers. He went missing in action on July 1st 1916 during the Somme advance. He was later reported as having been killed. He had married in 1911 and left his wife, Emily (ne Holmes),34, and three children; his son James Eric born 30 August 1915

never saw his father. Emily remarried and became Emily Allsop.

Bill Farnesworth was a pupil teacher at Bonsall School and at Ripley. He had been a scholarship winner and in November 1914 was reported as being with the Sherwood Foresters at Ludworth Camp as a sergeant. In May 1916 he had been on leave visiting his father Albert, the Council Surveyor, in The Dale but was expected to be back at the front for his birthday on 28th May 1916. Five weeks later he was dead. His parents received a posthumous Military Medal on his behalf. He is not on the War memorial.

Tom Worth was the son of James Worth an ex-soldier and policeman. He was born in Stockport and was brought up by his mother, a fourth generation Bonsall girl, Maria (Mira or Myra) Elizabeth Worth (ne Cotterill) and her parents at Nether Green. He had been a regular soldier, having enlisted at the age of 18 and completed seven years service in May 1914. He re-enlisted before war broke out with the 1st Battalion Sherwood Foresters and was in India. The bat-

talion came directly from India to fight at Loos (September 1915) and Hill 60. He was on leave October 1915 with souvenirs of the fighting. The 1st Foresters did not attack on the Somme until 5th July. Their advance resulted in close fighting and they were driven back; their advance had collided with an attack by the Prussian Guards. He died of his severe wounds in the Puchevillers Casualty Clearing Station, north east of Amiens on July 7th 1916. He was 28. His death was reported in The High Peak News of August 6th, along with his photograph.

John Thomas and Ann Rowland moved from Uppertown to The Cross. Their third son Tom, aged 22, was a private in the

the Midland Railway as a platelayer. He had been shot in the leg by a sniper at the Battle of Loos and spent six weeks recovering in London. He survived the first attack by the battalion on the Somme between 2nd and 4th July 1916. On the 7th July they were ordered into shell holes prior to an assault .The rain was incessant and the artillery fire intense. When the advance was ordered over heavy ground it was ragged and unsuccessful and Thomas was severely wounded. He died of his wounds at the 38th Casualty Clearing Station at Heilly on July 11th 1916. His older brother Henry, 24, had enlisted with Thomas and was in the 11th Battalion Sherwood Foresters. He had also been platelayer on the Midland Railway. Their battalion attacked on the first day and suffered 518 casualties. They were withdrawn from the line and moved north where they received four drafts of men from other regiments to bring them back to strength. They entrained on the 15th July and entered the trenches near Albert on July 29th. They were met by heavy shell fire and Henry Rowland was killed eighteen days after his brother. One cannot imagine the grief experienced by the Rowland family losing two sons in quick succession and their anxiety with a younger son, Herbert, 18, about to join the Army. He survived the war.

It is not surprising, given the number of deaths of Bonsall men on the Somme, that traditional village activities should have been affected. At the end of July 1916, as usual, it was the annual Bonsall Wakes Week, although the High Peak News was reporting that "it doesn't much look like it. The only festivities are the merry-gorounds in the Park. The old wakes parade is abandoned for the War."

PARISH COUNCIL

Meeting of the Parish Council on June 21

The Parish Council met on June 21 at the Village Hall. DCC Cllr. Ratcliffe had attended a walk around Uppertown and The Dale to look at the state of the roads. Some potholes had been attended to and the requests for resurfacing Slaley Lane and Bankside have been made, although this is unlikely to happen in the near future. Cllr. Katcliffe reiterated her advice that potholes should be directly reported to DCC via their online form and Cllr Grover affirmed this saying he had reported some at the top of Clatterway which had been dealt with quickly.

Councillors will be discussing options at the Parish Council meeting in July for reinstating the street light on Uppertown Lane which DCC turned off in 2013. DCC has stated that they are not prepared to reinstate the light, even if the Parish Council pay the cost of reinstatement and the ongoing costs.

The Parish Council voted to make a grant of £500 to Bonsall School for the forthcoming production of 'A Midsummer Night's Dream' to take place as part of William Shakespeare's 400-year anniversary.

The Parish Council will be making a representation regarding the bus service as follows: the Council believes that the bus service forms an essential service supporting village life; however councillors recognise that it may be more cost-effective to reduce the service to a two-hourly instead of an hourly one.

The Church steps and handrail are to be replaced as part of maintenance work to be carried out by DCC. It is hoped that this will be done before the Carnival takes place. Councillors discussed the village parking area at Park Bottom and expressed their disappointment that the space was not able to be used as intended to clear the congestion around The Fountain because of vehicles being stored there on a long-term basis. Unfortunately this vehicle storage is also leading to problems for some residents who are now no longer able to use the Park for receiving deliveries of supplies, which are made to the Park because of access difficulties.

Councillors will be looking at how this parking situation can be managed in the longer term, but in the meantime ask all residents to be mindful of what the original purpose was behind improving the area and that much time and many materials were donated in good faith to provide a solution for problems, which did not include a need for long-term vehicle storage.

There was a short discussion on how protected species are monitored in the village as slow worms have been discovered at the top of The Dale and around Bankside. Councillors would like to consider how protected species in the village are catalogued and monitored.

The next meeting will be held on July 19 at the Village Hall at 7.30 pm. Please contact one of the Councillors if you have an issue you would like to raise with the Parish Council.

Members of the public are very welcome to attend the meetings and speak during the public participation at the start of the meeting.


