Not Then and Now, then?

Dear Editors, In answer to the question on the front page of October Mutterings, "No, the sketch by Edmund Nieman is not an accurate representation of Bonsall Cross in 1871. However as the original watercolour is signed by him and dated in the bottom left hand corner as "Cross Bonsall Derbyshire"

it is his representation of the area.

The painting which is 18 inches

square recently sold for £6,500.

Edmund John Nieman Snr's (1813-1876) paintings are characterised by great versatility, natural colours, and visual realism, often in the romantic artistic style. Though he especially enjoyed painting the scenery of the Thames and of the River Swale, near Richmond in Yorkshire, many other areas of the British Isles are covered in the corpus of his work. Between 1844 and 1872, he exhibited paintings at a wide range of prestigious galleries. He was ill for a number of years in his later life, and died suddenly at Brixton Hill, Surrey of apoplexy on 15 April 1876.

The main problem is that the cottages at the top of Yeoman Street, replaced in 1896, and opposite the Kings Head, have been completely excluded from the view and replaced with an open area. This gives a false view down Yeoman Street to buildings which never existed. The view towards the Kings Head, Queens Head and Brewery Cottage is not what we see today but the gable end of the building is exactly right with the second floor window onto Horsegate. The pubs were both thriving businesses in 1871 and although the building does have a trade board over the door there has been substantial imagination applied to the view. The cross itself appears to be of drum sections rather than a single pillar and the steps are not as we know them to have been when restoration work has taken place. It may be my age but Horsegate and Greenhill are steeper than depicted. The church spire, apart from the openings between the ornamented bands, renovated in 1863, and the battlemented tower are accurate but not quite in the right place. The horizon/ skyline is misleading. But after all this was an artist painting in the romantic style not a photographic record.

Two weeks later we met Chester the producer, (they are never called Dave or Pete) and he did lots of producer things with a mobile phone and big words that myself and Red 1 nodded to. He then got in a car and drove off into the setting sun. The original idea from those down South was that we should do the show at Bonsall Park Bottom, but after pointing out to our new best mate that, in October, it rains, it is cold and it can even snow up north during that month, the venue was changed to Darley Riding School in Churchtown, Darley Dale. An old friend from our Kirsty's Pony Club days came up trumps and let us borrow the venue for the day. I need to point out here that there is no glamour or money in this TV thing - everything was arranged and scrounged by us at no cost to the TV company. 100 YEARS AGO

Alfred Victor Elliott was born in Beeley in 1893, and was by the age of eight, with his two brothers, in the Bakewell workhouse (now Newholme Hospital). By 1911, he was working as a farm labourer for Robert Gregory and living with him on Yeoman Street. He enlisted in September 1914 in Derby in the 10th battalion Sherwood Foresters. He had leave in March 1916 and spoke of his experiences, including being buried several times in one day by mine explosions. The 10th Battalion fought on the Somme between 2 and 11 July and again in early August. By October they were moving to the front line, east of Albert, facing Le Transloy. The mud was two feet deep. On 5 November they entered the support trenches carrying 40 sandbags each. Overnight they occupied the front line and a raiding party cleared the Germans from some old gun pits. A further advance of 350 yards on the night of 8/9 November was completed in appalling conditions. Alfred was wounded and evacuated to a casualty clearing station where he died on 9 November aged 23.

John Stone was from a longestablished Winster family and had married Emma Loxley from a long established Bonsall family. They had eight children. He was a lead miner in both Winster and Bonsall. His son John junior was born in 1896 and worked for the Midland Railway as a platelayer at Matlock Bath, while living with his parents in Uppertown. He was called up in January 1916 to be a private in the 2nd Battalion Sherwood Foresters. This battalion's first active service was to suppress the Dublin Easter Rising before being sent to France. In mid-September, they attacked a German strongpoint called the Quadrilateral. The four companies of the Battalion advanced at different rates under heavy machine-gun fire into German barbed wire. Their own phone lines were cut and there was a loss of mutual support. They each dug in as far as they had advanced and repulsed a German counter-attack. Between 13 and 17 September the complement of 681 officers and men suffered 438 killed, wounded and missing. John Stone was one of the seriously wounded, with gunshot wounds to his side, and he was moved from the casualty clearing station to the base hospital at Etaples. Eight weeks later he died of his wounds on the 16 November aged 20.

Herbert Holbrook was born in 1887, the second son and fourth child of John William Holbrook and Sarah Ellen (nee Abell). His father was a farmer at Town Head but died in 1898. His mother remarried Erasmus Rains, a farmer, who

continued to work the farm. Herbert went to live with his married sister Ruth Smith at Upper Hackney, where he worked with his brother-in-law, Thomas Smith, as a nurseryman. He may later have worked with his younger brother Leonard as a pageboy at the Royal Hotel, Matlock Bath, but by 1914 was back in Bonsall working with his stepfather. Herbert enlisted in the 8th Battalion North Staffordshire Regiment. They took part in early action on the Somme before moving into Belgium, but by October 1916, they were back on the Somme in and out of the line near Albert in terrible weather; it took 25 hours to travel 3 miles. Casualties mounted from shellfire and German counter-attacks, sickness was prevalent and morale was falling. On 17 November they moved up with the prospect of the 438 men in the battalion attacking Grandecourt at 6 am on 18 November. The ground was a quagmire and a fine sleet was blowing. In this blizzard they passed over the German trenches while their defenders were sheltering in the dugouts. The Battalion was then trapped between the Germans emerging from their dugouts and the German reserve lines. They fought well but were not relieved until 19 November. Only 100 men returned. Herbert was wounded and taken as a prisoner to a German casualty clearing station where he died aged 29. He was buried alongside German soldiers. After the war his mother was given the chance for his body to be recovered but she decided he should remain undisturbed. He was posted as missing and it was not until February 1917 that his death as a POW was confirmed to his family. **Peter Greaves**




Carolling at The King's Head – not the Boar's Head!

PARISH COUNCIL

Meeting of Bonsall Parish Council on Tuesday 18 October.

Cllr Grover had collated a list of noncommercial web links which will be added to the website during the coming month. If you have any additional links to information to be added to the website, please contact the Clerk.

Following some consultation at Bonsall School, ideas are being collected for new play equipment for the Park. Cllrs Williams and Richardson are collecting information, ideas and feedback.

As Christmas is heading towards us quickly, Christmas trees within the village are usually arranged for The Cross (Mark Sobey, Doro Maginnis and Marion Heasman have been arranging this one for a number of years), Uppertown is arranged by Cath Rawas (with help from Mark, Doro and Marion), the trees at Nether Green and the top of The Dale are usually arranged by residents. In previous years some trees have been kindly donated by residents. The Parish Council is always grateful for this and if you have a tree to donate, please contact the Clerk.

Park Lease: The Parish Council voted unanimously to facilitate setting up a Trust in Bonsall to lease the Park, with an option to buy the land from the Diocese of Derby, who currently own the land. As this option needs to be proposed to the Diocese formally, and accepted, the Clerk will write to them with the proposal. The reason the Parish Council feel this is the best option is that a Trust would have a legal obligation to keep the land solely for community use and it would be protected. All responsibility for the land in the future would then rest with the Trust. The success of this will depend on community support for the Trust and

for willing volunteers to step forward. The Parish Council will be circulating information to every household soon about how you can get involved and looks forward to securing the Park for future generations of residents.

As there had been an issue with the planning permission for the project to improve the bus shelter, the Parish Council discussed options for the future of the project. The first option was whether to take over the project entirely, in which case the planning permission would be resolved and would come under the heading of 'permitted development' as the Parish own the bus shelter. The other option was to leave the project as originally intended as a wholly independent project being undertaken on a voluntary basis by Liz Stoppard and Olivia Gerrish and jointly funded by the Parish Council and The Open Gardens project when the £1,000 grant was made for the project in 2014.

Parish Councillors resolved, following a vote, that the Parish Council would not be taking responsibility for the project and that responsibility should remain with Liz Stoppard. This means that work on the project will not continue until planning permission has been granted by Derbyshire Dales District Council.

The next meeting of the Parish Council will take place on 15 November - please contact the Clerk if you have an issue you would like councillors to discuss.


