





Garden and Allotment Notes



Now in the middle of April, the damson blossom on the trees along the road at the bottom of the allotments, is looking wonderful. The Community Orchard we planted when the allotments started, 12 years ago, is really coming into its own now and the next 6 weeks or so will see a succession of plum, pear and apple blossom. If you're interested in fruit trees, a wander round the site at this time of year and again in August and September when the fruit comes, could be very inspiring.

The peas and broad beans are coming through and hopefully all the potatoes will be planted by the beginning of May. Several plot holders plant into "green manure" nowadays, rather than using more traditional fertilizers. They sow nitrogen fixing plants like clover, vetch and wild lupins in the autumn or early spring. which draw nutrients up into the surface layer of soil and shade out weeds. Then before they flower, about this time of year or a bit later, they dig or hoe them in and then plant whatever chosen vegetable, usually later plantings like brassicas or courgettes, into the same ground. It's an interesting process and the results seem to be very good.

And just a thought about delphiniums: The flower spikes won't shoot up until mid-June round here, but it's worth getting as much support round the plants as

soon as possible, partly so it disappears into the foliage as it grows up and partly to protect the plants from the powerful summer winds we seem to get nowadays.

on or be replaced, thanks to the need for nothing I could do about it. As my arms something to scratch a massive derrier on - his not mine! This then involved endless trips down the field to fetch it all out. On one particular occasion hubby, probably ticked off that he had to spend a Saturday afternoon helping to shift it, when he could have been spending time with the love of his life – read motorbike accidently caught the corner of a manhole cover, just through the gate into our field. Not a problem, it was pushed back into place, a bit bent, but to prevent the same mistake happening again I placed a plant pot on it. All was well for a while, until after Rolo had gone to that great stable in the sky, I decided I needed to tidy up once and for all. It was a beautiful day, blue sky, the girls were home with a few friends so there was plenty of laughter and music to boot. So I happily went about my chores, fetching things up with the pickup. I had moved the strategically placed pot so I could drive the truck straddled over it, but then the inevitable happened and I clipped the lid with the inside of the wheel. No problem, I just got out and slid it back. What I did next can only be described as something that only a female of a certain age would do. To check I had replaced it firmly I tapped each corner with my foot, but, instead of putting the weight on my back foot, I leant forward with all my weight on the front. What happened in a split second actually seemed to be in slow motion. 
Harold enlisted in the Manchester regiment before 1914 and was in Ireland when war was declared. The regiment disembarked at Le Harve on 17 August 1914 in time to participate in the retreat from Mons and the stand at Le Cateau on the 25 August. Heavy shellfire on shallow trenches caused many casualties including Harold being wounded. He recovered and re-joined his unit for the Gallipoli campaign and thereafter was transferred to the 19th Battalion for service in France. By March 1917 the Germans were making an orderly withdrawal to the Hindenberg Line. Probing attacks were repulsed by the Germans operating from strong points. Snipers were holding up the advance. During one of these attempts, on 1 April 1917 Harold was severely wounded and evacuated to a casualty station where he died the next day. He was 23.

The Derbyshire Times for Saturday 21 April reported "Bonsall Artilleryman wounded. An intimation has reached Bonsall that Gunner G Ernest Knowles, Royal Field Artillery, of Uppertown, Bonsall has been wounded in the leg and wrist. Gunner Knowles who is 32 years of age is a married man with two children. He was employed as a mason at Bonsall before enlisting last July. He crossed the Channel towards the end of last year." George was the eldest of the three children of John and

being a stone mason. He survived the war. On Sunday 22 April 1917 a memorial service was held for Frank Buckley, with the home guard contingent present. Again, the flags of England and Allies were displayed and the altar dressed in purple. A muffled peal of bells rang out.

On a less meritorious note of self-help feeding, Charles Allsop and Harold Smith were fined £1 each for shooting two pheasants. They had neither gun nor game licences. Harold lived at Bonsall Moor Farm and had been exempted from conscription by the Military Tribunal. He was the son-in-law of Cllr. Charles Allsop, Chairman of the Military Tribunal.

Food shortages were becoming apparent and newspapers were carrying pledges like the one illustrated. The Rogation Day procession was led to the allotments opposite the Rectory, then to those in Uppertown and finally to the Dale as a reminder for the need to produce more food locally.

Meetings of the Parish Council

Bonsall Parish Council Special Meeting 4 April 2017:

Closure of the Via Gellia at Cromford: this meeting was to update on the proposed closure of the Via Gellia from 8 May 2017 to 26 June 2017. It was confirmed by County Councillor Ratcliffe that on 30 March 2017 the County Council's

Strategic Director Economy Transport and Community Mike Ashworth had taken the executive decision to not allow the closure for those dates.

He had asked the contractors to submit a revised working arrangement that significantly reduced the time needed for closure, and asked them to resubmit for dates in September. This had followed a Parish/ District/County Council meeting on 28 March 2017 when the project manager had been questioned on the plans.

The main changes to the situation were that the current retaining wall had been assessed as structurally sound at present but that the design method meant that this is only short-term (3-5 years) and it will need to be rebuilt during that timeframe; (the new structure would have 100-120 year design life)

Also the District Council had said that they were open to an application to vary the current planning permission for the work, which is currently time limited to 19 July 2017, and would look flexibly at that.

The next steps are that the company will need to submit an application for extension of the planning permission to the District Council. The company would then have to prepare a Traffic Management Plan, which would be assessed by the County Council before any Traffic Management Permit is issued for September. The Parish Council will be kept updated on developments.

Bonsall Parish Council Meeting 18 April 2017

The Park: the Diocese are going to consider the future of the park, and the vehicle park in particular, at their Business Meeting on 27 April 2017 and the Bishop's Council 26 June 2017. In the meantime returns of the questionnaires are welcome, and the future of the park area will be the main topic for discussion at the Annual Parish Meeting on 16 June 2017.

The Churchyard: a joint PCC/Parish Council working party has been looking at responsibility for the various areas of the churchvard. The Parish Council

maintain the current open cemetery, and the District Council maintain a closed section of the churchyard to the right of the lych gate. The central old closed area is where records are less clear; the Parish Council has carried out the grass cutting for many years, and is refunded by the District Council for that work, but it appears that formal responsibility for the land has never left the Parochial Church Council. The issue is important in order to establish responsibility for problems such as the trees adjacent to Church Street. A report on the findings has gone to the Diocese and the District Council for their comments.

Public WC: the District Council have said that they will no longer maintain the village toilets at their expense due to the need to make budget savings. They are currently managed by the District but cleaned via the Parish Council. The Parish Council will be discussing taking over full ownership and responsibility; there would be a one-off financial incentive for doing that.

Dog waste problems in the village: problems in the Dale in particular were highlighted and Councillors expressed concern at what appears to be a growing problem. Residents are urged to use the waste bins and additional signage is being requested for the Dale.

Village Direction signs: Councillors are looking to improve signage for village facilities with perhaps a fingerpost sign at the Park and/or Cross. Ideas on that would be welcome and anyone interested in contributing to design can contact Cllr Phil Addis or Richard Grover.
