

Morning Musings

I'm up early, almost with the dawn chorus. There's a clear blue sky, the sun is shining — one of those "Oh, what a beautiful morning, oh what a beautiful day. I've got a wonderful feeling everything's going my way!" moments. I sit quietly, letting my thoughts wander. Then I open the Message Bible and begin to read Psalm 19. "God's glory is on tour in the skies, God-craft on exhibit across the horizon. Madame Day holds classes every morning. Professor Night lectures each evening. Their words aren't heard, their voices aren't recorded, but their silence fills the earth: unspoken truth is everywhere. [this is David writing thousands of years before the scientists of our day!] God makes a huge dome for the sun - a super dome! 100 YEARS AGO

The decision to cease the agricultural exemption from call-up for all young men aged 19-23 meant the Military Tribunal was dealing with much harder cases of older men. At their meeting at the end of July at the Endowed School, the clerk was F W Gill and the military representative J Wain from Cromford

Charles Kirkland, 24, single, from Rose Cottage Uppertown, was employed at Via Gellia Colour Works. He had been classified C2 when exempted in December 1917 and his case was adjourned for medical regrading.

The Via Gellia Colour Company applied for exemption for three of its employees as they were engaged in Class A work for the Government.

John Kniveton from Arter Hill was a barytes grinder. He was Grade 1 but was 45 and had seven children, four of them under 16. One son (William John Kniveton) had already been lost in the war (December 1917). Another (Frank Kniveton) was in the Army. John was granted exemption until 11 October and also from joining the volunteers as long as he was in this or a similar job.

Samuel Bond was also from Arter Hill and a barytes grinder and Grade 1 and 45. Whilst he did not have the personal circumstances of John Kniveton, his employment got him the same exemption.

Ross Webster from The Cross was a foreman in charge of the works. This was his first application. He had been rejected four times as unfit for Army service and classified Grade 3 and could not do hard work. He was 36 and had five children, the eldest being 12. He was granted an exemption until October on the grounds of serious hardship.

William Fern from High Street, formerly Ember Lane, had been employed as a cotton

doubler for 30 years at Arkwright Mills. He was Grade 2. He was 46 and had five children, the oldest 10. He was granted a temporary exemption to 11 October as long as he continued in his existing employment.

On the domestic front, Ebenezer Fern (no relation to William above), a basalt quarry worker, 45, of Church Street, was committed to gaol for six months for an assault on Bertha Swindell, 13, of Slaley and another three months for assaulting a police officer. Ebenezer lived with his two older sisters, Fanny and Sarah, and you may recall from the September 2015 Mutterings their behaviour in Court resulted in a month in gaol for each of them. It is likely he assaulted the same resident Police Constable Barker who had arrested his sisters.

He worked at the basalt quarry behind the Pig of Lead and there is no record of him appearing at a Military Tribunal or serving in the Army. "Bertha" is likely to have been Martha Brooks Swindell, baptised in 1905, the youngest daughter of a widow, Esther Swindell, with no father's name shown in the register. One could speculate that her father was a Brooks from one of the three Brooks families in the village at that time.

On a brighter note, as mentioned in February, Lieutenant William Swindell (no relation to the above) from Slaley Farm married a lass from Whittington.

Towards the end of the month news arrived in the village, via the Red Cross in Geneva, that Private Jack Bunting, Sherwood Foresters, son of the late Mr. Jesse Bunting, who had been missing since 27 May, was a prisoner of war in Germany.

PARISH COUNCIL

Bonsall Parish Council Report for 19 June 2018

Potholes: Some of the worst potholes around the top of the Clatterway have recently been repaired again following requests from the Parish Council. Other problem areas can be reported to the Clerk (details below), or you can also contact the County Council direct online at https://www.derbyshire.gov.uk/transport-roads/roads-traffic/report-a-road-fault/report-a-road-fault.aspx.

Uppertown Lane: County Councillor Ratcliffe reported that she had just visited Uppertown Lane at the Chair's request and that it definitely required full resurfacing as it was in a very poor condition. She undertook to speak to the Highways Team about this, and also about the condition of Slaley Lane from the top of the Dale, and potholes on Salters Lane.

Park lease: At the previous meeting the Parish Council had asked the Diocese to bear the cost of their own legal and agent's fees in order to reduce the financial burden for the village in taking on management of the park. The Diocese have now responded through their agents, and have said that they are unable to pay these costs themselves and that they must be borne by the Parish Council. The Council decided, reluctantly, that in the circumstances there was nothing further that could be done on this, and to proceed with the lease on the basis that these were the best terms available for securing the land.

Speeding in the village: The Parish Council continues to get complaints of dangerous speeding through the village; in addition to the Speedwatch initiative there is a group setting up to look at

other measures that might be taken to reduce this. If anyone is interested in joining this please contact the Clerk.

Defibrillators: Two new defibrillators for the village have now been purchased and the Parish Council wants to thank everyone who has donated to date to help make this possible. We still need to buy cases for these units so that they can be situated outside, and the cases are £400 each, so further donations are still needed and welcome. In the meantime the units are going to be at Dale House, Bankside with Phil Addis, and at the lorry garage at Town Head with Richard Taylor.

Lamp Post Poppies: The Parish Council is looking to repeat last November's Lamp Post Poppy display, and it was agreed that in this centenary year of the end of WW1 a poppy will be displayed for each villager who was killed in that conflict. It is intended that for 2019 all who died in both world wars would be represented. The poppies for this are bought by way of a donation to the British Legion. Full details of the meetings can be


