Help With Ancestors

I would very much appreciate your help. I am an Aussie and we visited Bonsall in 2013. We staved in your village for a few days and visited Chestnut Farm, which was once owned by Fred Marples, my second cousin, and also saw the house where my Nanna lived.

I will explain why I would appreciate your help: my Nanna, Mabel Hawley, was born in Bonsall in 1884 and her Mother. Clara Hawley nee

Wright, was born in Winster in 1851. Mabel's Grandfather, James Wright, was also born in Bonsall in 1826, so I have an enormous connect to your village. Mabel came to Australia in the early 1900s looking for her father, Frederick Hawley, but she never found him - but she did marry an Aussie and stayed here. Out of respect to my Nanna, I would like to make contact with some Hawley family members. I know that Mabel's brother, William Hawley, was born in Bonsall in 1876 and died on 14 October, 1960, and

is interred in Islington Cemetery (Grave No 10606, K Block 2). I received this information when I visited in 2013, but in the days we had allocated we were unable to find any more information. I am trying to make contact with some of William's family, but I have no idea how to find the information (I thought the funeral notice may have mentioned his children and grandchildren). We hope to visit your village in July 2019, and would appreciate any help you can supply in helping me find some long-lost cousins ... and find out if they know what happened to Mabel's and Michael's father, my Great Grandfather.





The group also wants to see the end of the commercial exploitation of T'Owd Man's image and the return of T'Owd Man to St James' Church. The replica at the Bandstand can be relocated to St. Mary's. The Parish Council has said it will support the group.

The group realises that most people in Wirksworth are not aware of the issue and that many people in Bonsall are also unaware. We will therefore call a meeting to secure the widest support for a campaign to both stop Wirksworth using the image as its own and to start a process to return the original carving to St. James'.

We will also have a series of articles in Mutterings to inform a wider audience of what is known about the history of T'Owd Man.

If there is sufficient support, the larger group will take two lines of attack: to produce articles for the national and local media to highlight the issue; and to begin a process to secure the Church of England and Historic England approval to transfer the carving from St Mary's to St. James'.

If you would like to take part in reinstating Bonsall as the rightful home of T'Owd Man, please come to a meeting on Wednesday, 24 October at 8.00 pm in the Kings Head.



100 YEARS AGO

Redfern, Woodcock, Massey...

George Redfern was the youngest of the five surviving children of William and Lydia Redfern who, in 1891, were living on Ember lane. William was a house painter and his three daughters all worked in cotton mills, although one, Annie*, later had domestic duties at The Study. By 1911, George had left Bonsall and was a shop assistant in Warwick, and William and Lydia and their daughters were living at Church View (41 Church Street). George travelled to Nottingham to enlist in the 8th Battalion of the Sherwood Foresters. In August 1918 he was shown on the weekly casualty list as being wounded. However, he returned to duty and on the 17 October the 8th Battalion was the assaulting battalion in an attack to capture Regincourt.

Despite the fog and smoke, the attacking companies achieved their objective and, when the Germans massed for a counter-attack, this was broken up by artillery fire. Nevertheless, the battalion losses were 28 killed and 58 wounded.

George was killed in action and his body was recovered and buried nearby. He was aged 26. The sad news was brought to his sisters in Church View by a comrade at the end of October.

Frederick (Eric) Woodcock is included on the war memorial, but he was neither born in Bonsall nor went to school here and was not living here when he enlisted. His parents moved into Herbert Lodge around 1902 when Frederick was about 4. He went to a private school at Riber Castle, then to Harrow and on to University. In 1914 he was articled to his father, a solicitor, and that was when the family left Bonsall for Manchester. From there, in August 1915, Eric enlisted in the Royal Garrison Artillery. In April 1916, he joined the Royal Flying Corps as an artillery observer.

In late September 1917 General Haig made an immediate award on the battlefield of the Military Cross to him and his pilot for distinguished service. By mid-1918, he was a pilot with 101 Squadron of the RAF.

This was a specialist night bomber squadron operating F.E.2b's. In addition to bombing enemy facilities and troops, it was used to drown out the noise of tanks assembling for attacks.

On 31 October the plane that Captain Woodcock was manoeuvring on the airfield struck some explosives and was destroyed, Eric dying instantly. He was aged 20.

Private John Massey, serving with the Sherwood Foresters, was shown as wounded on the weekly casualty list for the 15 October. A week earlier had been the publicity that he had been awarded the Military Medal for carrying wounded men from the field of battle. He was the 27 year-old son of Henry and Eliza, living on Greenhill in 1911 and was a railway platelayer. He was formally presented with his medal in August 1919 at the Bonsall Gala.

On Saturday October 19, at Matlock police court, Horace Spencer, 37, a railway foreman, was charged with stealing 511/2 lbs. of apples (value £2/11/6 or 1/- (5p) per pound) from the garden of Walter Evans, at the Sheffield House café in Matlock Bath. Evans said his two apple trees had 6 pecks (a dry measure of capacity equivalent to 12 gallons) of apples on them and had been stripped clean. Sergeant Aves found a bag of apples at Spencer's house at The Nook in the Dale when he went to arrest him.

Mr Charles White (a former Bonsall resident and Urban District Councillor and Chairman of the Matlock Bath Council), had known Spencer for 30 years and spoke of his good character. He was fined 50s (£2.50) and ordered to return the apples. Also in October, Mr. Moody celebrated completing 21 years as Head of the Boys' Endowed School.

*Annie Redfern never married and, in the 1920s, moved to 23 Greenhill. She was the last occupier before we moved into this house.



PARISH COUNCIL

Report Of 18 September Meeting

T'Owd Man: a lot of concern was raised in the Public Speaking section of the meeting about the use of the name T'Owd Man Wirksworth by a recent Wirksworth publication. A group is convening in the village to see what action could be taken on this and on the general appropriation of this historic Bonsall artefact and image, and its use for purposes unconnected with the village. There was specific criticism of the image being used for commercial purposes.

It was agreed that this would be on the agenda for the next month's meeting with a view to formally supporting this campaign.

<u>Traffic group:</u> this group is continuing to work on the design of the informal 'Twenty's Plenty' warning notice scheme, backed with children's posters from the school. It was agreed that approximately twelve signs were needed: four to be situated between the Via Gellia and the top of the park; two on Yeoman Street; three on High Street from The Cross to Abel Lane, and three on The Dale. Some residents have already offered to help with sites for the notices. If anyone else wants to help, either by making signs or putting a notice in their garden, please contact the Clerk or your local Councillor.

Defibrillators: the power cabling for the Chapel sign is now nearly completed; thanks were recorded to David Brown ('Brew') and to Mark Harris for their voluntary work on this.

Fundraising for a children's defibrillator for the school is continuing; anyone wanting to make donations for this please contact Richard Taylor or the Clerk. Training is also being arranged on the use of the new units and the Open Gardens project has donated £180 for direction signs.

Maintenance of planters: in the summer heat, the normal arrangements for maintenance of the plant boxes around the village fell short, and the Parish Council is asking for another volunteer to help with the boxes around The Fountain. Anyone able to help with this is asked to contact Denise Pountain or the Clerk.

<u>WC transfer:</u> the District Council is closing its WC facilities throughout the area and there is consequently

pressure to resolve the transfer to the Parish Council as soon as possible to avoid this happening in the village. The District Council had offered to pay 50% of the maintenance grant if the Parish completes a 'tenancy at will', and the remainder when the title to the land transfers. It was agreed to make arrangements with the District Council on that basis as soon as the District can prepare the paperwork.

Churchyard responsibilities: the Parish Council has received advice that it is not currently legally responsible for the maintenance of the closed churchyard, including the trees next to Church Street that need management work to make them safe. It was agreed:

- to instigate urgent discussion with the Parochial Church Council (PCC) with a view to seeking the tree management work being undertaken before the end of the next winter, and to again offer the possibility of the PCC applying for grant support if that is needed;
- in the interests of establishing a secure legal basis for the future maintenance of the closed churchyard, to discuss with the PCC it serving a statutory notice on the Parish Council for transfer of responsibility to the Parish Council. This would then give an option to transfer responsibility on to the District Council, although the District Council has said that it may challenge that.

The Parish Council also discussed whether or not its long-term interests could be best served by retaining this maintenance responsibility.

It was agreed that there could be advantages in terms of control of the frequency and quality of maintenance work in the churchyard, avoidance of potential future recharges from the District to the Parish, and to be able to reinstate the District Council annual payment for churchyard work, although a decision on this won't be made until the transfer process has started.

Open Gardens funds: the Parish Council welcomed contributions from the Open Gardens fund of £580 towards defibrillator signs (£180), Twenty's Plenty signs (£200) and repairs to The Cross (£200).

<u>Planning:</u> Slinter Top Quarry: the County Council has asked for

comments on some additional environmental statement documents relating to the planning application for extension of the quarry.

It was agreed to comment: that 'the Parish Council considered that the proposed development would have an adverse impact on the visual amenity of the village for residents and visitors, in particular in relation to the important views from the upper part of the village and the Limestone Way. Tourism in the Park forms an important part of the Bonsall economy and helps support a number of local businesses. The Parish Council supported the comments on this that had been submitted by the Peak District National Park Authority'.


