

CHURCH NEWS

The Season of Epiphany

As I write this the Church is celebrating the season of Epiphany.

When the world moves on from listening to Noddy Holder declare that 'It's Christmaaaaas!' we explore key events in the life of Christ. According to every nativity play ever (except the ones with a selection of odd animals – no there was not an octopus present at the birth of Christ, as far as we know) the Magi, the three kings, wise men, turned up shortly after the baby entered the world. He was still wrapped in swaddling bands. But that is not the case in scripture. They came much later, Jesus was a toddler, essentially, by the time they arrived. Fair enough, they had a long walk...

Their visit, and the presents they gave, tell us that they saw Jesus as a king, and that they imagined him as a king whose kingdom would include everyone. Even them. He was not simply for one group of people. Jesus was for the whole world.

The next week, we learn about the baptism of Christ. He was an adult at this point, and he presented himself, humbly, before John the Baptist (who initially refused to perform the baptism saying that Jesus was greater than him). John was persuaded, and he took Jesus out into the river.

Jesus was a man not given to drawing attention to himself, he didn't have to assert any importance. He came, like everyone else, to John and was baptised in the same waters. Here it was declared that he is the Son of God. But he doesn't claim any special treatment.

And then we have the turning of water into wine. This is the story of Jesus' first miracle. I love this because it shows us that Jesus approves of a party. He was all for taking joy in the everyday things of life: marriage, family, food and drink. He does as his mother asks him, and in doing so he demonstrates that he is more than just an earthly man, more than just a leader. He is the one to bring hope, to show us the God who loves us.

That is still the case, all these years later. Christians still find hope in the God who loves us and the world. Sometimes faith is hard. sometimes it doesn't make sense, but in remembering these events, the beginnings of Jesus' ministry, we can remind ourselves why we committed to this way of life. This one, who came as a human just like us, but showed himself to be someone extraordinary. he can be our light and our hope. So, in dark and complicated times, I hope you can find some peace in Him.

Doreen was born and bred in Bonsall on 18 February 1930, the eldest daughter to Isaac and Millicent Gratton. She was followed by a brother Peter who sadly passed away in 1983. Doreen began her working life as a secretary for the railway at Rowsley and cycled to and from home every day. She met and married husband Ian in February 1955 and a path had to be cleared to the church after heavy snowfall. Her first son David was born in 1957 followed by Martin in 1959. Doreen returned to work after having her children; working for Harry Evans, Derbyshire Stone and latterly Tarmac, working at Longcliffe, Middleton, Cawdor Quarry, on Dale Road and finally at Gordon Lodge in Snitterton. Sadly her husband Ian had passed away in 1978 and she then became more involved in a great deal of hobbies from flower arranging, lace making, decoupage classes, embroidery at the Imperial Rooms and Starkholmes Church Hall, whatever project she was undertaking she gave it her all and we cannot think that she failed at anything. She was a member

at Starkholmes over 60's club and loved to go on their outings as she had a great fondness of travelling. Doreen was extremely proud of her family and never tired of listening to all the tales that were told regarding her grandchildren and great grandchildren. Doreen will mostly be remembered for her organ playing in church for a great number of years, never missing only when cancelled due to the weather or when she fell and broke her wrist. In recognition of this she was awarded the Bishops Badge and took eight members of her family to Derby Cathedral to be presented with this. I don't think she realised what a huge hole she was going to leave but we can rest assured that her great grandchildren will never forget what a wonderful woman that she was. The family would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone for their cards and messages of sympathy which have been so greatly appreciated and the generosity of donations which amounts so far to over £700.00 which is to be split equally between St James's Church, Bonsall and Wesleyan Reform Chapel, The Dale.



Allotment News – Vacant Allotments available!

Several allotments are likely to become vacant this season and although it's early for planting the ground is in fair condition for making preparations. Despite the drought through June and July, last year turned out to be a great growing year and fruit and vegetable crops were some of the best we've had up there. Fruit from the community orchard - plums, apples and pears - were especially good.

Plots range in size, from a quarter plot (approx. 16 X 8 metres) at £15 pa., to a full plot (approx. 25 X 10metres) at £70 pa. It's worth thinking about it now because once the season gets going there will be more competition for the vacant plots.

New Bonsall History Book: Bonsall within Living Memory

The latest book by the Bonsall History Group is now on sale at £10 + P&P. It is a record of the memories of people who grew up in the village from the 1920s, when the oldest of the 42 contributors remembered their childhoods, over 50 years to the 1970s. Topics covered (with a few quotes from the book) are:

How we lived: "People used to go and tip their rubbish in The Park and it were buried there."

"Whatever drop of water we took in the house we had to use it; we had no drainage."

"Jim Bunting was the night-soil collector and we used to call the night-soil cart the 'Cadbury Wagon'".

School: "Sometimes we would play truant and go and watch the monkeys in their cages on Matlock Bath Parade."

Leisure and entertainment; "In winter, you could get on a sledge at Uppertown and not stop 'til you got to Pig o' Lead."

"The gangs from Cromford used to fight with the gangs from Bonsall - they had a great time."

"We were not allowed to play out on Sundays. The swings in The Park were chained together to stop them being used." Church and chapels: "Oswald gave her and other children sixpence each not to laugh during his sermon!"

"We attended various chapels, depending on where you believed they were going on their annual trip!"

Earning a living; "I used to measure the milk into customers' jugs – no pasteurisation or anything. The milk was just sieved to get any bits out of it."

Accidents: "He was struck by a piece of rock that fell from the roof. He sustained a fractured skull and was carried by other workmen some two miles to the foot of the shaft and taken to the surface."

Court cases; "Alfred Conway was summonsed for driving a horse and cart without lights."

"A railway shunter of The Cross, Bonsall, was given six months' hard labour for stealing a pair of woollen pants, a pair of ladies slippers and five cleaning cloths, value £2/10/-."

World War II: "'We had to sleep in the Clubroom behind the Fountain Inn overnight and go out on manoeuvres on Masson Hill."

"The Home Guard used to practice marching. I remember they only had sweeping brushes on their shoulders, instead of guns."

With 194 pages and nearly 150 photographs, the book is a detailed and compelling record for anyone interested in the daily lives and concerns of people in the village during the middle of the 20th Century. Call for Host Families for this year's Chernobyl Children's visit

Local CCLL link members are looking for volunteer families to host Belarusian children this summer. It's that time of year again for CCLL's Bonsall and Derbyshire Dales Link to appeal for local families who can offer a temporary home for two Belarusian children this coming summer.

For more than 15 years the link has been bringing kids over from areas of Ukraine and Belarus most severely affected by the Chernobyl Nuclear Power Plant disaster. The total number of children brought over by the Link since 2002 comes to over 150! During their visit the children enjoy living in a clean and healthy environment, being looked after by a caring group of friendly Link members, and having lots of fun taking part in an extensive activity programme.

Last year the link brought over a group of six children from Belarus. Even though more than 30 years have passed since the tragic nuclear accident, many poorer families still live in the affected areas and have to drink contaminated water and eat contaminated food. It takes over a hundred years for the most harmful radionuclides to reduce to a safe level and the families have no money and no help from their governments to escape their harmful environment. Spending a holiday in the UK significantly boosts the children's health and self-esteem. and gives them a chance of making it to a healthy and successful life in the future.

Our plan for this year is to bring over another six children from Rogachev, Belarus. We are looking for local families who might be interested in hosting two children between 9 and 15 years of age for two or four weeks (it's up to you) in this year's 4-week summer programme, July 13th to August 10th, 2019. If you are interested, please don't delay contacting us as it takes time for the charity to make all the arrangements for the children's visit.

Hosting children is a fun, mutually enjoyable and rewarding engagement. A pair of children will live with you in your house for two or four weeks, sharing your lifestyle, eating with you at your table and participating in a number of recreational activities organised by the Link committee. Although hosting children certainly requires a level of dedication and responsibility, you are not left on your own or completely tied to the kids, as our support families will happily give you a hand if you need the odd day off. The children are generally well-behaved, and come over with their Group Leader who is also a translator, so there are no particular issues with the language or cultural barrier. All the children will understand some English.

We would be delighted to hear from families living in Bonsall and Slaley and the rest of the Derbyshire Dales area. While Bonsall is the heart of the Link, we have host and support families that live in Matlock, Wirksworth, Darley Dale, Rowsley, Starkholmes, Lea and Birchover, as well as in other Derbyshire villages. The Bonsall and Derbyshire Dales Link of CCLL (registered charity No. 1014274) was formed back in 2002 by its current and founding Chairman, Chris Broome, a Bonsall resident for over 28 years. One of over 70 active Links throughout Great Britain, the Link raises its own funds to bring groups of between six and twelve children who live in contaminated areas of Ukraine and Belarus to the UK, to offer them four weeks of fun and TLC along with free eye tests and glasses and dental treatment for those of them who need it.

Friends of T'Owd Man

A group has been holding monthly meetings to plan activities that will restrict the increasing exploitation of the T'Owd Man of Bonsall by the Heritage Centre and businesses in Wirksworth. Having gained support from the Parish Council, the group wrote to the Parochial Church Council in October as follows:

To: Members of the PCC

Use of the T'Owd Man's image by Wirksworth.

I am writing on behalf of a group of villagers who are concerned about Wirksworth's increasing appropriation and exploitation of the T'Owd Man of Bonsall. The group met in September and October to discuss how to achieve two aims:

- 1) In the short term, to make all references to T'Owd Man say 'T'Owd Man of Bonsall' and to curtail Wirksworth businesses and Heritage Centre using T'Owd Man for commercial purposes.
- 2) In the longer term, to return T'Owd Man to St James'.

The group acknowledges that T'Owd Man is part of Wirksworth's recent history, but it is not part of its heritage - it is an important part of Bonsall's heritage and should be acknowledged as such. We are drawing the group's activities to the attention of the PCC to request its support to achieve both the short and longer term aims.

The PCC met in November and sent the following reply:

"We are very supportive of any efforts to recognise and promote Bonsall's heritage and recognise what seems to be the original residence and extensive association of the carving of the T'Owd Man of Bonsall, with Bonsall – prior to its relocation in Wirksworth in the late 19th Century. We certainly support and encourage full recognition of T'Owd Man's original heritage in all circumstances and by all groups, not least through the full use of T'Owd Man of Bonsall's name at all times. If this is recognised, then the power of the T'Owd Man of Bonsall as a 'brand' for Wirksworth would be less persuasive, we would have thought. However, we imagine that the issue of 'repatriation' (relocation) from St Mary's Wirksworth to Bonsall after c.150 years is complex: legally, practically, bureaucratically and probably emotionally, and cannot envisage circumstances in which moving him back to Bonsall would be feasible. We wish the group well and support efforts to press for the recognition of T'Owd Man of Bonsall's heritage and full name and to promote his association with the village, but would not want activities relating to the T'Owd Man of Bonsall to foster difficulties with our good neighbours in Wirksworth, with whom we share many things, including a role as co-guardians of the T'Owd Man of Bonsall."

The group will next meet on Tuesday 5 March 2019 at 8pm in the Kings Head. You are very welcome to come and share your views.

Report for 18 December 2018 and 15 January 2019 meetings

Slinter Top Quarry

The Parish Council responded to another consultation about the environmental impact of the proposed extension to the quarry. They have reiterated concerns about noise from the current operations and how that will be if the quarry is extended, and about how that has been dealt with in the Environmental Impact Assessment, and expressing concern about previous consultation. The planning application may be heard by the County Council committee on 4 March 2019, so anyone who wants to give their views to the County Council needs to do so by that date. Churchyard trees

After a tree fell from the rock face across Ragcroft and into a neighbour's garden in the autumn, the churchyard trees have been inspected. The District Council has been asked to deal with others above Ragcroft, and the Parish Council are looking to remove some on the boundary of the old churchyard above Yeoman Street. This work would be done as part of the Parish Council's new responsibility for the closed churchyard, which has been transferred from the Parochial Church Council.

Churchyard unconsecrated ground

Canon David Truby has offered to arrange for consecration of six plots in the Parish Burial Ground which are currently unconsecrated; a final decision on this will be taken at the meeting of the Parish Council on 19 February 2019. There is limited space remaining now in the cemetery and there has been no call to date for unconsecrated plots.

Community Noticeboard

The Parish Council has obtained grant funding of £380 towards a community notice board at the Fountain. The grant was from the District Council Local Projects Fund, £180 supported by District Councillor Joyce Pawley and £200 by Councillor Garry Purdy. The Parish Council has made some provision for this in the budget, and further grant funding is being sought.

PARISH COUNCIL

Defibrillators

Thanks to fundraising by Richard Taylor and generous village donations, another defibrillator unit has been purchased to be sited at the school on Church Street. This is again a specialist unit that can be used for adults and children, and should be installed in the next week or two. Training on these units has been delayed slightly, but we are hoping to arrange this soon for all those who have expressed interest, and also to produce a leaflet for Mutterings. In the meantime, to use the units:

- dial 999 / Ambulance Services, give your location and the ambulance service will give you a code to open the defibrillator case:
- Ambulance services will talk you through the process, and the defibrillator units themselves give automated instructions on use.

Parish Council Precept

The Parish Council have agreed a budget for 2019-20 (on the website) and also set the precept for 2019-20. This will be unchanged from last year at £18,500, equivalent to £55.79 for an average Band D household. The precept was left unchanged on account of:

- the need for contingency costs of £1000 for website development, £500 for new community notice board, £300 for legal costs on the park sub-lease, District / Parish Council election costs of £886,
- £500 for planning fees for the churchyard extension and £1500 for churchyard tree work; and
- that projected reserves at the end of 2019-20 were still £4K below the recommended levels.

Public toilets

The Parish Council is in the process of taking over full responsibility for the toilets from the District Council, and is now waiting for the legal title to be transferred. At the January meeting the Chair reported a letter of thanks from a member of the public praising the cleaning standards, and it was agreed to record the thanks of the Parish Council to Becky Allsopp for her work.

Twenty's Plenty'

In January the school worked on the artwork for the 'Twenty's Plenty' speed campaign, and the Chair Mark Harris and Councillor Jon Barry did a presentation to the whole school explaining the project, including a dashboard video taken going through the village at 20mph. Asked who had seen accidents or near accidents involving cars, quite a few children put their hands up.

Some great artwork was produced by all three classes, with the help of Julie Leggett and Liz Stoppard from the Arts Group. Ken Clark who has sponsored the project is going to have the difficult job of helping to choose the final set. Many thanks to Julie and Liz and to all at the school for their help.

Cromford Parish Council joint meeting

In December a joint meeting was held with Cromford Parish Councillors to look at issues of common concern.

Traffic problems on the Via Gellia and at Water Lane were one of several topics discussed, and on that it was agreed that both Councils would act together to press the County Council for road works to be co-ordinated, and tree works etc to be undertaken when closures were anticipated. Another meeting is being held in six months' time.

Flooding Working Group

Following the flooding incidents in the village the Parish Council is setting up a working group to look at any practical planning that can be done to help with future incidents. Anyone who would like to help on this work please contact the clerk.

Parish Council elections

The term of office of current Parish Councillors ends on 6 May 2019, and a new Council will be appointed. The process was explained at the January meeting: the Notice of Election will be published on 19 March 2019, and anyone wanting to stand should submit nomination papers to the District Council between 19 March and 3 April 2019. Nomination papers will be available on the District Council website from the beginning of March. If more than eight nominations remained there would be a contested election. Anyone wanting further information on this can contact the District Council or the clerk.


