CHURCH NEWS

I’ve been at my post as Team Vicar since February but this has been my first opportunity to write in Mutterings. When I originally took the job I was so pleased to learn that Bonsall was part of the Team, as I have often walked through it with my husband on sunny days off and I love it here. Now I have an excuse to visit all the time!

The last few months have been a real discovery! So far, I’ve seen the daffodils come and go, met more people than I can possibly retain the names of but who generously, and repeatedly, give of their time to share their stories with me or who simply point me in the right direction to the next church (not always very successfully!) I’ve also sampled more cake than is good for my hips in the process of discovering the intricacy of the administration that comes with working in a benefice with 10 churches... it’s not all tea and cake! But that’s the adventure of new beginnings.

I happen to like new beginnings, but I’m also aware that beginnings can be a double-edged sword: both full of opportunity and also the dread of change and the uncertainty of what this new adventure might turn out like. Anyone who has ever embarked on a new beginning, be it a project or a relationship or job has, at some point, felt fear or apprehension. That’s normal. However, sometimes the fear is so strong that it stops us attempting new things all together, which is a shame because as human beings we’re not meant to be afraid. I once knew a vicar who always went on about how the Bible should have a large strapline on the cover, it should read: Holy Bible – DO NOT BE AFRAID! and he was right. This isn’t a message just for Christians or other people of faith. I believe this is God’s message to the whole of his creation (and not just humans).

I believe that God is with us and loves us through life (whether we know it or not) and if he calls us to something new he will guide us and equip us for the new challenges in our lives. There are many examples in the Bible of people being called to do things that were completely revolutionary in their day. Invariably they were all afraid and openly said so to God – the general gist is usually: “Don’t ask me please, I can’t do that”. The reasons

why not are usually understandable ones: “I’m too young”; “I’m too old”; “I’ve got a physical impediment”; “I’m not clever enough”; “I’m not holy enough” and so on. But to everyone that God calls he also has a general answer, which is beautifully summarised in Isaiah (41:10), he put it like this: *[God says] do not fear, for I am with you, do not be afraid, for I am your God; I will strengthen you, I will help you.*

So let those words be an encouragement to you or your loved ones, whatever new endeavours you may be attempting this summer (even if it is just training the new vicar!) and remember you’re not alone!

Local Election Results

Joyce Pawley (Labour) and Gary Purdy (Conservative) were re-elected for the Masson Ward with 459 and 386 votes respectively.

The electorate was 2,400 and the turnout was 43.1%

The Derbyshire Dales Council now has 20 Conservative, 8 Liberal Democrat, 6 Labour, 3 Independent and 2 Green members.

The change in the election was: Conservative lost 9 seats; Liberal Democrats gained 5 seats; Greens gained 2 seats; Labour gained 1 seat; and Independents gained 1 seat.

News from Kabale (Uganda)

As many people know, Bonsall Mothers' Union have been supporting a family in Uganda since 2003. At that time, Peace and her children, Rachel and Rita, who were aged 7 and 5 respectively had been made homeless when her husband, Milton died. He was a physics teacher and their home went with his job. We began by paying the girl's school fees and then went on to build her a house supported by many people both in the MU in Bonsall and the Diocese and people in the village. Pat Spencer and I have been out there twice and stayed with Peace in the house that so many people helped build.

The girls then went on to university, again with the help of so many. Rachel, now 25 years old, graduated and found a job in their home town of Kabale as head of an office of a national insurance company. She gained a BA in media studies. Rita followed two years later (an overlap was quite tough for the fundraising) and really wanted to do a five-year Law Degree. She has just finished her final exams at the university in Mbarara and now has to apply to do her final year at one of only two Law Development Centres in Uganda.

Unfortunately, just before Christmas, Peace was involved in a motorbike accident when the bike she was on (they are used as taxis) was hit by another bike and she was taken to hospital with a clot on the brain. She is recovering and waiting for a follow up appointment in Kampala. On 2 March this year Rachel was married to Sam, who was adopted by an English missionary couple. They have made their home in Kabale so are still close to Peace who is still bringing up

her sister Charity's three children after she died from breast cancer a few years ago.

There are families here in England who support those children in their schooling and in other ways. We are in regular contact by e-mail, text and Facebook and they really are a part of our family as we are of theirs. The photos are of Rachel and Sam and a lovely one of Peace walking Rachel down the aisle in their local church at Nyabikoni. There are many parts to their weddings and quite a number of costume changes.

Winster: Children's Poems

by Charles Causley set to

Many people will know the work of the late famous and much-loved Cornish poet Charles Causley (of Timothy Winters fame). His relative Jim Causley is a widely-respected folk musician, who brings to Winster his settings of Charles's poems, along with anecdotes and information from the family archive, to which he has unique access.

The result is a marvellous show, combining the beauty and humour of the poems with the top-class musicianship of Jim and fascinating insights into the life and beliefs of the poet himself. Support is provided by two other fine musicians, Derbyshire's own Keith Kendrick and Sylvia Needham.

Jim is a multi-instrumentalist with a beautiful bass voice and an easy stage manner. The Guardian says he has 'a natural gift for entertainment' and he creates an immediate rapport with the audience. He has been nominated no fewer than six times as Singer of the Year in the BBC Radio 2 Folk Awards.

Geoff Lester of Winster Entertainments Group said: 'I saw this show in Whitby Folk Week last year and booked it without hesitation. The queue for the CD stretched right round the theatre.'

The show is on Saturday 15 June in the Burton Institute, Winster DE4 2DQ.

PARISH COUNCIL

Report for Annual Parish Meeting and Annual Meeting of Parish Council 21 May

Elections and co-option of Councillors:

Mark Harris was elected as Chair to the new Parish Council, and Phil Addis as Vice-Chair.

There were five vacancies on the Parish Council; two former Councillors, Richard Grover and Jon Barry were co-opted as new members at the meeting in order to ensure that there was a quorum for the next, so there are three vacancies remaining to be filled.

Appointment of new Councillors: if you are interested in becoming a Parish Councillor please contact the clerk Tony Payne. Details on this, and the policy explaining the process for applying, are available on the village website. Applications will be considered at the Parish Council meeting on 16 July.

Annual Parish Meeting: the meeting heard from the Chair of the Parish Council on the work of the previous year, and a report on the finances and the precept. There was discussion on a community trust which could in future operate the park, village hall and public toilets. There was also discussion on design of a village sign, and a design competition was suggested. The Chair's report to the Parish Meeting is available on the website www.bonsallvillage.org/.

Slinter top Quarry: the date for the planning application to be heard by the County Council has been extended until 26 July to allow the company to submit additional information for the Environmental Statement. The County Council has said that this new information is likely to trigger a fresh consultation exercise, which would push the hearing date at least three months beyond that.

A letter from Mike Ashworth Strategic

Director for Economy Transport and Environment at the County Council was reported, responding to the concerns about noise and dust raised at the previous meeting. Mr Ashworth said that County Officers are continuing to respond to all complaints, and that officers have advised the company on improvements and best practice, and that the company have purchased a new hydraulic breaker, 'and recent monitoring has confirmed that the new model is an improvement being quieter with the metallic ringing sound now absent'.

He said that the company also propose the construction of a barrier of imported inert material on the north-western side of the screening plant in order to reduce noise levels (work being undertaken from mid-May).

'With respect to dust, the company have recognised that at times, particularly during spells of dry weather, their control of dust arising from the processing operation at the quarry could have been better. The company are currently making improvements in order to ensure that more water is available at the quarry and that it is distributed more effectively'.

Mr Ashworth said that the County Council will continue to monitor dust and noise emissions and that if residents have concerns about any aspect of the quarrying operation they should contact the Planning Service direct on 01629 539800 (development.management@derbyshire.gov.uk).

New District Council sign at the Park: the Parish Council has had quite a few complaints about the new sign which was put up by the District Council. The Clerk had written to the District Council asking whether once the land is under the control of the Parish the sign could be removed; the following reply was reported to the meeting:

'Aside from general information, our new signs are designed to convey the nature of any Public Spaces Protection Orders that we have in place. With regard to the control of alcohol consumption, the intention of the Order is to require individuals to cease consumption and hand over the alcohol to the Police or Designated Officer if they instructed to do so. In a practical sense, if there are individuals or groups consuming quantities of alcohol, (or those who are continuing to drink in a public place whilst clearly already under the influence of alcohol) which might cause distress to others or lead to unruly behaviour, they will be asked to surrender it. By contrast, if there's a family picnic or social group with a bottle of wine on display and there are no grounds for an officer to believe that its consumption could lead to antisocial behaviour, it's most unlikely that it would be seized. It's a very handy piece of legislation for dealing with day-to-day problems associated with drinking and it doesn't jeopardise organised events. The Order allows for formal exemptions, particularly where a licence has been granted, which I assume would be the case in respect of the Carnival

or other organised community events.

It's worth noting that the PSPO will still be in place after the transfer of the land as it remains a public place. PSPOs are reviewed and renewed every 3 years, so there would be opportunity to remove it completely in 2021 if you were mindful to do so. In the meantime, following a transfer of ownership under lease, you may choose not to practically enforce any or all of the PSPOs that are currently in place'

The Council also heard that the transfer of land is just waiting on the District Council to complete their part of the legal process, which should be within the next few weeks. It was agreed that the response represented a reasonable approach, and that this could be reviewed in the future once the land had transferred.

Planter boxes: thanks were recorded to Pete Spencer and Jon Barry for repairing and painting the boxes for the Open Gardens weekend; it was agreed to look to replace some of the boxes after the event, and to try to set up a voluntary rota for maintenance and watering.

A recipe for you to try

Granny Chrimes' Bermuda Loaf

Pre heat oven to 180 degrees

Four ounces of butter
Cup of sugar
Cup of Sultanas or mixed fruit
Cup of milk
Two cups of Self-Raising Flour sifted
1 beaten egg

Put the butter, sugar, fruit and milk in a saucepan and slowly bring to the boil, reduce the heat and simmer for four minutes. Allow to cool.

Once cooled, add the flour and eggs and mix well, tip into a lined loaf tin and bake for approximately one hour. (it may seem a bit lumpy, but so long as the flour is mixed in, it will be fine)

Check to see if cooked thoroughly with a skewer. If not ,bake a little further (it may need up to thirty minutes more, depending on your oven) until the skewer comes out clean from the cake.

Allow to cool in the tin. My Granny used to decorate with Glace Cherries, but you can use anything you like - Walnuts, Cherries, or glaze with melted apricot jam whilst still warm - the choice is yours! Granny used to cut into slices and spread with butter, but this is equally nice served plain.

I have no idea why this is called Bermuda Loaf as Granny certainly never went there, but the cake is a firm family favourite.

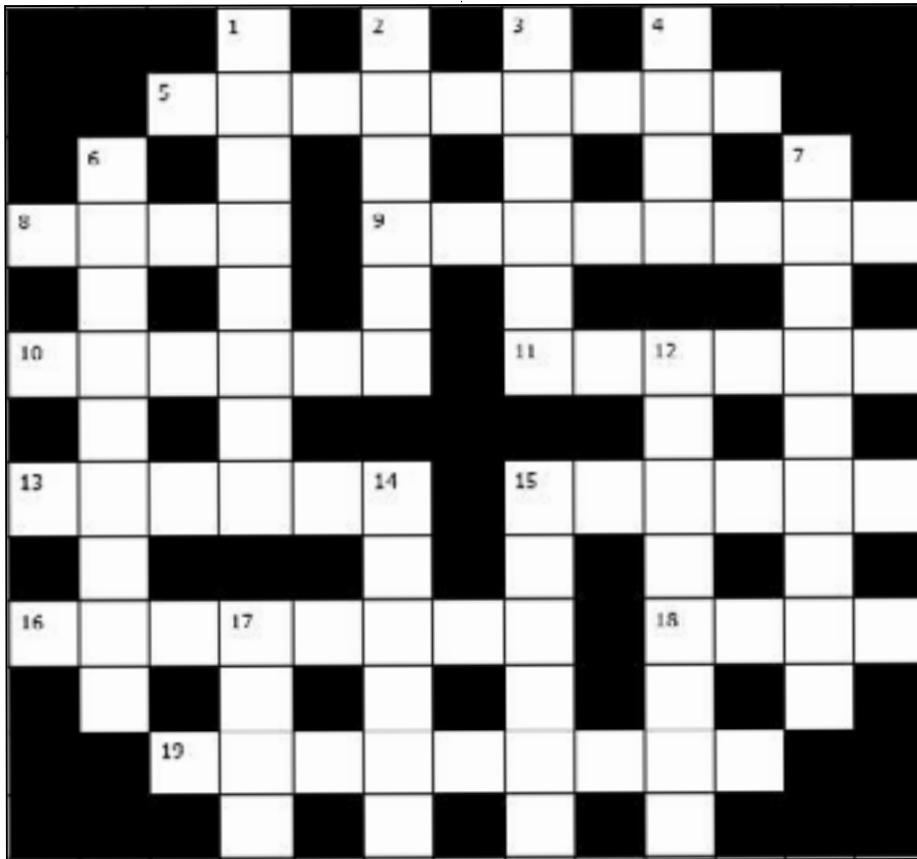
