The 'F' Word

I had a very sheltered childhood, I lived in a nice village in Nottingham, I had good parents, good friends and I avoided trouble. My whole life revolved around my BMX, my dog and spending my 35p wages (from being a milk monitor at school) buying sweets from our local newsagents.

But in the summer of 1989, my innocence was about to be shaken. I was having a sleepover at my friend's house, and he decided to watch a new video his parents had just bought. The film was 'The Running Man' starring Arnold Schwarzenegger. Man!! I have never been so scared in my whole life, it was crazy violent, and had a script of fairly strong language... for the first time ever I heard the f-word.

Your upbringing may be different to mine, but it was a word never spoken or heard by anyone in my family, my extended family or group of friends at school, so it had a profound impact on me. It almost felt like the end of my childhood.

I have since heard this f-word many, many times and it has become a very casual, normal, part of our language. I hear young children easily string a sentence of profanity today, because it is part of our communication and not necessarily a 'curse' word like it was.

But it interests me that this f-word that was such a taboo has become so commonplace, whereas a different f-word that was so commonplace has become a taboo. That f-word is 'faith.' It's still okay to have a belief in God, but faith, a living active relationship with God... that seems to be a step too far.

But this f-word completely defines who I am. It is why I believe in the power of prayer. That when I pray, my God hears me. I believe He speaks to me, I believe in miracles, I believe in the power of transformation, I believe in the power of forgiveness, the power of love. I believe that people can be healed and raised from the dead. I believe in plans and purpose for my life. I believe in life in all its fullness (John 10:10). I believe the Holy Spirit lives in me and guides my steps.

And for me this f-word joined all the dots. I couldn't fill my life with enough things to give it meaning. Faith was the only thing that made sense. The only time I have felt truly complete.

And faith is a gift of God. A relationship waiting for you to begin.

2019 Carnival and Beyond

We are struggling to put on a full programme of events for this vear's Carnival because of the lack of helpers. Next year, if more people don't help, there may not be a Carnival Day or Carnival Week – or it will be considerably curtailed. Some ask: "Why is Carnival the same or similar each year?" The reason is that we rarely get volunteers offering to do something different – not just coming up with an idea, but also managing and delivering the activity. Even existing events are poorly supported by villagers. For many years, I have organised and managed the Fun-Run, Five-a-Side Football and the Wheelbarrow Race, sometimes with very few participants. It is not because I particularly wish to do this each year, as I'm getting older (currently 73), but because nobody has been willing to take over from me, perhaps with some new ideas. This year, there have been two articles in Mutterings in March and May, appealing for more help. But apart from two people who have volunteered the use of a pickup truck and their time, the response has been silence.

Some examples of jobs that the Carnival Committee needs help with this year are:

Carnival Saturday morning: collecting tables from the School with a pickup truck; setting up stalls in the Park; staffing the Carnival stall; stewarding on the road and carpark; walking with the procession to collect money.

Saturday afternoon: clearing the Park at the end of Carnival events.

Sunday morning: collecting tables and chairs from the Village Hall with a pickup truck; serving cream teas; clearing away at the end of the afternoon including taking tables and chairs back to the Village Hall.



Monday evening: fun-run admin to put together a list of runners, stewarding the fun-run; recording runners' times. Help with children's lantern making.

Wednesday evening: stewarding the wheelbarrow race.

Thursday evening: stewarding the bike race.

Friday evening: setting up the Park for the lantern procession and fireworks; stewarding on the road and Park; helping to light lanterns and chaperoning children in the procession; collecting money during the fireworks; taking lanterns to the Village Hall.

Saturday morning: clearing rubbish from the Park.

So come on, Bonsall folk, it is up to you what happens this year, next year and beyond. Please contact either Julie Hamilton (07890 610929 or julie.hamilton@btinternet.com) or one of the other Carnival Committee members to let them know which of these activities you are willing to help out with for an hour or more.

Christian Aid



Infected Plum and

ALLOTMENT NEWS

If anyone is wondering what has happened to the damson trees along the edge of the allotment site, they've been stricken by a rare disease called Pocket Plum or Bent Banana Disease. They flowered beautifully and the fruit set fine, but since then the fruit has been infected which means it developed much more quickly than it should have and became elongated and hollow and yellow.... horrible. The advice for dealing with it, is to remove infected fruit and twigs and burn. The only other occurrences we've read about have only affected some of the fruit, but our case was even more unusual in that more or less all the very heavy crop of fruit was infected. So we've basically had to strip the trees down to their bare branches and burn everything

we took off. The disease doesn't normally affect the tree as a whole and removing the bad fruit is to insure it doesn't get re-infected or infect other trees next year, but it's hard to see that our trees will recover having had such a savage assault. It's very sad of course, we planted those trees when we first took on the site 15 (?) years ago....but that's gardening for you! Otherwise things seem to be going pretty well.

If anyone has plum or damson trees in their gardens, it might be worth checking for the disease and assuming it's just a few fruits, picking them off and getting rid of them safely.

Bonsall Parish Council Report for meeting on 18 June 2019

Vehicle speed data

The Council reviewed the data that had been obtained from the County Council speed survey in the first week of May at two locations on the Clatterway (just below the park and below the Black Tor road junction). The Council felt that the data for the two sites justified the need for the Twenty's Plenty scheme, and for slower traffic speeds in the village. In particular, the following was drawn from the report:

Lower Clatterway:

- **1.** Average speed on the Clatterway climb/descent to Nether Green was 32mph over the total survey period in a 30 mph limit;
- 2. Between 8.00am and 11.00am (408vehicles), more than 25%were travelling at 30-35mph
- **3.** A further 5% were travelling at 35-40mph
- 4. Most of the remaining traffic, 39%, was travelling at 25-30mph in an area where Councillors were of the view that a slower speed was needed
- **5.** Between 3.00pm and 6.00pm (431 vehicles), more than 20% of vehicles were travelling at 30-35mph.
- **6.** A further 6% were travelling at 35-40mph
- **7.** Most of the remaining traffic, 39%, was travelling at 25-30mph (again considered too fast)
- **8.** Over the survey period 12 vehicles were recorded at 40-45mph, and 3 at 45-50mph, on this monitor.

Upper Clatterway:

- **1.** Average speed on this part of the Clatterway approaching and leaving the Park Bottom play area was 29mph over the total survey period in a 30mph limit
- 2. Between 8.00am and 11.00am (401 vehicles), more than 10% were travelling at 30-35mph.
- **3.** A further 1% were travelling at 35-40mph
- **4.** Most of the remaining traffic, 43%, was travelling at 25-30mph in an area where Councillors were again of the view that a slower speed was needed
- **5.** Between 3.00pm and 6.00pm (410 vehicles), more than 10% of vehicles were travelling at 30-35mph.
- **6.** A further 1% were travelling at 35-40mph
- **7.** Most of the remaining traffic, 41%, was travelling at 25-30mph (again considered too fast)
- **8.** Over the survey period 1vehicle was recorded at 40-45mph on this monitor.

Use of the vehicle park

The Parish Council is considering whether there needs to be any regulation of use of the vehicle park once the Council begins to rent the land from the Diocese. Issues that were raised at this month's meeting included the current (free) long term car and lorry parking. The Council agreed that it was a sensitive issue affecting use of a key village facility, and that it was important to ensure that any decisions should involve as much input from the village as possible at each stage. The Council is looking to set up a working group to draw up guidelines on what might need to be done, and invites anyone interested to take part in that working group (contact the Clerk), or to pass on their views to the Parish Council via the Clerk or Councillors.

Park rubble stone

There is still some rubble stone in the corner of the vehicle park that is free to anyone who wants to take it away.

Electric charging points

The District Council have asked for any evidence of public demand for charging points to serve residents who don't have the benefit of having their own dedicated off-street parking. Narrow village streets were an example quoted. Funding was available for charging points. The key issues for the scheme is that demand must come from residents, must be in locations where households don't have their own off street parking, and must be freely accessible, day and night. It was agreed that the vehicle park could potentially be a suitable site in the future, and it was agreed to seek views of residents on this. Again please contact Clerk or Councillors with any comments.

Community noticeboard

It was agreed to purchase a wooden notice board to be sited on the wall at the Fountain for open community use. The cost of £530 will be mainly met by grant from the Derbyshire Dales District Councillor's Local Projects Fund grant of £380 (Councillors Joyce Pawley and Garry Purdy) with the balance being made up by the Parish Council.

Grass cutting at the park

The Council is still looking for contractors interested in taking on mowing work at the park. Please contact the Clerk.




