CHURCH NEWS

December in a vicar's life is simply Christmas. During the Christmas week alone we will have 28 services across the Wirksworth Team Ministry Benefice! Make sure you get to one, they are great community events, and a great reminder of God's love. This year we are hoping to do some inventive new things together with the school and the local community for Christmas. December is all go! I love the "over-the-topness" of it all! But for some, December is a month of "too much". Too much loneliness, too much stress, too much food...And then before you know it, January comes along! Why am I talking about January in a Christmas issue? Well, because even though we often think of January as a time to start over -often seen as the month of new beginnings-in reality though, it's often the month to deal with leftovers –and not just of the food variety! Don't get me wrong, I quite like leftovers...you can make lovely new meals out of your leftovers. But often we can make a meal out of other things too: negative comments from difficult family members, or sibling rivalry, or pushy bosses, or ungrateful children, or loved ones that just don't appreciate us... you know what I mean. I have found that when dealing with leftovers (food or otherwise) there are only

ever three approaches: they are either something you can deal with straight away (fridge option), or something that is too big to deal with now (freezer option) or something you really don't need and you decide to discard immediately (bin option). Fridge: Deal with these things now. The emotional leftover equivalent is the saying: "don't let the sun go down on a disagreement". Freezer: Some things need time to process-like the death of a loved one. You need time to grieve. Eventually though, these experiences can leave us with memories and feelings that pepper who we are. Bin: this option requires honesty. Have you ever left ½ tin of baked beans in the back of the fridge only to uncover it two weeks' later, covered in mould? Well, unfriendly comments from a colleague or a put down from a family member are the half-tins of baked beans of the soul. If you leave them to fester they become a health hazard. Bin, bin, bin –let them go, don't hold grudges and set yourself free. Jesus had a simple approach to human interactions, his motto was: "always do to others as you'd have them do to you". I wish you all a very happy Christmas, with very few leftovers!

In total, nearly forty people volunteer to help produce and deliver Mutterings eleven times each year. Currently, eleven editors divide the work between them, with four taking it in turn to collect articles and photos sent by village groups, and five who design each issue and liaise with the printer. After volunteers who work in Sheffield collect the copies from the printer, four editors take turns to distribute copies to thirteen deliverers (or a similar number of back-up deliverers when they are away) around the village. Eight editors have various supporting roles, including managing the advertising, crossword compilation, and management of the Hotmail account and the website (some having multiple roles).

PARISH COUNCIL

Bonsall Parish Council Report for meeting on 18 June 2019

Flooding

Councillor Garry Purdy explained the work of the District and County Council in dealing with the Matlock flooding and praised the work of the teams involved in emergency response.

He said that the 100 year event for which the Matlock flood defences were designed was now occurring much more regularly and that the District Council would be pressing the government for additional funding for the area.

Village traffic speed

The Parish Council wants to look at what more can be done to reduce speeding in the village. Anyone interested in this is welcome to join the working group; please contact the Clerk.

Bandstand

Councillors discussed a proposal for a bandstand for carnival and events; it was agreed that in principle this could be beneficial, subject to cost, and to look at this further next year once the land was in Council control.

Vehicle park

The Council received a report from the working group meeting of 29 October 2019. The group is looking at managing the vehicle park once in Parish Council control. Key issues identified by the working group were:

- allocating an area for camper van and other longer term parking (no more than 25%), and that type of use to be charged;
- an honesty box for visitors including coaches;
- park and walk to school to be encouraged, with a proposal to seek grant aid to hard surface the footpath from the vehicle park to the church;
- signage to be provided on the Clatterway, and in the vehicle

park setting out terms of use;

- improvement works to include repairs to dry stone walls, landscaping and thinning of trees to allow the rose hedge to grow;
- the possibility of a storage unit for carnival and well-dressing equipment (a plan had been prepared by Leigh Johnson, although other locations for this were discussed);
- discussion on managing lorry usage was deferred until the next working group meeting when Sam Bradley would be in attendance;
- the importance of retaining the current facility for loading of farm vehicles and similar was agreed;
- it was recognised that the situation had changed as the park area moved from management by the District Council/ Diocese at no cost, to where the Parish Council needed to meet rent of £800 pa and pay all maintenance for the recreation ground (excluding currently play equipment), and for the wooded bank and walls to the road. A mixture of voluntary and fixed charges for the vehicle park was needed to help with those costs and improvements to the land.

It was agreed to support these proposals in principle and to await the outcome of the next group meeting when further work on them would be undertaken.




