### **CHURCH NEWS**

For me one of the things that sets apart the human race as special, beyond all other elements of the animal kingdom, is our profound ability to love. Our ability to create a deep connection with individuals, or groups, that we call family or community, that we care for and are invested in completely. And all this happens because we have the remarkable resource of language. The unspoken body language that expresses our mood and feelings, and the spoken word that helps us articulate who we are, our hopes & dreams, our fears & doubts. I marvel consistently at this ability of words. I am an English scholar at heart and I love the sound of words and how structure and form can evoke beauty and emotion. I am amazed at how words can give strength, how they can make you blush, how they can fill you with excitement and make you feel awake. Also how destructive they can be, how a carefully chosen word can be as dramatic as a slap around the face, and can weaken our resolve and steal our motivation. But for me the greatest gift of language, is it gives me the ability to speak to more than just my fellow man, I have the means of communing with my God in prayer. And you have this ability too. You may think prayer is not for you. But you will have done it and you will continue to do it throughout your life, whether you intend to or not.

We have a built in function that we cry out when things are bigger than us. The stress of life, the heartbreak

of a situation, even sometimes the overwhelming beauty of everything, makes us want to cry out. Whether it is a demand for justice or help, or a simply a guttural scream in the wind, we have an urge to express ourselves to the void. But I believe... the VOID IS LISTENING. 'God is near to all who call to Him' (Psalm 145:18). I believe that this need to cry out was created in all human beings because however great our individuality, personality, wisdom or logic... life is bigger than we are, and we are not always equipped to deal with its bigness. But the great security for me is this, when the world seems too big for me, I trust in a God who is bigger.

Let me clarify. This does not mean God is my very own vending machine, that I put prayer in one end and get the things I ask for from another, (even though that is true sometimes). Prayer is not about just requesting stuff. It is about forming a relationship, in the same way you would a friend. It is speaking and sharing life. It is growing in love, with the one who created love. I want to encourage you as we are still near the beginning of 2020, to give time to see if prayer really works. Try calling out to God, see if He is listening. In the words of Humphrey Bogart it could be 'the beginning of a beautiful friendship.



She was the second child of Minnie and German Land. There were five more children: George, Edna, John, Olive and Herbert (still with us). She left school at 13 to work at the laundry and then to Masson Mill. She married Alf in 1948 and had four children: Norma, Dennis, Linda and Keith; two grandchildren, Timothy and Nicola; and five greatgrandchildren, Terry, Declan, Harvey, Reece and Kaden.

She loved her garden, especially her roses, and won the rose trophy on many occasions at the Horticultural Show. Two years ago, she was delighted to be asked to crown the Carnival Queen.

She enjoyed going to the coffee mornings at the chapel and she was in Church for the poppy remembrance service on 11 November.

She had a stroke seven years ago and got over that one, but unfortunately had another one and died on 16 December at Chesterfield hospital, with all her family with her. Her funeral service was on Monday 6 January and she would have been so happy to see the church full. # Wild Bonsall: Winter Birds in Horsedale

As usual, the arrival of Fieldfare and Redwing, Scandinavian breeding thrushes, in October 2019, heralded the start of autumn proper and the oncoming winter months in Horsedale. Large mixed flocks of several hundred birds feed on the vast supplies of berries that the many magnificent ancient hawthorn trees provide here. Some days, birds can also be found foraging for worms in the surrounding grasslands, often together with large numbers of noisy Starlings.

Snipe returned in November, with at least seven birds feeding in the wet areas at the top end of Horsedale prior to the introduction of cattle. Apparently in response to disturbance from these skittish animals, the Snipe have now moved on from here. Woodcock, that frequent quieter cattle-free wooded areas and hedgerows elsewhere in Horsedale, are still to be found, typically seen only fleetingly when flushed from the undergrowth as they are approached. Whilst this species breeds in UK, the majority of overwintering birds to be found in this country come from much further afield in northern and eastern Europe, with some travelling as far as 7,000 km from Siberian breeding grounds, as shown by recent satellite tracking studies undertaken by the Game and Wildlife Conservation Trust. The odd wintering Snipe might still be found by the pool at the top end of Horsedale, but Teal are perhaps more reliably found here now. A flock of around 20 of these small ducks returns to this area each winter, alternating between the pool in Horsedale and Blakemere to the north of the lane, where they often go un-noticed behind the reeds, except for their high-pitched whistling calls.

They have distributed more than 110,000 aid boxes and water filter units to countries all over the world in response to natural and manmade disasters, helping hundreds of thousands of people in times of crisis. The family filter units are assembled at their depot in Wirksworth. More than 10 billion litres of safe drinking water have been delivered in situations where the available water has been contaminated with life-threatening diseases. Aquabox also sends humanitarian aid with the filters, which include emergency shelter materials and tools, cooking utensils, personal hygiene items, and educational items and toys. No entrance fees but donations received on the night will go to Aquabox. Refreshments available.

## PARISH COUNCIL

# Report of 17 December 2019 and 21 January 2020 meetings



#### Vehicle park

A working group is looking at changes to management of the vehicle park once it becomes the responsibility of the Parish Council. At the December meeting, it was agreed to adopt their recommendations as follows (noting that not all recommendations had been unanimously supported by all group members):

- Long term lorry/trailer **parking:** if operator licences were varied by the Traffic Commissioners, and any conditions set by the Council's insurers were met, then permits for this use could be given by the Parish Council. The cost of the permit was still to be determined and this was to be discussed with vehicle owner(s);
- · No charges were intended to apply for casual use of the vehicle park for loading/unloading for farm deliveries etc:

- **Charging for lorries:** the views of a member of the public that use should be free were considered. The general view was that the situation had changed due to the tighter regulation of the haulage industry, and also because the village, through the Parish Council, was now being required to pay rent for the land (£800. pa) and to pay to maintain the land and the wider park area;
- Storage for carnival and well-dressing equipment: a plan showing a potential site for a 40ft screened container unit was discussed. It was agreed that a 30 foot unit should be sufficient. There was concern that this may need planning permission and that would have to be checked.
- Parking of cars/vehicles camper vans/caravans and coaches: it was agreed that it would not be possible or desirable to designate any separate area for this use, and this should be limited to no more than 25% of the Park area;
- Suggested charges: casual visitors £1 per day; coaches £5; camper vans/caravans maximum 2/3; permit £400 per year;
- **Improvement works:** the priority was agreed to be the resurfacing of the vehicle park; the material needed to be permeable to allow drainage due to flood risk. The border is to be edged with limestone blocks. The other main priority was agreed to be repair of the wall to the road.

#### PARISH COUNCIL

- Honesty box: it was agreed to seek a design for a box incorporated into a rock/stone feature as at the National Stone Centre; the face could be carved with T'Owd Man design. Grant funding is to be sought towards this;
- Signage: the need for signage was discussed, in particular that a "vehicles parked at own risk" notice should be installed.

The working group continues to meet, so any comments for them on the plans to date can be passed to the Clerk or local Councillors.

#### **Parish Council Precept**

In January the Parish Council agreed a budget for 2020-21 (available on the website) and also set the precept for 2020-21. This will be unchanged from last year at £18,500, equivalent to £55.37 for an average Band D household.

#### Slinter top quarry

The Council heard in January that the revised planning application is not now likely to be put out to consultation for some months; noise problems associated with the current use of the quarry continue to be reported.

#### **Burial ground consecration**

At the January meeting the Council finalised arrangements for consecration of additional land at the Parish burial ground. This will give an additional 18 places. The service on Thursday 6 January was led by the Bishop of Repton, Jan McFarlane.



#### Village traffic speed:

the January meeting received a report from the traffic working group. Their main recommendations that were adopted were:

- **Twenty's Plenty:** to change signs and locations during the next year;
- Speed monitoring sign: to seek to install an electronic speed monitoring sign at the park bus shelter where there was the highest risk to children; either through County support or purchase; it was noted that this would need careful design in the conservation area;
- Statutory 20 mph scheme: reducing fatalities/casualties was the key County Council criteria so this was unlikely to be met for Bonsall. The shortcomings of the County Council approach on this, and signage generally, was discussed; it was agreed that an approach jointly with other similar villages was more likely to

- be successful, particularly if coupled with lobbying the MP. It was agreed this was a longer term objective;
- Improved publicity: support of Mutterings on initiatives to date was welcomed. It was agreed to seek to raise the profile of the problem by a monthly article highlighting speed issues in various parts of village;
- **Signage at park:** the Council will look to site further Twenty's Plenty or similar signage at the Park to highlight children's safety;
- Poster: to prepare a poster that could be put in pubs/ cafe /B& B's/noticeboard etc. encouraging reduced speeding;
- Traffic priority scheme at top of Clatterway: to ask the County Council for traffic calming/priority traffic scheme as this was a potential accident point due to speed;
- 'No footways in village' sign: to ask County Council if this could be considered for Yeoman Street/High Street;
- Joint working with other villages:
  Brassington had reported similar
  experience to Bonsall in that no
  substantive action would be taken
  by the County Council given their
  casualty data. It was agreed to keep
  them updated on action, and to seek
  to identify other villages within
  the Derbyshire Dales' constituency
  which were addressing traffic speed.

The group is continuing to meet, so comments can be passed to the Clerk or Councillors.

### PARISH COUNCIL



#### **Churchyard trees**

The Parochial Church Council has made a contribution of £1200 towards the cost of clearing trees in the closed churchyard and cliff above Yeoman Street. The payment was received with thanks.

#### **Lea Road Closure**

At the January meeting, County Councillor Ratcliffe said that this closure (caused by a major landslip) was being given high priority, but it was still likely to be some time before it could be repaired as there were very complex ground conditions to deal with. The latest information from the County Council is that the work is aimed to be completed in 2020, but that timescale is subject to the results of ground surveys.

#### **District Council** waste collection

District Councillors reported that the waste contract tender had been awarded to the current company, SERCO, from May 2020. Because of changes in the waste collection market (only eight companies tendering for this work in the UK and only one other for this contract) the contract price was more than £1 million above the anticipated cost. The green bin garden waste service would be an opt-in service, at a first year cost of £35 then £50 per year. Questions were asked as to whether that would encourage garden fires or fly-tipping; this was said not to be the experience of other authorities who operated this system.

#### **Armed Forces Covenant**

At the December meeting it was agreed to adopt the Armed Forces Covenant, which recognises the contribution of those who have performed military duty, and the obligation on the community to ensure that they did not face disadvantage. Full details of the Covenant can be found on the website.

#### Faulty street light at the Park bus shelter

Cllr Barry questioned the repair time for this which had been reported by the Parish Council and others. It was apparently due for replacement but needed a new power supply, and this was the responsibility of Western Power, which was causing the delay. Cllr Ratcliffe agreed to chase progress on this.




