Christmas performances



T'Owd Man's Mutterings - 200 issues and counting

Peter Fellows charts the first 18 years.

Until 2002, the village had a bimonthly 'Bulletin', produced by the Parochial Church Council (PCC), which was actually an A4 photocopied sheet of news about the Church, edited by Brian Pearce. Brian had lived in Hong Kong for several years, where he acquired a dog that he named 'Hong Kong Ted' who he brought to live in Bonsall. Brian constantly referred in the newsletter to Hong Kong Ted's latest activities and, over the years, people's interest in the dog's antics waned.

Dale Spridgeon is a journalist who lived in the cottage next to the Queen's Head. In the summer of 2002, we were chatting in the Kings Head and agreed that it would be good to have a proper village newsletter that covered all interests.

Dale was willing to co-edit it and Bob Cartwright was keen to get involved with something new. We all thought it would have to be free to villagers, but none of us could see how to fund it, as there didn't seem to be any grants available - certainly not for long-term support. Then Claire Taylor suggested that we approach the 70+ businesses in the Parish to see if they would each pay for an advert. She found about 15 who were willing in principle, providing the cost was low enough. We got a quote from the Matlock Print shop and calculated that, with the advertisers, plus a small donation from each of the three churches and a grant from the Parish Council, we could produce a bi-monthly newsletter. This income would cover printing costs, but we wouldn't be able to

pay people to distribute it around the village and the moor farms.

We approached the PCC for support and we discussed a permanent 'Church Page' for the three churches to use as they wished. The PCC members couldn't have been more supportive, voting it through unanimously. They then introduced us to 14 members of the St James' congregation who had been delivering the Church Bulletin for many years. They too were highly supportive of the proposal, as were the other churches and Parish Council. So in November we decided to go ahead.

The next question was what would be the name of the newsletter (apart from 'Bonsall Village Newsletter', which we all felt was too boring). By chance, I was chatting with Tim

Howerd, who was a keen caver. He told me that lead miners used to refer to any strange noises in the mines as "T'Owd Man muttering". The name immediately jumped out as being perfect and we all agreed to call the newsletter 'T'Owd Man's Mutterings'. This didn't go down well with a few people, who thought it would encourage people to moan and complain. But after a couple of issues, the name had taken hold we've had nothing but support for the newsletter. Dale designed the layout and selected the fonts, Allan (Ted) Morris set up a template in Microsoft Publisher, and Bob and I edited the text and found photos. Claire set about collecting fees from advertisers and we brought out the first eight-page issue in January 2003, with the five of us as editors.

The PCC remained cautious about the new Newsletter until they had seen it 'in the flesh'. At that point, and to Brian's vexation, they ceased production of the Bulletin. Was it coincidence that Brian, his wife and Hong Kong Ted left the village a few months later?

In the first issue, Claire wrote a column that she called 'Bonsall Cross' which was intended for anyone who wished to have their say about something that was important to them. In the column, she complained about excessively loud fireworks at private parties. It produced the only negative reaction to the newsletter that we have had, with some people believing it would encourage arguments and antagonism, so we dropped the column. We named other sections 'Village Activities' (subsequently changed to 'Village Noticeboard'), 'The View from Uppertown', 'From Our Slaley Correspondent' and 'The Commercial Page', some of which continue.

In early issues, a regular contributor was Joe Else, a retired engineer who lived in Uppertown. He was a skilled model-maker, having produced large working models of an electric Ferris-wheel and a steam-powered lorry among many others, which he displayed at shows and carnivals around the county. In his 80s, he taught himself how to use a computer and a video camera, making and editing short films about aspects of his life in Bonsall. He wrote short, humorous articles for Mutterings on his memories of wartime and his work at Masson Mill. We had intended Mutterings to be bi-monthly, believing there was not enough happening in the village to support monthly editions, so the second issue was scheduled for March. However, we had so much copy sent in by villagers that we realised a monthly publication would be possible. No-one wanted to produce an issue before Xmas, so we settled on 11 issues per year with events in December and January combined.

Dr Bob Howie was a retired geology professor in his 80s, who was still producing abstracts of articles in geology journals. He agreed to edit the text of each issue and every month I took a printout round to his house on Glebe Close. Because he had difficulty walking, his door was left unlocked and I had to force a path to his study through pile upon pile of academic journals. I'd find him seated by his study window, surrounded by yet more piles of paperwork, hand-writing another abstract. I got to know Bob well and it was always a pleasure to spend half an hour chatting to him. He would phone over the corrections within an hour. Bob also donated £400 to Mutterings each year, so that we could produce a colour supplement for Carnival as well as a roundup of the year's events in the village.

We gradually expanded the editorial group to ten, with new people taking over as others resigned or moved away from the village. John March offered to set a cryptic crossword each month, which he did for many years until his untimely death, after which Pam McInally took it on and she continues today. We also organised the roles so that our workloads were reduced for each issue, with one person collecting together the text and photos, another designing the issue, a third being responsible for distribution, and new roles for people to manage advertising, the Hotmail email account and the website. The size of the publication also increased, with most issues having 12 – 14 pages.

In the early days, we had constant problems with Ken Drummond at Drummond Print who, for reasons best known to himself, wouldn't put Mutterings into his work schedule. We wanted to get it to every household in the Parish by the first of the month. But every month, despite him knowing that the print order would arrive five days before we wanted to collect the newsletter, it was a lottery as to

whether he would turn the job around on time. On many occasions, I had to spend an hour or more in his office, chivvying him along and sometimes having to collate the pages myself – it was all very wearing. I forget how we came across Nick Briggs, who ran a Prontaprint franchise (later 'Generate Print and Design') in Sheffield but, in January 2005, we decided to see how he fared with the printing. He provided an excellent service, even delivering issues to Bonsall if we couldn't find anyone to collect them, and he has printed Mutterings for the last 16 years.

Some of the current editors have been together for at least 10 or 11 years and we now have 35 people in the village who actively help to produce Mutterings, either as part of the editorial group or delivering the newsletter on one of the 15 distribution rounds.

The last 12 months have been very strange for everyone, but in March last year, we wondered whether we could, or should, try to produce Mutterings. The lockdown meant that there was no possibility of delivering it around the Parish and there was so little going on in the village that we couldn't even fill four pages, let alone 12-14. We had an editor's meeting and decided to produce an online (only) issue for the first time. There would be no cost involved as the only outlay of the newsletter is printing. We recognised that not everyone has internet access and so we asked people to print off copies from the village website to give to family members or neighbours who are not online. That is still continuing, but we look forward to resuming normal service as soon as we can.

Parish Council Report for Report of meetings on 15 December 2020 and 19 January 2021

ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION ACT 1990
BONSALL MOOR MOTOCROSS, BLAKEMERE LANE, IBLE, GRANGE MILL, DERBYSHIRE, DE4 4HT

Following our investigation into your complaint regarding excessive noise emanating from the above mentioned premises, I can confirm that we have concluded that a statutory nuisance does exist and therefore a noise abatement notice shall be served on the responsible parties.

A noise abatement notice requires the person/s responsible for causing or allowing excessive noise to abate the said nuisance and prohibit the recurrence of the same.

We have requested that the site operators introduce noise mitigation methods capable of reducing the noise emanating from motorcycles on the track to an acceptable level.

Derbyshire Dales District Council's Environmental Health team will continue to respond to complaints of excessive noise from the track and act accordingly.

I hope that you will find that this letter explains the Council's position. If you would like to discuss the matter please contact me on the telephone numbers shown above or alternatively by email.

Motocross on the moor

Councillors at the January meeting welcomed news from the District Council that the site was judged to be causing a statutory noise nuisance, and that they were serving a noise abatement notice on the owners. A member of the Bonsall Moor Action Group spoke to thank Derbyshire Dales District Council and their Environment Health Officer staff for their work in noise monitoring. They asked that the Parish and District Councils liaise with the Peak Park Planning Authority on this, as works on site such as construction of noise barriers may require planning permission. The representative said that there was still concern in relation to the issue of potential lead contamination, and said that the District Council should do more on this. It was agreed to write to the District Council to obtain details of the noise abatement notice and the action needed for compliance.

Condition of trees on Via Gellia

At the December meeting, County Cllr. Ratcliffe reported that a Via Gellia resident had had a tree fall onto their property, with potential risk to life. The January meeting heard that the County Council had inspected the trees, which were on private land, and that the landowner had been contacted. Cllr. Barry had again raised the danger posed by ash dieback in the Via Gellia, and the County Council said that they were appointing an officer to deal with this issue and to take on management of trees and highway safety on the road.

Park maintenance

In January, Councillors approved purchase of new football nets and also renewed the mowing contract with Roy Johnson Landscapes for the next season. The Council also asked to pass on their appreciation for his work during the last year.

Slinter Top Quarry planning application

The December meeting heard from Cllr. Ratcliffe that the application had been deferred for a site visit, and because members wanted more detailed questioning on the noise aspect of the application. It was agreed to write to the County Council to request that the Parish Council, along with other residents who had objected, should be given the opportunity to attend the site visit. The site visit should include visits to the key areas in the village affected by noise including Clatterway and Church Street, and take place when the quarry was operating with pecker work.

The January meeting heard that the planning application was now expected to be heard on the 15 February. Cllr. Grover expressed the concern of residents that there would be little time to respond to any substantive changes to the Officer report. It was agreed to write to the County Council seeking clarification of the date for the hearing and for the site visit, to record concern in relation to data and consultation, and to seek information on how residents or the Council might be able to respond to any substantive changes to the committee report.

Village road signs

Some additional signage has been requested to deal with traffic problems:

- an 'Unsuitable for Long Vehicles' sign on the Via Gellia at the mill to warn of the HGV limit on the Clatterway;
- additional signs at the Bank warning not to trust Satnav; at least four incidents occurred over Christmas of ambulances being stuck on the turn. The East Midlands Ambulance Service have been contacted and are looking to amend their system to prevent drivers using this route to Uppertown;
- 'No Footpaths/Pavement' warning signs at the Fountain for Yeoman Street and at the entrance to the village below Abel Lane. In support of the latter Cllr. Jackie Smith reported an incident on Yeoman Street where a pedestrian had been nearly hit by a lorry.

PARISH COUNCIL

Interment of ashes

The January meeting finalised plans for the establishment of an area for interment of ashes along the wall to the school, and approved fees for interment of £100 and for a memorial tablet of £100. This would allow for a plot size of 18" by 18", and up to two sets of ashes. The Burial ground policy is being changed to enable this, and it is hoped that the new facility should be available from the beginning of March.

Budget and precept

In January, Councillors approved a budget for 2021-22 (details are available on the village website), and also set the precept for 2020-21. This will be unchanged for the third year at £18,500, equivalent to £55.51 for an average Band D household.



Twenty's Plenty and speed limits

Cllr. Stephen Smith is representing the Council on the regional Twenty's Plenty group; the Parish Council would like to sign up to a national scheme to support a 20 mph limit in all built up areas, which would include the village. A decision on this will be taken at the February meeting, and if you have any views on this please pass them on to the Clerk or your local Councillor.

Storage of flood sacks

Flood sacks are now available from a grit bin in the vehicle park. A range of other storage options was considered and it was agreed that some form of container unit was needed for security. The Clerk said that, depending on size, this may need planning permission and the consent of the Diocese as landlord. Alternative sites for storage were discussed. It was agreed to refer this to the Vehicle Park working group meeting on 27 January for further consideration.


