# JOIN US ON ZOOM

We're into our third lockdown and there has been precious little that's been positive about this devastating pandemic we are still fighting through. The only exception perhaps, at least for me, has been our ability to keep on gathering as a community on Zoom, and for that I'm very grateful. Taking the time to reflect over the last 10 months and our journey together I started to wonder why it is that we still make the effort to gather in this way – after all we could have chosen to wait it out and come back together when the danger was over. But we haven't and I want to explore why I think we continue to meet online.

I believe that we gather, as we have always gathered as Christians throughout the centuries, not just for friendship and support but, I believe, because we are gathered by Christ. And God continues to call us together despite our current circumstances. I think Baptists call this gathering in covenant. A covenant between us and God but also between ourselves, as Christ gathers us. If this is the case, then gathering together is more than a habit, it is a matter of obedience, of discipleship. So, during lockdown, our services on Zoom are a matter of covenant responsibility to each other, of being a disciple because Jesus told us that where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them.

But I am aware that the technology involved can seem a bit scary and has proven a block to many, so below is a brief guide on How to get on Zoom. If you are completely new to Zoom chances are you haven't got the App downloaded on your computer or tablet or smartphone. That's OK, you don't need a Zoom account to join a service. If you don't want to download the app you can skip straight to the bit below that says: "Joining a service". However, there are many advantages to having Zoom downloaded onto your device and it's simple and free to do, so if you have a few moments, I would strongly recommend that you follow these instructions to instal the App on your device.

## Downloading the Zoom App

Zoom is compatible with computers and mobile devices, including smartphones and tablets like the iPad. You can download and install the app on your browser whether you have Microsoft or Apple software. The company also offers extensions for Safari and Chrome so you can navigate to the site with the click of

a button. Here's a step-by-step guide to downloading and installing Zoom.

### On a computer:

1. Open your web browser and navigate to the Zoom website at <https://Zoom.us>.
2. Click the orange "Sign up, it's free" button in the top right corner of the screen.
3. Enter your email address to sign up. You can also choose to sign in with Google or Facebook by clicking the respective links.
4. Download the Zoom browser app by going to <https://Zoom.us/download>. Click the blue button underneath "Zoom client for meetings."
5. Follow the download and installation instructions on your screen.
6. Once the app is installed, login using your sign up credentials.

### On a smartphone:

1. Download the app from the Google Play Store if you have an Android phone or from the Apple Store if you have an iOS iPhone.
2. Open the Zoom mobile app and sign in to your account or click "sign up" to create an account if you don't have one. Follow the prompts and enter your email and contact details if you're creating an account.

### On a computer

To join our Morning Prayer (9am daily), Evening Prayer (5pm Daily) or Sunday Team Service (9:30am weekly) from the desktop app or your computer just click on this link:

### OR

In the unlikely event that the link doesn't work, you can also join a meeting by going to <https://Zoom.us/join>. Enter the meeting ID number: 2732241372 and click the blue "join" button.

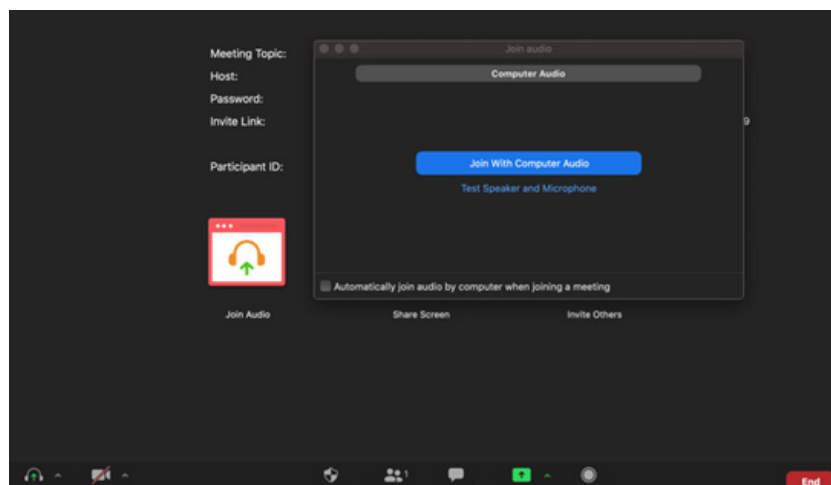
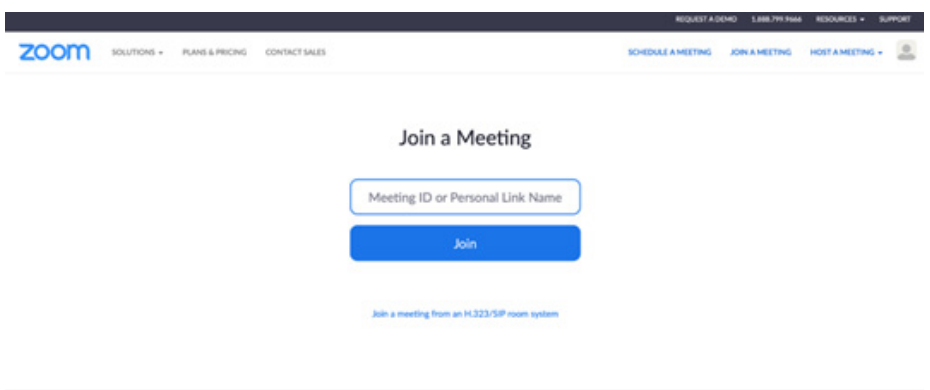
Once you hit join, you may see a screen featuring audio choices. Click "join with computer audio" to enable other attendees to hear you.

### On a smartphone:

If you're joining the meeting on your smartphone, open the Zoom app, and click "join a meeting." Enter the meeting ID number: 2732241372 and click the blue "join" button.

### On a landline:

Zoom has the facility to allow you to join a meeting even if you don't have access to the internet. Just pick up your landline telephone and follow these steps:

You will be then asked to wait to be connected to the meeting. Once connected you will be placed in the waiting room until the Host admits you. Then you will be able to hear and contribute.

# VILLAGE NOTICEBOARD

## Funeral Buns

Around 200 years ago there was a bake house in Bonsall and the baker at that time was Leedham Kirk. He later emigrated with his family to America and settled there. Recently one of his descendants sent a copy of some of his recipes to the History Group in Bonsall. The first thing in the book is Leedham's Funeral Buns. Being a regular home baker I decided to have a go at making some. I translated the weights from cups and had to guess at some quantities, but I am very pleased with the result. The recipe is below. Please let me know if you try them.

### Leedhams Funeral Buns:

Strong white bread flour 250g

Salt 1 teaspoon

Ground cinnamon 1 teaspoon

Milk 125g

Beaten egg 1

Sugar 30g

Yeast 10g of fresh or 5g dried yeast

Butter 30g

Dried fruit 50g

Zest of 1 lemon

In a bowl put the warm (not hot) milk, add sugar and yeast, when yeast has dissolved, add butter and beaten egg and mix. Then stir the salt and cinnamon into flour and add to the mix and knead for 5-10 minutes. Add

the dried fruit and lemon zest (this makes a fairly sticky dough and I used my Kenwood with dough hook.) Rest the dough in a lightly oiled bowl and cover with cling film (I use one of those shower caps you get in hotels) for about one hour. Turn out onto floured surface, gently knead, divide into six equal pieces, form into balls and slightly flatten, place on lined baking tray, place in a warm spot, cover and leave for 1 hour. Bake at 210 for 9-11 minutes. Cool slightly. Serve with light butter on top and sprinkle icing sugar

Notes: (I just split and butter them)

Best eaten fresh from the oven and if left for a day or so are delicious toasted and buttered. You can buy fresh yeast from Morrison's, the Health Food Shop in Ashbourne, Chatsworth Farm Shop, Taylor's Mill at South Wingfield where they also sell bread flour. Dried yeast - you can buy either in sachets (usually contain 7g) tins or large vacuum packs - it keeps for ages. Milk should just be warm and butter melted.

Whilst reading round this I discovered that the Dutch have a similar recipe - it is Krentenbol and also originated as funeral cakes but is now served at breakfast.

## Report of 16 February meeting

### Coronavirus impact on services:

District Council leader Councillor Garry Purdy reported how local virus levels had risen by 90%, but were now starting to fall. He said that the pandemic was causing problems for delivery of local services, and in particular front-line services were seeing a wide range of secondary social issues. The District Council was administering delivery of business grants, but strict new government checks designed to prevent fraud were slowing the distribution.

### Slinter Top Quarry planning application:

County Councillor Ratcliffe said that the decision on the planning application has been deferred again by the County Council. The Council are expecting the quarry company to make a new submission in support of the application. Any new submission would be put out to public consultation.

### Fly tipping at Salters lane:

Councillors Purdy and Ratcliffe were both involved in action to try to deal with this.

### Vehicle park:

Storage on the vehicle park for carnival equipment and flood sacks: the option of a corrugated metal shed similar to that historically on site was discussed, but not favoured on grounds of cost and construction time. The preferred option was a 20-foot container unit which could be clad with wood panelling and screened with plant boxes/troughs. An alternative site for this had been looked at but was unavailable. The District Council had indicated that it was unlikely to need planning permission (to be confirmed). It was agreed to seek detailed costs for this option and to report back.

### Honesty box:

Alan Pugh had agreed to work on this; noted with thanks.

### Twenty's Plenty and speed limits:

Councillor Stephen Smith reported on the work of the Derbyshire Twenty's Plenty organisation. It was agreed to support and adopt that group's objective of securing a 20mph limit nationally in all built up areas, and for that limit to be applied to the village.

### Flooding:

There had been a meeting between flood wardens and a County Council flood team officer on 11 February. The Parish Council endorsed the following key priorities for the County Council:

- Improvement to the gully/culvert at 73 Yeoman Street and water flow into the two drains/culvert on Yeoman Street below;
- A new gully to deal with High Street surface water from footpath/fields;
- To raise the highway kerb at top entrance to Cascades;
- Nether Green: to work with Severn Trent and the District Council to resolve the problem of continued blockage of the drain system;
- To advise on the feasibility of a bund on the vehicle park.

It was also agreed to purchase high-vis jackets as needed for wardens, and to put a flood sack storage bin at the Cross (next to the telephone box).

### Motocross on the moor:

As requested at the last meeting the District Council had been asked for information on the recent noise abatement notice. The Council had replied that "the notice simply states that the track is to abate the nuisance and prevent recurrence of said nuisance". The Council said that they have "made recommendations to contact other motocross sites to discuss how they manage noise from their sites; looking into formal training for marshals who carry out the static noise testing; limiting the number of days that the track operates, particular at weekends and employing the services of a specialist noise consultant. These recommendations are not exhaustive and the operators may look into different ways to control the noise". The Clerk

reported that he had been contacted by the landowner of the site, who strongly disputes the claim of land contamination. The owner had said that he intends to take measures to reduce noise to meet the requirements of the notice, and wants to work to meet people's noise concerns.

### Ward boundaries:

The Boundary Commission had put out plans to include Bonsall Parish in a new District Council ward linked with Winster. It was agreed to object to this on the basis that the interests of the village were more closely linked with those of Cromford; in particular in terms of shared issues such as quarrying and the use of the Via Gellia. Boundary Commission's public consultation on this is open until 12 April. The proposed new ward map can be viewed at: <https://consultation.lgbce.org.uk/node/22484>.

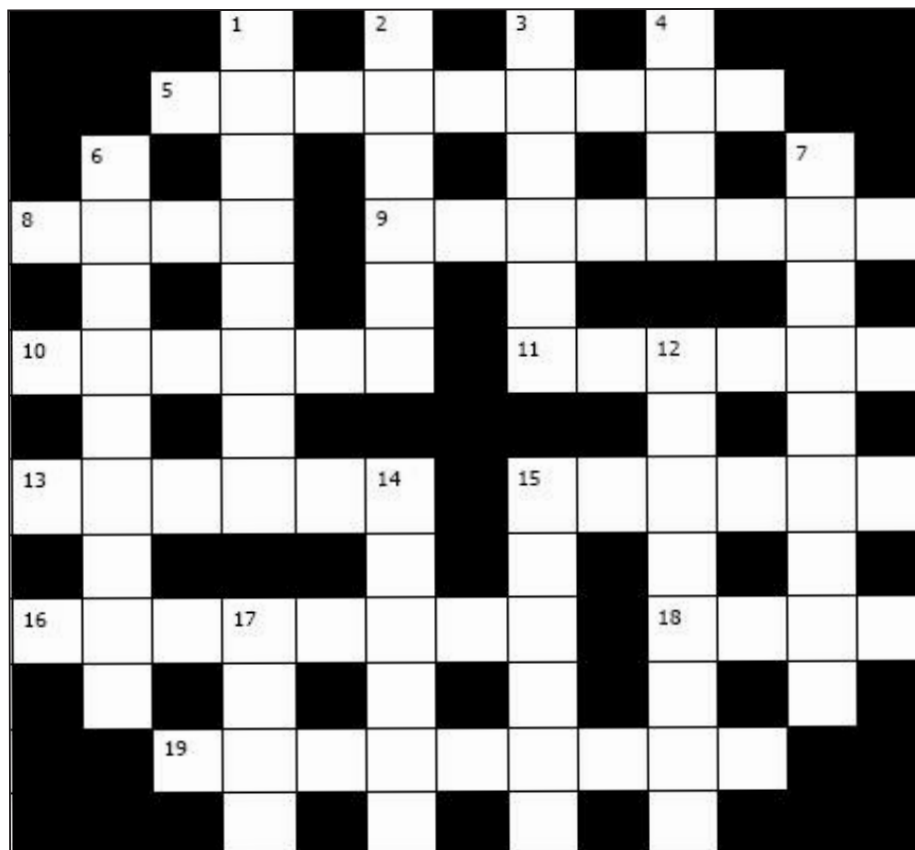
