

















CHURCH DIARY & CHURCH NEWS

Cliff Marshall

A Tribute to our Neighbour, Cliff.

Norma and Cliff have been our close neighbours for 37 years, sharing a path and many happy memories. I keep thinking and saying 'Norma and Cliff' because I always see them as a couple ... and a very close and loving couple. Married for 57 years, theirs has been that rarest of marriages ... very long, very happy and up to Cliff's last breath, devoted to each other. It will be so hard for Norma to move forwards without Cliff by her side, supporting her, championing her causes, providing the steady arm she has always known was there for her to lean on. Hopefully all the happy memories she has of her years with Cliff will sustain her. Along with the support of her family and friends.

As well as being a loving husband, Cliff was always a devoted family man, so proud in his own quiet way of his children and grandchildren. Seeing how Tim and Carol and Nichola and Rob, along with Terri, Declan, Harvey, Reece and Kaden, have all rallied round Norma so magnificently since Cliff died is testament to their upbringing and the strong ties that bind them.

So many other people have rightly commented on the Bonsall Memories website and in the many cards and letters to the family since his death that Cliff was a lovely man. He was. I can honestly say that in all the 37 years I have known him, I have never heard him say a bad word about anyone. Cliff was genuinely nice. He would help anyone and had time for everyone. For example, when we first moved here, I'd never lived in a house with a lawn, so I set about cutting the grass with a Flymo and with my inexperience, it's fair to say my new Flymo was flymoing everywhere. Cliff was walking past to his garden and could see it wasn't going well. He exchanged knowing glances with Margaret and then offered to show me how he did it, making sure he didn't make me feel incompetent. And that was Cliff; helpful, but never superior ... even when he clearly was!!

Cliff thought deeply about things and had the most wonderful dry sense of humour. I can think of so many times down the years that he has had us laughing out loud with his sage, deadpan one-liners. All he'd permit himself to do was smile ... but oh the twinkle in his eyes as we rolled around!! My lack of gardening skills continued to be a talking point between us. I was so bad at strimming the trees in our garden that Norma and Cliff couldn't bear to watch, especially after I'd cut through the washing line twice, cut through the strimmer's electrical cord AND surfed

to the ground as the dry stone wall I was standing on collapsed. Afterwards, I left Cliff a note to tell him where I'd put his ladder. Next time he saw me, he said with a twinkle in his eye, how happy he was to get the handwritten note because then he knew I still had at least one good arm left after I'd been strimming!

So Margaret and I feel truly blessed that Norma and Cliff have been our neighbours for all these years. We will miss Cliff SO much. Cliff was the kind of man who never blew his own trumpet, he never sought the limelight, but he had a lasting impact upon the people lucky enough to get to know him well. Margaret and I will cherish the memories we have of a gentle, wise and witty man who lived such a good life.

Sonia Gladys Webster

Sonia was born on 19 April 1938 in Bonsall and lived in The Dale near the Chapel, along with her brothers and sisters – Dennis, Betsy, Sheila and William. She attended school in Bonsall and on leaving school, worked at Masson Mill and Hollins Mill (The bottom of the hill mill). She met Charlie when she was walking through the village. Charlie had come over from Elton on his motorbike with two mates Enoch Brownlee and Chuck Johnson. They chatted, romance blossomed and four years later they were married at St James Church on 25 July 1959.

They first lived in Slaley and then moved to Uppertown. Their twin sons were born in 1963. The midwife delivering her first-born son, Charles, asked if she would like another baby. Sonia replied: "Yes in another two years' time". "How about now?" said the midwife and Richard was born! Sonia had not known she was expecting twins! Greg was born three years later. The boys' friends were always welcomed into Sonia's home as were family and wider friends too. Sonia's hospitality was well known - the buffet table was full to overflowing, and everyone looked forward to fantastic parties and celebrations.

Sonia loved Bonsall and loved participating in village life in various ways – Carnival, Well Dressings, Chapel and the Chapel Ladies Choir, singing duets with Norma and Linda at various services near and far, Young Wives, Fountain Youth Club and Barley Mow darts team. She was also gifted – writing plays and pantomimes performed in the village; Sonia made costumes for all the children and adults in the family for Carnival and decorated the floats, believing all had to made from scratch.

Sonia was well known for her love of animals and she rescued bats and jackdaws. Hedgehogs would be left with her to hand-rear – you name it, Sonia cared. Bonsall Football Team appreciated her support but the linesmen and referees had to beware – Sonia soon sorted them out if there was something amiss in her eyes!

When the boys were older, Sonia worked as a career at Herbert Lodge Care Home, where she was highly thought of by those she cared for. When the home closed, she went to Winster Manor Care Home, again going the extra mile for those she cared for. Sonia enjoyed visiting Australia five times to see her sister and nieces, plus sightseeing.

Sonia recovered from a stroke around 15 years ago, and she then had second one and was diagnosed with vascular dementia. In 2017 she was diagnosed with Alzheimer's. Sonia lived at home until developing pneumonia, resulting in a few days in hospital. Then a move to Valley Lodge Care Home on 1 October for one day only, where she was briefly cared for by nieces Pamela and Nellie, passing peacefully away on 2 October 2021.

Re Cannonballs

After reading the article from Bob Spowart my uncle, Henry Rickards, told me that he had found similar stone balls. When Parish Quarry was slipping (that stopped the quarrying), they were digging out to try to stabilise the face. They came across various patches of silica sand and buried in this were lots of stone balls in different sizes - some like Bob's, others larger. A scientist on site explained that during the ice age these boulders would have been rolled along with the sand down the Via Gellia from Pike Hall, Minninglow area (DSF uses silica to make their fire bricks and there used to be a sand quarry in the area). These stone balls are very hard, the largest were put into the stone crusher only to break the machine due to being round, ripping the edges off the teeth. It could be that some rolled another 400m down the road to Bob. Hope that this might shed a little more light on the mystery of the stone balls. David Rickards.


- · Transport (e.g. bus services, cars/lorries in the village, cycling)
- \cdot Work (e.g. types of work, pay and conditions, travel to work, workmates)
- \cdot School (e.g. teachers, lessons, playtime, outings, travel to secondary schools)
- · Leisure/sports/pubs/games/outings (e.g. football and other sports, horses, pigeons, pub teams, social events, women's groups, organised outings)



- · Church/chapels (e.g. vicars/preachers, attendance, changes to buildings)
- · Childbirth/childcare (e.g. local midwives/doctors, birth at home, services/facilities available)
- · Celebrations (e.g. national celebrations, carnival and other village events, day trips)
- · How we lived (e.g. foods eaten, gardening, home preservation, illnesses/local remedies/medicines, types of clothes/shoes in fashion, shopping, household facilities/gadgets, house repairs)
- · Other (e.g. changes to the village, arrival of new people, changing fads and fashions)

The next meeting will be on Wednesday November 10 at 7pm in the Village Hall when the group will discuss who to interview, who will do the interviews and who will transcribe them. The Story of Alfred Godbehere

(Put together by Bonsall folk.)

The story of Alfred Godbehere came to light through a document belonging to Nick and Jane Day and my thanks goes to them for letting me share it. After learning a little about Alfred's childhood, he seemed to disappear from the records. Karen Firth and her brother, Richard Kirk, came to the rescue. They had Godbeheres in their family tree and some clever detective work by Richard found Alfred again as an adult.

Alfred was born in Matlock Bath in 1838 to an unmarried mother but was first recorded in Bonsall census records aged 3 and living on Clatterway with Joseph and Mary Godbehere. The 1841 census shows Alfred's surname as 'Gudless'. His relation to the Godbeheres is not mentioned. Joseph and Mary were both aged 50 at this time and appeared to have no other children. Perhaps this was an informal adoption. Joseph was a stone sawyer, working in the quarries.

In December 1844 when he was 6 years old, Alfred was baptised in St James, Bonsall. His birth mother was given as Caroline Douglas. We don't know if the baptism at the rather late age of 6 was requested by the Godbeheres or by Caroline Douglas or indeed whether the birth mother was present. She is mentioned in the church record as being a sojourner (temporary resident) of Cromford. No other information about her has been found yet.

In 1851 the small family of three was still living on Clatterway. Alfred was listed as 'stepson' and 'scholar'. He was now about 13 years old.

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
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On 12 August, 1853 Joseph and Alfred had a meeting with Josiah Oliver in the presence of a lawyer to sign an indenture of apprenticeship. Josiah was a framework knitter who also became the publican of the New Inn (now the Fountain Tea Rooms). He was the son of William Oliver who owned several properties on The Dale including a framework knitting workshop where Josiah may have worked.

This indenture document was an agreement in which Josiah took Alfred as an apprentice to teach him the art of framework knitting. The apprenticeship was to run for 5 years. Young Alfred was bound by the following conditions: to serve his master faithfully and keep his secrets, to do what his master lawfully commanded, to do no damage to his master nor see any done by others, not

to waste his master's goods or lend them. In 1857. The same year his adopted He should not commit fornication or contract matrimony, play cards, dice table or any other unlawful games. He should not haunt taverns or playhouses!

Josiah agreed to provide constant employment for his apprentice and to pay him weekly, according to the usual scale paid locally to similar apprentices and teach him his trade to the best of his

Joseph agreed to provide Alfred with lodging, food and clothing, medicine and all other necessaries.

Alfred and Josiah were able to sign the document. Joseph made his mark.

It was common for the parish overseer of the poor to find apprenticeships for orphans and very poor children. These were often for domestic work and labouring but this was an apprenticeship to learn a skill and therefore merited a fee. Although he was not a rich man, Joseph duly handed £7 to Josiah to seal the agreement (over £600 today). Josiah acknowledged receipt of this sum on the reverse of the document and all signatures were witnessed by the lawyer.

Had all gone well, the apprenticeship would have finished in 1858. Sadly, Mary Godbehere died in 1854, followed by Joseph in 1857. Both were buried at St James'. This left Alfred potentially homeless and with no means of support. It was unclear whether he was able to finish the apprenticeship and his story might have ended here without the help of Richard Kirk who realised that around this time Alfred stopped using the name Godbehere and started to use his birth mother's surname, Douglas. Alfred Godbehere became Alfred Douglas and appeared again in the records.

father died, he married Charlotte Rosa Henstock at the Reform Weslevan Methodist Chapel in Holloway. This was before the official end of the apprenticeship which forbade marriage. There is no evidence to say whether he ever worked as a framework knitter but by the 1861 census, he was living at 1, Cross North Side, Bonsall. He was about 23 years old and living with his wife, Charlotte, his sons Alfred (age3) and John (9 months), his mother-in-law, Elizabeth Henstock, and his sister-in-law, Lavinia Henstock. He was working as a book keeper. In 1866 his only daughter, Gertrude Elizabeth Douglas, died at one By 1871 the family had moved to Lea

and Alfred was still working as a book keeper, almost certainly for the Smedley factory at Lea Mill. It is believed that Josiah Oliver's family took their knitted goods to Lea Mill for payment. Perhaps Alfred was introduced to the factory by the Olivers. He must have shown great promise to be taken on as a book keeper. He remained at the factory as their cashier and book keeper for the rest of his working life.

Charlotte, his wife, died in 1880 at the age of 44 and in 1882 he was married for the second time to Rachel Horsley.

By 1881 he had been joined at Lea Mill by his younger son, John, now aged 20 and also working as a book keeper. His elder son, Alfred H. Douglas, was employed as a cashier at Smedley Hydropathy in Matlock.

Alfred H. Douglas must also have shown great promise and quickly became the manager of Smedley Hydropathy. By 1891 he was living on the Chesterfield

Road, Matlock, with his wife, three sons, his mother-in-law and a domestic servant. In 1893 he died suddenly during a visit to his father's home. According to the dates on the silver plate carried on his coffin, he was 36 years old. He was well liked and respected. There were many friends and relatives at his funeral including the managers of the Smedley Company and about fifty employees connected with the Hydro. He was buried in Holloway

By 1901, Alfred senior was still working at Lea Mill and living with his wife, Rachel, and a domestic servant. His younger son, John, was married with a young son and still also working at the factory.

When Alfred retired, he moved to Bradford Villa, Chesterfield Road Matlock. Could this have been his son's home? Alfred died in 1907 at the age of 69. Probate describes him as a 'gentleman' and his estate was valued at £23,038-17s-11d (equivalent to £2,000,000 today).

This was a long journey for a young boy born illegitimate and raised by elderly adoptive parents on Clatterway. Apart from his baptism, no other details of his birth mother have been found and nothing is known about his father. Whatever genes he inherited, he and his sons were clever, talented men who did exceptionally well.

Thanks again to Nick and Jane Day, Karen Firth and Richard Kirk for their invaluable contributions helping this story to be recorded and remembered.

Ideas for the Bonsall Village Sign

On a drowsy autumn Sunday afternoon. a number of residents came to the Village Hall to share their ideas for a new Bonsall Village Sign. Some people came to talk about their suggestions, while others came with drawings (such as those previously published in Mutterings from Alan Pugh and Jean Robertson).

Graham and Jenny from Clatterway showed us a selection of sketches. There was the Skyline sketch showing field-barns, hills, St James Church and a crane, fronted by stone walling. (image 1) Then, there was a delightful cartoon of our T'Owd Man tunnelling around a frame and another border showing locally growing Leadwort. (image 2)

A further exciting idea featured the name Bonsall, with the 'O' depicting the unique bronze brooch, found near the village in 1862. The traces of Ogham Script (on the reverse) suggest an Irish origin, of the seventh or early eighth century. (image 3)

Graham produced two further drawings, one was a complete design (image 4), showing St James, rolling hills, a Frameknitters Workshop, the Cross, and T'Owd Man. The other (image 5), more simple; featured a pinch stile in a drystone wall, with hills beyond.

During the afternoon other Village Hall visitors offered their comments: "I like the one with the cross dominating", "Not too much detail or it will all blend into one", "T'Owd Man somewhere",

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
"Meadow flowers and birds possibly", "should mention hamlets too".

Courtesy of pictures kindly shared by the Village Sign Society, there were many examples of sign designs from around the country. The slides also showed a range of production methods from carved wood and cast aluminium, to painted fibreglass and punched metal (image 6). The latter seemed to be most popular for clarity of image and ease of long term maintenance.

It has been suggested that all the ideas might now be presented to the Parish Council and that they be tasked with the difficult decision of selecting the most appropriate design elements. If you have any further suggestions to contribute please send them to the Parish Clerk by 15 November, for Parish Councillors' consideration. Following this there will be a phase of research looking into sources of funding, the best manufacturing company to approach and other considerations concerning County Council and highways regulations etc. We look forward to reporting on the progress of the Parish Council's

Report for meeting 19 October 2021

Councillor Denise Pountain

Denise has resigned from the Council with effect from this month, ending a long period of service for the village. The Council recorded their thanks for her work, and have started the process of advertising for a replacement.

Refuse Collection

Cllr Purdy apologised on behalf of the District Council for further problems with the service due to a strike and work to rule of SERCO staff, which was outside of the Council's control. He said that the Council was commissioning an independent review of the operation of the SERCO waste contract and hoped that a report would be available in the New Year.

Coronavirus

Cllr Purdy said that case numbers in the District were rising, particularly in schools. The area did have a high percentage of double vaccinated people but he advised continued caution to reduce transmission.

Motocross on the moor

Cllr Purdy reported that Environmental Health are very aware of the concerns about lead, and are monitoring the situation. As this is a live investigation we cannot comment further at this time but the Council is in consultation with the Health and Safety Executive (HSE) and UK Health Security Agency (UKHSA) to ensure the duty holders are fully informed. He said that a further report on this was expected shortly. The planning appeal for the motocross site has been set for 15/16 February 2022; the venue is still to be announced.

Arts Trail 18/19 June 2022

The Arts Trail organisers came to the meeting to outline the event planned for next year. The group wanted to use the park for a gazebo and marquee; the aim was to centralise the event and make it accessible, although in future years

it should return to being in individual homes. It was possible that a temporary road closure application might be made. Insurance cover and risk assessments would be in place. After discussion the Council agreed to the request for use of the park for the Arts Trail on the weekend of 18/19 June 2022.

Picnic bench at the park

The park has a new picnic bench thanks to a donation from Siobhan Haymes, in memory of her father Haydn Rowlands.

Repairs to Cross

The Cross was damaged by a vehicle around 12 October and left needing serious repair work (see photo). Richard Webster arranged to immediately secure the dislodged stones, and then for the area to be re-mortared the next day. The work was not charged, and the Council recorded their thanks to Richard and those involved.

Public Space Protection Orders

The District Council rules governing the park and other public spaces in the village are being reviewed. The District Council is considering some changes to the orders across the District, including to change 'dogs on lead by direction (of a Council officer)' to a requirement for dogs on lead. The Parish Council supported this change to require dogs on a lead in the park. It was also agreed to request removal of the Old School Yard on the Dale from the order, as it was no longer a public space.

HGV Bankside

On 30 September an HGV was stuck on Bankside for over 7 hours after attempting the route from Uppertown; the Council viewed photographs of damage caused to the road surface, retaining wall and verge. The County Council had inspected the retaining wall but the outcome of that was not known. It was agreed to write to the County Council to seek an update on that, and to report what appeared to be a collapsed drain along the verge.

Yeoman Street land

Pete Spencer and a volunteer group have worked to improve this site, and another volunteer day will be arranged in the spring. The District Council has offered to let the Parish Council manage the land: it was agreed to take up this offer so long as it did not involve repairing obligations.


