OBITUARY

Gerald Spencer

1922 - 2022

Elder statesman, Gerald Spencer of Uppertown, Bonsall, who died 10 January (two months short of his 100th birthday), was a countryman who specialised in his knowledge of Bonsall Moor, its history and fauna. He was the last of nine siblings whose family settled in Bonsall and the White Peak area for many generations.

Educated at Bonsall School, he left at 14 to work on local farms. Then afterwards he was a Hopton quarryman, and a line-layer for the electricity board in Matlock. He walked to and from each location daily, as he never held a driving licence. He was conscripted into the British Army in 1941 and after training went with his regiment to the Faroe Isles under 'Operation Valentine'. This was an inhospitable landscape where the British guarded the Islands against German invasion, a fate which befell its larger neighbours, Denmark and Norway.

A quarryman's son, he was born in Slaley on 23 March 1922. Several relatives served with distinction in the Great War and are commemorated on the War Memorial opposite the Kings Head. A brother was killed during WW2 in Italy, leaving a baby daughter, and Gerald's mother's hair turned white overnight on hearing the news. Modestly, Gerald downplayed his contribution to the war effort, despite surviving as a stretcherbearer at the D-Day landings, where he was narrowly missed by numerous German bullets whistling past his ears. Whilst hostilities with the enemy continued, he spent three uncomfortable nights attempting to sleep in shallow burrows dug into the ground, offering a small degree of protection.

D-Day left him with a high regard for America, whose troops suffered great losses in battle. In the Faroes, he found the locals somewhat unfriendly, having no desire to be caught up in a war so far



from their shores. Being the youngest conscript, he was appointed 'Company Runner' (a position similar to that of Private Pike's in Dads Army) where, supplied with a bicycle, his duties included haggling with locals over the price of fish and cutting peat to keep the billet stoves burning. This position also involved being a 'dogsbody' for the Sergeant Major and he received an additional daily tot of rum from his superior for his trouble. He turned down promotion to Lance Corporal twice, having no desire to stay in the Army any longer than was necessary. Leaving the forces in a well-cut suit in 1946 to return to Bonsall, (after departing the Faroes) he first worked at London Docks, unloading food from the colonies and later spent a short time guarding prisoners of war.

He married Irene Bunting in 1947 and, after living in several houses, they eventually settled at Mooredge, Uppertown, where his in-laws had resided, for the remainder of their lives. Walking the moors, he became an expert on orchids, Lily of the Valley and wild flowers generally, as well as different types of mushrooms growing in secret locations, whose whereabouts he kept close to his chest. He watched out for the results of Chesterfield FC and Derby County avidly. Never known to take a holiday, he enjoyed the odd bus excursion for the day with Irene and he had a very keen grasp of geography in the UK and further afield. He was fond of passing time with others, particularly young people, to whom he held a special fascination. He also liked a pint with friends, including Chas Webster, Joe



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Bunting and Fred Marples, when they became known as 'the last of the summer

Of good height and solidly built, he was firm of purpose and straight as a die. His politics were slightly left of centre and he maintained his sense of humour until his last years, when he was very deaf and he found hearing aids tiresome contraptions. He was blind in one eye from childhood as a result of an accident playing with his friends. These setbacks were but minor interferences to such a

He qualified for the French Legion d'honneur medal (the highest French merit award for gallantry), but Covid intervened before grandson Robert could source a medal, which he had intended doing. His wife predeceased him by a few years, but he leaves his daughter Linda (of Hollies Farm), four grandchildren and three great grandchildren with a wealth of memories of this interesting, if understated man.

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Second Homes and Holiday Lets

I wanted to contribute my personal thoughts to Peter Fellows' article 'Second homes and holiday lets' in Mutterings in February. I asked Peter to identify evidence he has used for his views, and I then summarised what I think are his points of concern from his article, in my own words.

Peter's concerns:

- 1) If there are too many second homes and holiday lets it reduces the number of homes available to rent by young people, which can lead to reduced births and therefore risk the viability of the school. The demographic of the village changes, so activity groups can be less well attended, again contributing to the viability of the community.
- 2) Houses empty for long periods reduce neighbourliness and community cohesion and houses used for short term holiday lets do the same.
- 3) Some people can feel insecure and intruded upon when they see unknown people outside their homes.
- 4) There has been a Derbyshire Dales District Council consultation about residents' views on increasing the Empty Homes Premium and there may be a case to ask them to apply increased council tax to holiday lets and second homes.
- 5) People selling their homes are asked to consider whether the buyer will live in and contribute to the village.
- 6) Peter references an article in The Times (George Grylis 15/1/22) which debates whether licences may be required for homes to be used as short term holiday lets.

Peter did not provide references to evidence of harm done by second homes and holiday lets on village school or activity group viability, people feeling insecure, or neighbourliness. However I think we have to understand if there are genuine feelings and fears about the village demographics that are widely held. I don't know either way, but it would be useful to have evidence. I do want to create some clarity though between all the types of home ownership he discussed.

Second homes – homes in Bonsall owned by people who don't live in Bonsall but visit for a holiday. My view is mixed on this. Peter doesn't give a breakdown but I don't think there are very many of these. I do know quite a few residents who have holiday homes elsewhere though (including the super-stressed rural communities of the south-west) and if we did a poll I am guessing that there would be more owners living here with empty homes elsewhere, than empty homes here with owners visiting from elsewhere. I know I would have a second home if I could afford it, somewhere warm and sunny! Should owners pay extra to support the community the home is taken from? Yes I think they should. Should we request people to not sell to second home-owners? No, that is personal freedom of choice and market forces.

Holiday lets:

- 1) Homes that could be long-term rentals which are used for holiday lets. Market forces again; do we know what Bonsall rental rates would be and whether they would be affordable for local young peoples' income? That information would help inform the debate about whether homes should be protected for local renters. And are we prepared to ask landlords to only rent to local people, and how would that be defined? Being a landlord is also a commercial opportunity although it is treated by HMRC as investment income.
- 2) Buildings that are not able to be longterm rentals which are used for holiday lets. This includes our Bailey's Barn which is the only one in Bonsall also in the Peak District. We are not allowed to let it long-term by the Peak Park and by our own insurers. Some in this category will be informal room-lettings, others will be businesses who pay rates and taxes. Some will qualify as Furnished Holiday Lets and by treated by HMRC in a similar way to hotels, some will just add the income to their tax return. Some use agencies for selling holidays, some like using AirBnB, others never would, and yet others market their properties themselves. It is not helpful to think of all holiday lets as the same, but for the most part they are businesses. And businesses contribute, as Peter said in his article.

There are many different personal circumstances which lead to the creation of holiday lets and we have to be careful to think of them as individual owners. Some have said to me they are investing now so that their grandchildren can have a home in the village, others that they moved away to somewhere more affordable and let their Bonsall home in order to make ends meet, and yet others who would struggle to stay in their village home on a pension and use income from letting to help. You

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cannot link all of these together with second homes as 'harmful to the village and reducing community cohesion'. It is a much more nuanced situation than Peter's article might suggest.

All tourism visitors contribute to the local economy. The latest Great British Tourist Report states spend per trip in England was £196. There are no stats for the Covid years, but I am guessing that there will have been more trips in the last six months, and therefore more spend. I suppose my point is that we need clear evidence before we make claims which in themselves may cause ill feeling. I know a few accommodation owners who are not putting February Mutterings into their holiday lets as they feel it could make guests feel unwelcome.

The situation is very different between second homes, rental properties and commercial holiday lets. Let's accept that we each had a journey to get to the point we are now and that the vast majority of people in the village support it wholeheartedly and would not want it to be damaged, even if the needs of their own family circumstances naturally take priority when they are looking at their own finances and making decisions about property.

Empty Homes Tax Update

Further to my note in the February issue, DDDC is set to introduce an Empty Homes Tax from April 2023. The Council estimates that there are 776 empty homes in the District, with 181 empty for more than 2 years, 37 empty for 5 years or more, and 38 empty for 10 years or more. Houses that have been empty for 10 years or more will be charged quadruple council tax, those that have been empty for 5 – 10 years will be charged triple tax and those empty for 2 - 5 years will be charged double council tax. The District Council will also reintroduce the role of Empty Homes Officer at a cost of £38,000 p.a. for an initial three years, to work with home owners. In total, the additional tax is expected to bring in around £516,000 p.a. of which about £72,000 will go to the Council.

Nepal Appeal Update

Food donation distribution in Mushar Basti.


Alan and I are really pleased to report that the £1,000 raised from donations received last year from Bonsall residents and others has now been spent on essential foodstuffs for needy families in the area of south east Nepal where our good friend and trekking guide, Bijay and his family, come from. In February's Mutterings we reported that Bijay was in the process of obtaining prices for foodstuffs for 52 families who all live in the community of Mushar Basti, Bardibas. We have ended up extending the help to 68 families, the total number of families living in Mushar Basti, which is brilliant! Each family have received 20kg of rice, 2kg of lentils, a litre of cooking oil and two packets of salt,

and enough Dal Baht for about six or seven weeks depending on the size of the family. Bijay and his father have organised the purchase of the food and distribution, which was no mean task. On behalf of all the families that have received assistance, Bijay sends his sincere thanks. Alan and I would like to personally thank everyone who donated to the appeal; all the money raised has now been spent on essential foodstuffs. Bijay has produced a video of the presentation of the food to the families. Two local community leaders were present and are both pictured in the photo with the gold coloured 'scarfs' along with Bijay, who has a white polneck jumper on. Re: article in February's Mutterings on **Revised Electoral Boundaries**

The article states: 'In February 2021, the Local Government Boundary Commission for England published its draft recommendations for revised electoral boundaries in Derbyshire Dales. Part of this proposal was to change the existing Masson Ward, which includes Bonsall, Cromford and Matlock Bath, and to place Bonsall into a new ward called 'Bonsall & Winster'. In conversations with a few folk in the village, they raised their objections to being allied in this way to Winster. I cannot understand why this is objectionable.

The guidelines for the changes are: a. To deliver electoral equality where each district councillor represents roughly the same number of electors as others across the district.

b. That the pattern of wards should, as far as possible, reflect the interests and identities of local communities.

c. That the electoral arrangements should provide for effective and convenient local government.

If we look at our current and future village needs and compare these to Winster and Cromford:

1. Second homes and holiday lets are an issue for Bonsall. Holiday lets do not pay council tax. Thus moving the council tax burden onto fewer properties in the village. Similarly, Winster has this issue. Cromford does not have this problem (a

much larger population for a start). 2. A knock-on effect of the second houses and holiday lets is the reduction in school pupils for Bonsall's wonderful village school. This issue is also

mentioned in February's Mutterings. Winster has the same problem. Cromford has a larger area to draw on and is also fed by a number of frequent buses to bring in pupils.

3. Our bus service has recently been reduced. How much longer will we have this service? Winster no doubt has the same issue. Cromford has a large number of services running through it. It also has a train station.

4. How supportive were our district councillors when the Via Gellia has been closed? When it was closed for an extensive period for work on a private garden in Cromford, did they ensure work progressed rapidly? Or the road was open outside working hours? Huge temporary buildings covered one lane of the road – for the workers we assume? No access for through vehicles at all. There was no access even for emergency

I note in February's Mutterings, that £3.5 million is going to be spent on safety improvement works on Via Gellia. Will the current councillors consider the impact of the inevitability of closing off Bonsall? We hope that Dermot Murphy sees the village as being important enough to consider the residents. Our current electoral boundary of Bonsall, Matlock Bath & Cromford means we make up about a quarter of electors. In the electoral boundary with Bonsall, Winster, Gratton, Elton and Birchover, we make up the largest group of electors and all share similar issues.

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PARISH COUNCIL

Report of 15 February meeting

Motocross site former White Low mine: the Clerk reported a complaint received of noise from the track on Sunday 23 January (heard in the churchyard), and two further complaints re Sunday 30 January (from Masson hill and Uppertown).

The Chair, Cllr Harris, reported on the first day of the public hearing in Bakewell into the track owner's appeal against the planning enforcement notice. He said that it had been attended by 15-20 Bonsall residents. As a result of a legal issue raised by the appellant's barrister, the hearing had been adjourned to allow the appellant to submit an additional ground of appeal against the notice. The adjournment was likely to be of two to three months. Cllr Harris said that Bonsall Moor Action Group had requested that the motocross activity be halted in the meantime, but the Inspector had said that she did not have power to do that. The position was noted, with disappointment that resolution of the planning issue had been deferred further.

Public toilets: (1) Security: following another incident of vandalism, it was agreed in principle to place a CCTV unit on the front of the Village Hall to cover the public toilets. Councillor Jackie Smith offered to raise this with the Village Hall Committee, and Councillor Steve Smith offered to research an appropriate TV camera and the permissions or signage needed for this; this was noted with thanks. (2) Doors: noted that J.D Properties were to recess the locks further to allow closure.

Peak District National Park Offroading consultation: the Council had received a request from the Green Lanes Environmental Action Movement to respond to government consultation on off-roading on green lanes. It was agreed to publicise this opportunity for people to give views on this issue. The online consultation is available at https://consult.defra. gov.uk/futurelandscapes-strategy/ government-response-to-thelandscapes-review/. (The 'off-roading' questions are questions 14 to 17).

Website: the new format of the village website is now in place (www. bonsallvillage.org/). It is still under development, and the Website Working group will be looking next at how to make it available to other community groups. Anyone wanting to become involved with that should contact the Clerk. The

Council thanked Brett Biedscheid for his voluntary work on this project.

Recruitment of Clerk/Responsible Finance Officer: the Council finalised arrangements for recruitment to the Clerk's post. The pay scale has been externally reviewed by Derbyshire Association for Local Councils, and the recommended new rates were agreed. Full details of that are available in the Council minutes, and the recruitment pack is available on the website, with a closing date of 7 March.

Personnel Sub-Committee: on the recommendation of DALC and the working group, it was agreed in principle to look to establish a formal sub-committee to manage staffing issues. The Recruitment Working Group will draw up terms of reference for this and report back to the next meeting.

Quarrying update: Cllr Grover reported that he had received a number of recent complaints about quarry noise. The Clerk reported on a comment from a resident that he had been asked to pass on to the Council in relation to the Council's response to quarrying issues. They said that quarrying provides important employment for village people, that the quarries which surround the village have been here for many decades, and that the associated noise is an integral part of the village and its working history. The stone produced is essential for housing and roads. They live opposite Slinter, and are not troubled by quarrying noise. Consequently the Parish Council should not be opposing applications for extension or similar.

The comments were noted, also noting that the Council were not opposed to quarrying itself, but were responding to public complaints about noise.


