The Bonsall Narrowboat

It's coming up to 20 years since the Bonsall Boat Club was formed in 2003 and, in that time, the families who own a share in the boat have cruised most of the waterways of England and Wales. The group consists of eight families who live in Bonsall and three other families who are friends. We have found that shared ownership is a very affordable way to get afloat on the rivers and canals. There are two costs involved: the cost of buying a share, which is refunded if the share is sold; and the non-refundable annual running costs (including the Canal and River Trust licence, insurance, servicing and any repairs). These are divided pro-rata according to each family's shareholding and we have found that this is considerably cheaper than the cost of hiring a boat.

The boat is a 50-foot narrowboat that was professionally fitted out in 1996 with six berths to accommodate larger families and/or guests. The bedroom has a double bed and the dining area and the sitting area, which has a stove, both convert into double beds. There is a kitchen (or galley), shower and separate toilet. It is fully equipped with all the pots, pans, utensils, cutlery and crockery to prepare meals if families do not wish to eat out in

the many waterside pubs and restaurants along the way. When the boat leaves its winter mooring in March, each family picks it up wherever it happens to be on the agreed handover day. This means that we are able to visit parts of the canal system that would not be possible if we had a home mooring. Everyone feels that Burland is their own boat when they are on board.

Overall, we see the shared boat as an excellent and affordable way to explore the waterways, especially for people who might otherwise consider owning a narrowboat to be beyond their means. Bellringing Newsletter:

The Light Six of St James' Bonsall

The bells at St James' were dedicated in 2004, a ring of six bells with the Treble at 2cwt through to the Tenor at 7cwt. To find out more about them I thought that I would talk to John Sewry who was the Treasurer at St James' at the time.

'So John, how did it begin? Why did you consider renovating the bells?'

"The bells were very old. Six in total with three going back to the 1650s. They had been rung on a chiming mechanism since the 1920s which had been put in by Taylors, but it went wrong in the 1990s so a decision had to be made in 2001 either to restore the chiming mechanism - cost of £6-7K, or put the bells back into a round, about £34K or forget about the bells completely."

"So how did you make the decision, John?"

"Well the church at that time had continued paying into the Bell Repair Fund and so they assisted by giving the time of a Bell Consultant free of charge, who came up with the costings and process involved with all three options. We then had a whole village meeting to decide on the way forward. Norma Marshall was Churchwarden at the time and she was very keen on getting the bells put back into a round and the village backed the idea."

"What were your next steps, John?"

"We had three quotes for the work and decided to use Eyre and Smith Bell Hangers and Restorers. They decided that three of the old bells were still usable of which two were used in the round - the 3rd and the 6th. The other was to be used for the clock chime. In terms of money we got quite a lot of help from the Diocese and applied for grants plus generous donations from people in the village. Some people bought the old bells and others bought the new ones. To save money when it came to putting in the frame for the bells, local labour in the form of Leigh Johnson and Mick Biggin



gave their time and worked so hard. I've also never seen two men look quite as dirty as they did afterwards!"

"What about bell ringers, John?"

"I had learnt to ring with my brother as a lad in Ripley but gave up - he didn't though and was a very accomplished ringer. I bought one of the new bells and dedicated it to him. The only other person in the village who could ring was Phil Williams, so we recruited other people, mostly in the pub, and went over to Brassington on Saturday mornings to learn to ring. We were given a lot of help by various ringers in the area which we were and still are, grateful for."

"It's an amazing legacy for you and everyone involved at the beginning of the New Millennium, John, but I know it wasn't without a great deal of stress and worry at the time."

"Yes that's right, Caroline, and here is a book by Smith - of Eyre and Smith, My Life Among Bells - I've never read a more boring book!"

We practice on Monday evenings from 7.45 until 9:00pm and we currently have two new recruits who are appreciating the challenges of controlling a big weight in motion on a rope! If you fancy having a try then come along.

EPCs demystified

(continued)

Following on from the part 1, analysis of Energy Performance Certificates, **Peter Greaves** looks at energy generation aspects in part 2.

Energy generation

One would expect electricity generation to count towards the energy efficiency of a house. However, this does not always appear to be the case. In some cases, the points for energy generation systems are included in the proposed improvement total and in some cases not (at least 20).

- 1. There is no correlation between number of points and projected annual saving.
- 2. 40 properties were not recommended for solar heating; only seven of these were where PV solar was also not recommended. 33 properties were suitable for PV solar but apparently not for solar hot water systems.
- 3. The kWh p.a. on water heating varies from 1160-7396 (say £375-£2390 p.a.)
 4. There is a spurious accuracy in 13 cases (by 10 different surveyors all from one company, Stroma, suggesting a training issue) giving savings into pence; the best one can do practically is the nearest £1.

Solar Panels

A system generating 2.5 kW is proposed in 153 cases with the cost decreasing in four time periods, reflecting the reducing costs of systems, whilst the savings increase (by over 50%), presumably reflecting the increased cost of energy saved;

- 1. There is no correlation between number of points increase achieved and the projected annual saving.
- 2. There is a spurious accuracy in 18 cases (by 12 different surveyors all from one company, Stroma, suggesting a training issue) giving savings into pence; the best one can do practically is the nearest £1.
- 3. There is no evidence of the orientation, shading or area of roof space being considered when these recommendations are made and therefore some doubt as to their practical implementation. In contrast the cost of a solar water heating system has remained throughout at £4,000-£6,000 (126 systems) but adding between 1 point (67 properties) and 6 points (1 property) and savings of £19 p.a. to £164 p.a. (with a range of return 1-4%).

Wind Turbines

The early systems recommended (40) cost £1,500-£4,000, with points from 1 to 6 and £18 to £95 annual saving. (a return of 1-7%).

From May 2015, 26 systems costing £15-25,000, were recommended with points gain of 7 and saving £628 p.a. to 32 points gain but only £556 p.a. saved and £530 to £675 saving (a return of 3-5%). 11 systems in the early period are uncosted so presumably they are the earlier systems (£1,500-£4,000). 1 to 5 points gained and £11 to £57 p.a. (a return of 1-4%)

There is no indication of the type of turbines or their anticipated output, nor any apparent consideration of how their environment may affect output. Clearly there was a change in approach at May 2015 when the small roof-top type turbines were no longer the expected installation and larger systems were anticipated.

What is Wilder Bonsall?

Wilder Bonsall is a group of villagers who are taking action to give wildlife and habitats the best chance possible to thrive. We are part of a bigger local network, Wilder DE4, set up alongside the Derbyshire Wildlife Trust who provide help and support as part of their Wilder Derbyshire Plan, with the aim of 'leading nature's recovery'.

Some of our individual and collective actions so far include:

- Promoting an insect friendly village by establishing a native flower seed bank and encouraging people to plant insect friendly wildflowers
- Promoting a herbicide free Bonsall by awareness raising, engaging with the Parish Council and helping to manage areas where natural growth clashes with our needs. This will not only help increase biodiversity but will protect the soil micro-organisms which allow our green fields, crops and flowers to grow.
- Helping our wild mammals by locating suitable habitat and releasing captive bred harvest mice. These help to support complex food chains and increase biodiversity
- Looking for opportunities around the Parish to improve habitats for wildlife
- Looking for opportunities to address the consequences of tree loss from Ash dieback

Why Now?

Residing in an agricultural area, Wilder Bonsall is committed to promoting a sustainable way of life which will safeguard local landscape, culture, and industries. Soil degradation is a growing concern for rural areas, combined with a 60% decline in our flying insect population since 2004, farming has never been at greater risk.

This year it has been especially noticeable that extreme weather events such as flooding, drought and wildfire are becoming more frequent and widespread. It is so important that we mitigate any further environmental damage now. We can do this by supporting the insects which pollinate 75% of our crops; by planting trees and more biodiverse flora to buffer floodwater and prevent soil erosion. While it is unreasonable to expect people to completely change their lives for the environment, undertaking small actions to save our planet will collectively do wonders.

We want to see a thriving Bonsall in 20 years. To put it simply, it has never been more urgent, or the need greater, to start positively supporting our natural world.

Harvest mice

One thing that was evident on Wilder Bonsall's latest project is that, however scary we may find our small neighbours, harvest mice, we are much more of a threat to their adorable existence. Dwelling in hedgerows and long grasses, they feed on berries and grass heads. Brambly hedge, the well-known children's series, springs to mind. With the only prehensile tail of all land mammals native to Britain, they use them to climb the long grass stems

housing their spherical nests. These angelic, charming creatures are a staple part of local ecosystems, with symbiotic relationships which can't be ignored. Lately, however, their decline has been startling, with them rapidly disappearing as native fauna.

It was therefore, of great excitement to us, to relocate nine harvest mice to a wild field in Bolehill. Kindly helped by Mr Bond, three members of Wilder Bonsall (Molly, Addie and Karen) took the mice to the identified site for release. Many were eager to explore their new home, quickly appearing on top of blackberry leaves and grass stems, while a few needed some time and encouragement to leave the safe and comfortable house provided by the large tub we transported them in. It was difficult leaving them, knowing the many challenges they will face in the wild, but to re-establish the local population, it was essential. We really enjoyed our time with the mice, and hope that others have the opportunity to form such strong and special bonds with the local wildlife. We are, after all, dependant on the local species for survival. The pollination by bees and insects, the food chain of local mammals, and the distributing of seeds by mice are all vital processes which keep the systems we rely on turning over. Wilder Bonsall wants to relocate some more harvest mice soon and hope the local community will look out for and protect them too!


