
Ring for the King

CHURCH NEWS

On 6 May 2023, millions from all over the world will descend upon our capital to be a part of the party to celebrate the coronation of His Majesty King Charles III. The event will be broadcast all over the world, and shown in pubs, village halls and churches up and down the country, it can even be watched legally in the UK without a TV licence.

It is, as they say, 'history in the making'. King Charles will be taking his place as Royal Highness in the long list of Britain's monarchy. It is his time to be the figurehead of the royal family, and what legacy will he leave behind? Only time will tell.

It is strange to think that Charles III officially became king on 8 Sept 2022, but the coronation has not taken place until this month, May 2023. The coronation doesn't make Charles more of a king than he already is, but it is when he is ceremonially accepted by church and state.

But not everyone accepts him. There is a growing number of people who think that the monarchy is an archaic and irrelevant tradition. Nearly 1 in 4 people hold this opinion in the UK. But despite this opinion (and I make no comment, of it being right or wrong) it makes him no less king.

And this makes me think about Jesus. As a Christian I believe that He is the Son of God, the Lord of lords, the King of kings, and all through his life and ministry, he was rejected and spurned. No one wanted to acknowledge him as king. He even tells a parable about this, the parable of the 10 Minas, recorded in Luke 19. It says...

'A man of noble birth went to a distant country to have himself appointed king...But his subjects hated him and sent a delegation after him to say, 'We don't want this man to be our king.'...He was made king, however.'

So he was rejected as king, but it makes him no less king. I believe that people may (and sadly do) reject Jesus as king, but I believe it makes no difference to his position. He is still King.

And this wonderful, mighty King, often mocked and rejected, still deigns to reach out to all people, with a hand of love, acceptance and mercy. He longs for you to know Him. But he still gives each one of us the right to choose. To accept Him or reject Him. The choice is yours.

So as the country celebrates our new king, I will take the time to think of my great King Jesus, and thank Him, for the life of joy and fulfilment I have in Him, because of his great love for us.

A Brief History of Weed Control

When I first became interested in agriculture, chemical weed control was still in its infancy. Many people insinuate "chemicals" are harmful, while continuing to put chemicals in their food, (salt, preservatives and sweeteners), or on their hair (dyes), or even injecting it into their skin (ink)!

Selective weed control was first achieved in the 1940's with synthetic plant hormones such as MCPA; selective by the fact that weeds have broad flat leaves for the herbicide to stick to, and grasses, including wheat and barley, have thin, vertical leaves that the spray runs off. MCPA does not persist, so grassland that has been sprayed can be safely grazed after 10 days.

Often complete weed control is needed; perhaps pasture has become infested by unpalatable grass weeds with low feed value, such as couch grass. Originally, this was controlled by ploughing the field and setting it fallow. Frequent harrowing brought the rhizomes to the surface, and with a few days' good weather and a bit of luck they dried out and could be burnt. The scientific name for couch, Agropyron repens, refers to its creeping habit and the control by fire. From the late 1950's, the herbicide Dalapon killed most grasses, but was an organochloride (see Rachel Carson's "Silent Spring"). While not particularly toxic to mammals, it persisted in the soil, built up in the food chain and is moderately toxic to honeybees and other insects. It is still used, only in a few very restricted situations.

In 1962, complete kill of all green plants could be achieved with paraquat, it had limited effect because it only burnt off the leaves, the roots surviving. This was an extremely unpleasant chemical, causing many human health issues and fatalities. It is now banned in Great Britain.

In the 1970's a transformative weedkiller was developed; glyphosate, marketed commercially as Roundup. It is absorbed through the leaves of a growing plant. It is highly effective in controlling couch grass, and other perennial weeds. It is also used to control

weeds in non-crop areas, like roadsides and vards. It breaks down rapidly in the soil and has very low toxicity to mammals and insects. The trend in arable farming is to reduce soil cultivation and eliminate ploughing since these actions require a lot of work with large tractors burning a lot of fuel, whereas one pass with a sprayer can reduce the farm's carbon footprint dramatically. Where vegetables are grown, it kills plants left over from a previous crop, for example, in parsnips following potatoes. At first Roundup was quite expensive, but we learnt that it could be used at lower concentrations if a wetting agent was used. As some of these agents increased the toxicity to water life this action now has strict recommendations attached to it and Roundup should not be used in an aquatic environment. Some wetting agents also probably account for the apparent toxicity to bees, in a way like soap or washing up liquid kill aphids. There have been rumours that glyphosate is carcinogenic, but there is absolutely no evidence to back this up. It is of course impossible to prove a negative.

In conclusion, Roundup is probably the most useful weedkiller available today; if used according to the instructions it is extremely safe, controls difficult weeds including Japanese Knotweed. It helps increase crop yields and makes a significant contribution to reducing the carbon footprint of agriculture. A weed is only a plant growing where it is not wanted, so let us use whatever tools are available to control them. Roundup is the most appropriate tool for this job. Do those opposed to the use of Roundup really want the verges to become so overgrown, that the effective width of our already narrow roads is reduced, forcing pedestrians and motor traffic to use the same narrow strip?

Save Money on your Home Heating

After the energy price-hike last autumn, home heating is now costing a significant part of our incomes. So what are the alternatives? Gas, coal, liquid propane gas (LPG) and oil are fossil fuels, which are responsible for the CO2 emissions that cause climate heating. The Bonsall Energy Group (BEG) has been researching alternatives to fossil fuels and is looking at the pros and cons of renewable fuels and other ways to heat our homes. These could possibly save you hundreds of pounds per year, while at the same time reducing your 'carbon footprint'. There are also many simple measures to save energy and reduce your gas and electricity bills (see www.moneysavingexpert.com/utilities/ energy-saving-tips). Please let BEG know of any tips that you have found to work and we'll share them via Mutterings.

Change your energy supplier or boiler fuel

One of the simplest ways to potentially save money and reduce your carbon footprint is to change your energy supplier to one that offers 'green' energy generated by renewable technology. The price of fossil fuel is rising, whereas the price of renewable energy is falling, and this gap will increase as time goes on. This year, half of the top-ten cheapest energy tariffs are green providers, offered by suppliers such as Octopus Energy (https://octopus. energy) and Ecotricity (www.ecotricity. co.uk). They provide 100% renewable electricity from solar, wind and/or hydro power generation. Changing your supplier involves no financial costs and there are switching websites that can help guide you, for example:

- Money Saving Expert (www. moneysavingexpert.com > utilities > cheap-green-energy);
- Energy Saving Trust (https:// energysavingtrust.org.uk/advice/ switching-your-energy-supplier);
- The Ecoexperts (www.theecoexperts. co.uk/energy-switching/ why-you-should-switch).

By far the majority of gas used for domestic heating is derived from fossil fuel. However, companies like Ecotricity are also producing 'green gas' (currently 12% of their output) from processing grass in a biodigester. The CO2 given off by burning this biogas is reabsorbed as a new grass crop is grown. Similarly, there

are developments to replace heating oil: hydrotreated vegetable oil (HVO) can reduce carbon emissions by up to 90%. It is currently used as a diesel replacement for vehicles, but by this autumn at least one boiler manufacturer will introduce a conversion kit for domestic boilers to use this fuel (www.worcesterbosch.co.uk/professional/hvo).

There are a number of green options for heating, which require an initial investment, but the energy they save can reduce your gas or electricity bills and, although the pay-back rate is currently low, they will eventually be self-funding.

Consider changing your boiler

Old central heating boilers are much less efficient than new ones, so changing to an 'A-rated' condensing boiler could save you up to £300 per year on energy bills (www.myboilerservice.com). The boiler can be either a 'combi' (combination) type that supplies hot water on demand or a boiler that heats a hot-water tank. Both supply hot water for central heating, but combi boilers do not need a hot-water tank. Prices start from around £1500 plus installation costs.

Legislation is now in place to end the installation of new gas boilers from 2025 (this will not affect existing boilers). The government offers a 'Boiler Upgrade Scheme' of £5,000 grants towards the cost of replacing your fossil fuel boiler with a heat pump or biomass boiler (see www. gov.uk/apply-boiler-upgrade-scheme). This should be done by an installer who is part of the Microgeneration Certification Scheme (www.gov.uk/guidance/find-aheat-pump-installer). To qualify, your property must have a current Energy Performance Certificate issued in the last 10 years, with any recommendations for loft or cavity-wall insulation completed.

These are green alternatives to fossil-fuelled boilers:

Heat pumps

There are two types: air-source and ground-source. They both work like a fridge in reverse: instead of taking heat out the fridge compartment and releasing it into the atmosphere, heat pumps absorb heat from the air or the ground and concentrate it to heat water for the radiators. A ground-source heat pump requires a large area of land (e.g. 30m x 100m with soil at least 1.2m deep) adjacent to the house, so this is an unlikely option for most Bonsall residents. An air-source heat pump only needs a space of a couple of square metres.

In order to minimise their power consumption, heat-pumps are normally run at a lower temperature than a gas boiler. This means that the home should be 'heat-pump ready': sometimes needing larger radiators and a good level of insulation. Without these, the heat pump has to work harder and is more expensive to run. The heat pump does not produce hot tap-water, so you also need a hot-water tank with an immersion heater. A heat pump installation costs around £8,000 (before the £5000 Government grant), but you could save between £200 - £1,000 a year, so it could eventually pay for itself. Further detailed information can be found at https://energysavingtrust.org.uk/ advice/in-depth-guide-to-heat-pumps.

Biomass boilers

Dave Headon, one of the BEG members, writes: "In 2014 I took advantage of a Government grant towards a wood pellet biomass boiler. These boilers are amazingly efficient and fully automatic. Installation is very easy, with minimal changes to the existing plumbing. One of the main advantages is being able to order pellets from a multitude of suppliers. I usually order a tonne in 10kg bags, which make them easy to handle and store (the delivery train is an optional extra!) although you can have them delivered in 20kg bags or in bulk. As the boiler is so efficient, it produces only about a mug-full of ash per week. Overall, I would highly recommend looking into biomass boilers." These boilers are larger than equivalent gas or oil boilers and you also need space to store the fuel. The cost ranges from £4,000 - £10,000 for a manual-fed pellet boiler before the Government grant (www.boilerguide. co.uk/biomass/biomass-boilers-pricescosts). Further information can be found at https://energysavingtrust. org.uk/advice/biomass.

PARISH COUNCIL

Report for 18 April 2023 meeting

Chair's announcements: The Chair announced the Cllr Phil Addis has decided to leave the Council. He recorded the Council's thanks for Phil's many years of service.

Parking

There is a growing problem with inappropriate parking in the village. Please bear in mind that:

- Bonsall in a working village and room is needs for tractors, buses and emergency vehicles
- We do not have yellow lines, common sense in needed
- Do not block doors, gates and drives
- Do not park on corners or opposite lanes
- Drive slowly

Flooding

Richard Ward, Senior Project Engineer from DCC, reported back on flooding issues following a long consultation which has been carried out in Bonsall. He reported that the culvert which runs down High Street and Yeoman Street is very old, damaged in places, and cannot cope properly with the extra water flow due to climate change. It is not felt to be possible to replace this due to expense and the fact that it runs under private property.

DCC intends to instigate a flood resilience scheme. They will be writing to all residents of High Street and Yeoman Street, together with homes in The Dale and Bankside which have been affected by flooding. Residents will be invited to join the scheme. If they do, a survey will be carried out and any equipment recommended will be installed. This equipment will be free for the residents, but they will then be responsible for its maintenance.

Following enquires about the possible effect on insurance premiums, Richard will get back to BPC with further information. He will also look at problems caused by the camber of the roads where it is contributing to the flooding problems.

Defibrillators

The Chair asked for retrospective approval of the purchase of batteries and child pads (£329) and also for new pads for another defibrillator (£114) which was agreed.

Lengthsman

While there is no vacancy for any recruitment, BPC has asked Alan Walker to undertake ad hoc work on a casual basis to assist Peter Spencer.

Park and Vehicle Park

(1) The Clerk reported that J Barnacle has mended the door of the Ladies WC. Cllr Grover reported the WC's are generally not in a bad state, but the doors need painting. Clerk to contact B Allsopp to ask for estimate. The Council also approved buying a hanging basket for the WC's. Cllr S Smith volunteered to carry out repairs to the woodwork on the windows. (2) It was decided to buy a 1 tonne bag of limestone scalpings to fill the worst of the potholes to minimise damage to cars. (3) The Clerk reported DCC do not feel it is necessary to do any work on the path from the car park to the churchyard to reduce muddiness. However, they are looking at creating a revetment on the higher portion to prevent slippage.




