#### **To The Unknown God**

For some strange reason, with all the varied and exciting TV shows that broadcasters are creating to keep our monthly subscriptions... my children have begun a fascination with the unextraordinary, banal, daytime quiz shows. In particular, BBC 1's 'Pointless.' I think the reason for this new interest, is because they are at an age where they have a foundation of knowledge that they can use to give a 'pointless' (or at least near 'pointless') answer. It got me thinking, humans love to express knowledge. We seem to love answering questions, explaining how things work, expressing quirky statistics and even trying to explain and understand people's motives and behaviour. But sadly not everything has a straight forward answer. Especially philosophical and theological concepts. 'Why are we here?' 'What happens when we die?' 'Why do we have an innate desire for justice and equality?' 'What is morality and why does it exist?' 'Why do we seek out love when it is simply a chemical reaction in the brain?' Some have very strong opinions. from the religious to the non-religious, there are attempts to answer these big questions. And this is not a new human problem, it has and will exist for all of human history. We have questions and we want answers. Even the ancient Greek culture wrestled through many of the philosophical questions we face today. In the bible we see that Paul travels to Athens to discover their views on philosophy and religion. #### **OBITUARY**

#### **Irene Osborne** 6 March 1950 -3 June 2024

The photo of Irene holding her newborn Granddaughter in February of this year sums up her joy of life and the love she had for her family.

Irene was born and brought up in Derby, she had a happy childhood and loved her Junior school, she passed the 11+ and went to Parkfield Cedars Grammar School. From her first day there she knew it was not the place for her. She disliked its very traditional academic focus, also the absence of Art in the curriculum, and she especially disliked its insistence on conformity. She left school at the earliest opportunity aged 15 and went to work as a trainee secretary at Rolls Royce and Associates. She learnt touch typing, a skill that became very useful to her as her interest in computing developed. While there her talent for drawing was noticed and she moved into the drawing office.

She moved to British Rail to train as a technical illustrator. She enjoyed this work but still needed something more creative. She enrolled on a two-year Graphic Design course, and to help support herself did a variety of part time jobs, including working in an art gallery and starting a small picture framing business. After the course she did a variety of jobs as a freelance designer working on such things as illustrative maps of Paris and for the Times Atlas. This was fine detailed work done by hand in pre computer days. Teaching was another passion and following a Certificate in Education course, she lectured at an FE college in Graphics and in later years computing.

Irene married early and although this marriage didn't last, she always said that the best thing to come out of the marriage was the birth of her son Nathan. Irene was now 40 and pleased to be free again and start a new life.

A year later I met Irene and together we did many interesting things. It became a very active life with a lot of walking and cycling trips not only here but also in Spain, France, New Zealand and America and six years ago, cycling from the bottom to the top of the Outer Hebrides and then across the Isle of Skye. Irene also learnt to ski and not only loved being in the mountains but also the thrill of mastering a new skill. Although Irene suffered with sea sickness, it didn't stop her from enjoying sailing and especially sailing in Scotland and out to the islands, once sailing with Nathan from East to West through Loch Ness and the Caledonian

canal and then down to Oban. A trip that became very memorable for Irene was when, early one morning off the coast of Kerry we pulled a drowning fisherman from the sea and got him ashore safely.

Irene enjoyed assisting in beekeeping and while living in Derby, she jarred the honey and using her own design of label she sold the honey from the front porch. Using the wax from the bees she would make candles and also sculpt the wax. This led to another change of direction, when Irene looking for another outlet for her creative energy, she decided to do a three year Applied Arts Degree at Derby University. It was here that she specialised in Ceramics which combined both her practical and creative skills. After the degree Irene went on to develop and sell her unique domestic ware, and then more figurative and experimental pieces. At the same time and having now moved into the Chapel, Irene combined both teaching and ceramics by working with Specials Needs adults at Golding House in Matlock. She also worked with residents in care homes in Derbyshire Dales.

Buying the Baptist Chapel to convert was the sort of project that Irene revelled in, and her design and creative skills went into overdrive. Irene designed and made all of the balustrades that involved forging and shaping the metal figures, this feature she called the 'silent congregation'.

Irene was always a strong woman, a woman with strong opinions, a woman with a strong moral compass, who hated deceit and lying...prone to strong political rants directed towards the radio each morning. She expressed her voice when working as a freelance Graphic designer for CND. Amnesty International and Greenpeace amongst others.

Irene had been vegetarian since she was 15. She not only loved the environment of the allotments in Bonsall but also the opportunity to be able to grow her own fruit and vegetables, and being a very good cook make full use of all of the produce.

Irene was interested in so many different things. But what became a major part of her life was when she took up fly fishing. Fishing and rivers had always interested her and so when she was bought some fly-fishing lessons she was 'hooked'. She became very interested in entomology, and in particular fly tying, not just their exquisite intricacy but also the science behind which flies attracted which fish. Irene was a member of both the Peacock fly fishing club on the rivers Wye, Lathkill and Bradford, and being very keen the Leek and District club on the river Dove, and for a while was the club Secretary. She was well



respected in fly fishing community for her fishing skills, her organisational skills and her determination to encourage more women into the sport. She was instrumental in starting a blog aimed at encouraging more women into the sport, and along with a friend organised days on the river for women to get a taste of and to learn more about the sport.

Always keen on the environment and wildlife, more recently she was active as the Treasurer for the Wye and Upper Derwent Valley Wildlife Trust, a role that she gave up when she started her cancer treatment. It was a tremendous shock when in July 2022 Irene was first diagnosed with inoperable cancer, but from the start her response was characteristic when she said 'let's face the music and dance'. In the face of challenging treatments, she adapted and changed. A competent dressmaker who made many of her own clothes she now added stylish head-wraps to her wardrobe, and complemented them with jazzy earrings. Unwilling to curtail her love of the countryside, e-bikes allowed her to continue to enjoy long rides and as recently as this spring there had been walks around Masson Hill. In her last days Irene was so pleased to be back home and surrounded by her family.

Irene loved living in Bonsall and especially in the Chapel. On 3 July a 'Celebration of Irene's Life' was held there. Around 100 people attended and £550 was collected for the charity the Macmillan Cancer

Trust. Irene revelled in her role as Nana to Phoebe, and later to Turin and Imogen. Phoebe became very close to Irene when she and Nathan lived in Bonsall, Irene was thrilled that Phoebe had inherited her love of art and went on to study this at university. Irene also had a loving extended family of Emma, Finian, Petra and Steve with children Hazel and Roan.

I would like to thank friends and neighbours for their condolences and support over the past few months. And a special thank you to Louise Stephenson our local Celebrant for her advice and the writing and delivery of the Eulogy for Irene.

#### **Road Closure Notice**

Via Gellia – phased road closure for six weeks from 30 **September to 8 November for** road safety improvements

Dear parish council clerks,

I'm getting in touch to let you know about the major safety improvements we are introducing along the Via Gellia which require a phased closure of the road starting later this month.

The route was ranked as one of the 50 most dangerous roads in England and has secured funding from the Government's Safer Roads programme.

The A5012 Via Gellia will be closed on a phased basis from Cromford to the junction with the A5015 at Newhaven for six weeks from Monday 30 September to Friday 8 November for road safety improvements. The narrow and twisty nature of the road means we have to close the route in phases to protect our workforce.

The closure, from 8am to 4pm each day, will take place in a series of separate phases to minimise inconvenience:

- · Newhaven to Grangemill from Monday, 30 September.
- Grangemill to Ryder junction from Monday 7 October.
- Ryder Junction to Bonsall from Monday, 14 October.
- Newhaven to Grangemill from Monday, 21 October.
- Bonsall to Cromford from Monday 28 October.

#### Why close the Newhaven to Grangemill section twice?

The work on the Newhaven to Grange Mill stretch of the Via Gellia has to be done in two phases.

The first part of the work involves sweeping the edges of the road surface to remove mud, grass etc. Our team will then return several weeks later, once any remaining mud etc has been washed away and the surface is dry, to make sure the new white lining sticks to the road surface properly.

The new white lining to the edge of the road is being applied along the entire length of the Via Gellia, to help nighttime visibility and improve road safety.

Dates may change due to weather

Please note that the dates may change due to weather conditions or if members of our team are needed for gritting or snow clearing duties etc. They are an approx. guide for information.

A signed HGV diversion route will be in place using the A515, A5270, A6, Market Place Cromford and vice versa.

During the road closure, a series of road safety improvements will be installed, including:

- Preparations for the installation of 10 new average speed cameras to monitor the revised speed limits along the road, which are designed to reduce the severity of accidents.
- The speed limit west of Grange Mill will be reduced from 60mph national speed limit to 50mph. The speed limit within Grange Mill will also be reduced from 50mph to 40mph. The 40mph speed limit will also apply back along the roads leading to Winster and Longcliffe on the immediate approaches to Grange Mill.
- The cameras will be located at the ends of the different speed zones and at locations where vehicles join and leave the A5012, with installation expected early next year. Average speeds will be monitored along the route and enforcement action will be taken if people exceed the signed speed limit. No cameras are planned on the B5056 routes.
- Improved road drainage to improve braking distances.
- New road signs to alert road users to the average speed cameras and revised speed limits, with

a general tidy up of signage to reduce visual clutter.

While the road is closed, we will also be taking the opportunity to carry out other more general housekeeping tasks, including clearing out the road drains (gulleys) and repairing a damaged drainage culvert.

Our thoughts went back to the heady days at RAF Scampton working with the real Red Arrows, so as the base was now shut and all moved to RAF Waddington just down the road, why not send a message asking if they wanted to play again. Said message was asking for an official invoice and they were looking forward to seeing us on the 13 July...3 weeks away.



On the final performance I noticed a tall important looking chap in a red flying suit in the crowd, laughing and clapping. At the end he came over, introduced himself as the CO of the Red Arrows shook my hand and said how much he had enjoyed and laughed at what we did. A true gent so the team kidnapped him for photographs which he did happily. A Day to remember. On the Monday another e mail arrived at Red Barrows HQ, would we like to perform again in July 2025. I think you can guess the answer, and yes, the female guard did turn up for our performance. Our next gig however is taking part in the Xmas light switching on in Matlock and somehow doing a performance on the park in the dark, so what could go wrong?

#### **PARISH COUNCIL**

#### **Report for 17** September meeting

#### **Public Speaking:**

There was a discussion about the proposed sign by the war memorial requesting that people should not park in front of it. Residents questioned the lack of consultation with people living nearby and noted that residents are happy to move their cars when required. A resident questioned whether the wishes of visitors should be prioritised over that of residents. Cllr Barry reminded the meeting that the PC has no powers to enforce parking restrictions and this was intended as a request only. The Chair and Cllr J Smith mentioned complaints which had been received and mentioned the difficulty for visitors who wanted to photograph the war memorial and also for the school. Cllr Cartwright reminded the meeting that anyone is allowed to park on the public road. The Chair said the matter was on the agenda and a decision would be made later in the meeting. The PC later voted to proceed with the sign.

Cllr Grover reported that a resident wishes to put a memorial bench in the Park and the suggestion was welcomed.

#### **Repair of Cross:**

Three quotes for a structural survey have been received. The cheapest was provided by GCA although it was unclear what the costs actually covered. Clerk to contact GCA to seek clarification and discuss with Cllr Grover. Cllr Grover summarised potential sources of funding once the extent of work is

known. Cllrs J & S Smith wondered whether mortar repair might be possible as they had been advised by a local building firm this might be the case. The survey should confirm.

#### **Light at the Cross:**

The Clerk reported that following the suggestion from Cllr Barry she has discovered the DDDC pays for the similar lights in Wirksworth and Cromford and she has contacted them to ask for similar service for Bonsall. Cllr Barry reported that the bulb has been changed to reduce the electricity used. Clerk to inform National Grid.

#### **DDC Car Parks**:

Cllr Cartwright brought current consultation on car parking to the PC's attention. It was decided this is not a matter BPC can respond to, but individual responses should be given.

#### **Meetings:**

Cllr S Smith suggested recording meetings to ensure decisions are correctly reported. Clerk to contact T Payne to ask for advice. Cllr S Smith volunteered to make recordings also.

#### Weed spraying:

Clerk explained that the decision to extend spraying to The Dale (which was taken after the July meeting) needed to be recorded so residents would be kept informed.

#### Parking issues on The Dale:

A resident had raised the issue of parking in front of the bench at the top of The Dale, preventing people from sitting on the bench. Cllr Grover suggested moving the bench to the side. Cllr Barry agreed to have a look and to send photos to councillors. Chair suggested a site visit prior to the next meeting, and acknowledged on-going issues with parking on The Dale.

#### Vandalism:

There has been recent vandalism including notices being torn from the notice board and from BT posts, the bus stop notice, and also the new footpath sign on The Dale has been wrenched away. Clerk reported that she has told the police. There has also been vandalism in the WC's and Cllrs reported cars have been scratched. It was agreed to monitor and to ask for further police action if necessary.

#### Park:

Cllr Grover wondered if the logs at the edge of the play area could be altered to allow wheelchair access from the Yeoman St side. Other Cllrs suggested this was unnecessary as wheelchair users use the bottom entrance by the car park. Clerk to ask DDDC if the alteration would be viable.

#### Quarrying update:

Cllr Grover to attend meeting 18.09.24. He reported there have been many complaints in Cromford about the noise from Ball Eye.

#### Well:

Chair reported that during Open Gardens there had been enquiries about the well on the High St. Clerk reported that the homeowner continues to be involved in repair work so the well is covered for protection.





#### **Murder in Bonsall (Part Two)**

The trial took place later that month. Mary's lover and Addie's father, who is never named, had evidently disappeared for three years but then, according to her defence lawyer, "He came back again, and such was the extraordinary infatuation, such was the extraordinary love of the woman that he managed to seduce her again." It was a pitiable story. She was deserted by her lover, deserted by her father, and, it seems, by her sisters too. "There was nothing to look forward to but a life of degradation and starvation." Several witnesses were called to testify to Mary's depressed spirits, and it was pointed out that it is almost impossible for adults to drown themselves in two feet of water - instinct takes over.

The judge's summing-up stressed the importance of the evidence and advised the jury not to be swayed by their sympathy for Mary's predicament. The jury returned a verdict of guilty of murder, but with "the strongest recommendation to mercy." The judge had no choice but to sentence her to death, but promised that the jury's plea for mercy would be passed on. He then asked Mary if she had anything to say which would "stay the execution." She whispered that she was pregnant. The judge then empanelled a jury of twelve matrons, assisted by a medical man, to examine Mary. They left the court and returned to verify her pregnancy. His Lordship then deferred the hanging until after the baby was born.

At the beginning of August, Mary was reprieved from the death penalty. How long she spent in prison is not recorded, but she reappears in the 1891 census at her father's house. There is no mention of a tenyear-old child, so we don't know whether or not she miscarried, or what happened to the baby. James Wright died in 1913, aged eightyeight. Mary disappears from the census after 1901, at which time she was forty-eight and living in The Dale as a servant to John Ward.
