To Autumn

John Keats wrote the poem "To Autumn" after his Sunday Walk in late September 1819. It begins "Season of mists and mellow fruitfulness close bosom friend of the maturing sun; conspiring with him how to load and bless with fruit the vines that round the thatch-eves run; To bend with apples the moss'd cottage trees, and fill all fruit with ripeness to the core; To swell the gourd and plump the hazel shells with a sweet kernel, to set budding more, and still more."

The Bible in Genesis Chapter 8, verse 22, speaks of God's covenant with His Creation "While the earth remains, seedtime and harvest, cold and heat, winter and summer, day and night shall not cease." John, a disciple of Jesus, as an old man, exiled on the barren island of Patmos, wrote "Now I saw a new heaven and a new earth, for the first heaven and the first earth had passed away. Also there was no more sea.' (Revelation 21 v 1). God has so much that He wants us to know of His wonderful love and care. This, however, can seem hard to believe and understand when we have troubles in our own lives, in our families and friends' lives. We may also be concerned about our nation and the world in general. But we can take comfort from what we read in the Bible "For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have everlasting life. For God did not send His Son into the world to condemn the world, but that the world through Him might be saved." (John 3 v 16, 17). As the old hymn says, "What a Friend we have in Jesus, all our sins and griefs to bear; what a privilege to carry everything to God in prayer. O what peace we often forfeit, O what needless pain we bear, All because we do not carry, everything to God in prayer."

Maybe you too have planted seeds, grown plants, tended your gardens and even now are harvesting vegetables and fruit in abundance. I've appreciated the fruits from my neighbours, my garden, stocked my freezer and made jam too! What a wonderful world we live in, what "riches" we enjoy and what a great God I am privileged to serve; you can too! May He open our eyes and our hearts to believe all that He has in store for those who put their trust in Him.

The Harvest Festival is a fairly new celebration in churches and was begun in 1843, when the Reverend Robert Hawker invited parishioners to a special thanksgiving service at his church at Morwenstow in Cornwall. Victorian hymns such as "We plough the fields and scatter", "Come ye thankful people, come" and "All things bright and beautiful" but also Dutch and German harvest hymns in translation helped popularise his idea of harvest festival and spread the annual custom of decorating churches with home-grown produce for the Harvest Festival service. Many churches would also hold a Harvest Supper.

As well as being a time of giving thanks to God for the harvest of crops in our modern world we give thanks for all who help to feed us and pray for those who do not have enough food. Please do come along and join us on the 12 October at 9:30 a.m. in St James Church to share in this year's Harvest Celebration, followed by refreshments.

Breathing New Life into 'Bert the Butcher's Barn'

One of the things that made me fall in love with Bonsall is how its history isn't something distant — it's written into the buildings we live in and walk past every day. The barn at The Cross, remembered fondly by many as Bert the Butcher's Barn, is one of only a handful of Grade II listed buildings in the village, and it has passed through many hands over the centuries.

The building has stood for over 300 years and although now a dilapidated barn, during its rich history it has been many things: the village malt house and office (owned by the proprietor of The King's Head), a warehouse, cottages for multiple loom worker's families, a parish council meeting place, a doctor's surgery, a school for evacuees during the war, even a workhouse.

When we first stepped inside, I wasn't only imagining the vision of a beautifully restored home for my family and me. What struck me just as strongly was the building's own story — a patchwork of alterations, repairs, and adaptations made by so many hands over the centuries. The somewhat wonky stone walls and propped up old beams carry the marks of those lives, and I found that mixture of history, imperfection, and character part of its charm. After learning that the barn had slipped onto the Buildings at Risk register, we knew that we wanted to be part of giving it another chapter, rather than letting it fade away.

The renovation is no small task. Wherever we can, we will be holding onto its quirks and character — using original materials and traditional methods so that it doesn't lose the marks of its long past. It's a challenge, but also a privilege: a chance to preserve a little piece of Bonsall's story and, we hope, keep it alive for future generations to use, remember, and love in their own ways. The first is to say that groundworks start in October, so please take extra care near the gable end by The Cross.

If you have any questions, concerns—or stories about the barn's history—I would love to hear from you.

Nepalese School Update

In April 2024 Jane and Alan David and Chris Broome gave a presentation in the Village Hall about our trips to Nepal, during the presentation we talked about a primary school we have been supporting, located near to the village of Tamang Tol where our Nepalese friend Bijay comes from. We raised the sum of £360.00 at the event, which was to be used to buy educational equipment for the school. Bijay had agreed, on our behalf, to purchase and distribute the equipment to the school. Unfortunately, Bijay was unable to do this at the time, he was struggling to find work in Nepal and had to make the difficult decision to look for work abroad. He found out that Israel wanted to employ Nepalese people in their care sector, he applied for a job, was accepted, and since 2024 has been working in care homes, most recently in Tel Aviv. We have been in regular contact with Bijay since he has been in Israel, and told him that we needed to spend the money raised. He has now been able to do this via his father and a substantial amount of equipment, including exercise books and play equipment, have been purchased and delivered to the school. The accompanying photos show the equipment purchased and items being handed out to the children. The school and parents were all very grateful for our generosity and help. Jane, Chris and I would like to thank once again those people who attended our event and kindly made a donation to help the school.

PARISH COUNCIL

Parish Council Report for Meeting on 16 September 2025

Councillor Vacancies: There are currently vacancies for Bonsall Parish Councillors. For further information please contact the interim clerk.

The meeting was attended by Adrian Hunter, County Councillor, and Matthew Buckler, District Councillor. The Parish Council recorded its thanks to Councillor Hunter for his work in securing the road repairs in the village. The Parish Council recorded its thanks to Councillor Buckler for the donation of £250 from the local community grant which was used to purchase new swing seats.

Flooding: Councillor Hunter has met with Slaley residents in relation to flooding issues. Councillors S Smith and Grover will identify problem areas in the village and report back to the next meeting.

Park Trees: A tree survey has been completed and 8 trees have been identified as requiring removal within the next 12 months. Openreach are requesting £1055 to look at a wire attached to a pole in the park which runs through trees which are to be removed. A meeting is being arranged between the Parish Council and the land agents for the Derby Diocese to discuss the trees issues.

Village Community Playground: The Parish Council recorded its thanks to Richard Stead and the Bonsall Players for their donation and work on the playground. Councillor J Smith has applied to the Community Resilience Fund for a grant to refresh the toddler play area. If successful there will be community consultation.

Roads, Verges and Footpaths: The Parish Council recorded its thanks to the newly formed Roadside Clearance Team for their work in clearing the verges and footpaths.

The Cross: The Parish Council recorded its thanks to Linda Cauldwell and Rita Baugh for their kind donation towards the repairs to The Cross. This is being progressed by Councillors S Smith and Grover.

Policies: Finance Regulations, Safeguarding Policy and Council Code of Conduct 2025 were all approved. Councillor Grover to produce an Internet Banking Policy.

Churchvard: Councillor I Smith has taken over the position of Interim unsalaried Burial Clerk. She has amended the Burial Policy which will be discussed at the October meeting, together with other burial matters. She will work with Councillor Grover to ensure records are updated. The three dead tree trunks in the churchyard, one of which is rotting from the inside, need to be addressed. M Biggin would like to look at converting one of them into a woodland sculpture and permission has been granted for him to progress this. The lime trees are due to be inspected by December 2025.

Interim Arrangements: Councillor Grover is taking over as interim unsalaried Responsible Finance Officer. Councillor J Smith is taking over as interim unsalaried Clerk and Burial Clerk, until new member/s of staff has/have been appointed.

Donations at the Carnival: The Parish Council recorded its thanks to everyone who donated to the Community Village Playground fund.

Finance: Councillor Grover produced the end-of-year accounts which were included with the grant application and the reserves and income statements, together with the expenditure statement. Councillor J Smith thanked Councillor Grover for producing the finance documents required for the grant application.

Remembrance Day: Councillor Barry will represent the Parish Council at this year's village Remembrance Day.

The next Parish Councill meeting is at 7:30 p.m. on Tuesday 21 October 2025, at Bonsall Village Hall. If you have any issues to be raised at the meeting, please contact the interim clerk, Jackie Smith, with details by 14 October.




